## ANGELS MAKE IT THREE STRAIGHT FROM BEAVERS

### Hollywood Drops Game to Sacramento—Seattle Wins From Missions 23 to 3.

One of these cloudbursts of runs, which happen now and then in baseball when batters reign supreme at the expense of pitchers, occurred in San Francisco Thursday as the Seattle Indians ran wild against the Missions to win, 23 to 3.

Herman Pilette, the Reds' starting pitcher, was yanked in the second in-

ning after Seattle had scored six times. Chamberlain was next, lasting until the seventh, and Chelini finished. The Indians made 16 runs in the last four frames. The Missions got 15 hits off Hal Heid, but as in Wednesday's game, had difficulty in turning them into runs.

Oakland made three runs off three hits in the seventh inning to defeat the Beas, 4 to 3, and checked a San Francisco attack in the ninth after two runs were made.

Los Angeles humbled the league leading Portland Ducks 10 to 2 in celebration of the twenty-second birthday of Outfielder Truck Stainback. Hal Stitzel's pitching kept the Northerners at bay most of the evening, while the Angels hammered

For the last six months the corporation has been advancing money to banks and railroads. The last available figure showed loans of \$642,789,313 to banks; \$52,484,923 to building and loan associations; \$63,465,500 to insurance companies; \$322,440 to agricultural credit corporations; \$1,270,000 to joint stock land banks; \$6,594,586 to livestock credit corporations; \$73,600,000 to mortgage loan companies; \$403,000,000 to credit unions and \$213,882,724 to railroads.

dictment indicated to court officers, however, that the grand jury had first degree murder in mind, the penalty of which is death in the electric chair.

After hearing two witnesses, it took the grand jury but half an hour to return the murder indictments. The action came as another climax in the investigation of the shooting of the 20-year-old flier at his elaborate mansion here, following a gay liquor party the night of July 5.

Sheriff Dissatisfied  
Sheriff Transou Scott, who was dissatisfied with a suicide theory immediately wired Cincinnati and New York authorities to arrest Libby if they could find her.

A week after the shooting, Libby Holman Reynolds, near collapse from the tragedy, left Winston-Salem for her home to rest.

When the case will be brought to trial is not known. The next regular term is scheduled to open October 3. Because of a crowded docket, a special term before then is probable.

The M-G-M super production, "Grand Hotel," came to the Granada theatre yesterday and remains over today, presenting one of the most amazing parades of cinema celebrities ever staged together for one picture. It is a picturization of Vicki Baum's story and presents the hodge-podge of a great hotel—any great hotel, where life flows on and on and "nothing happens." Yet something does happen, and the tragedies, the problems of a host of persons are woven into the life of the actresses and actors; yet it represents life with its minor and major disappointments and accomplishments and happiness.

Garbo, Berry, Stone, Hersholt, Barrymore, Crawford—these are the names that stand out in the cast, and each gives a vivid presentation of his or her part. 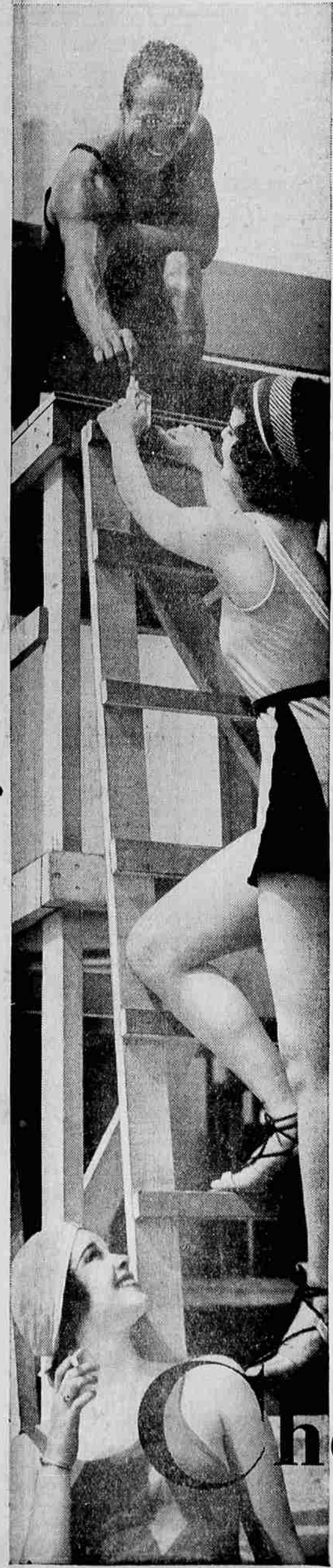
