LIBBY HOLMAN IN "FADE OUT" UNDER BONDS

C., Aug. 9 (AP)—Eight hours after she had made another spectacular dash into seclusion, the whereabouts of Libby Holman, torch-singer widow of Smith Reynolds, tobacco heir, was as much of a mystery as ever today. A "fade out" as dramatic as any in her theatrical career again removed Libby from the public gaze to which she returned yesterday for the few hours necessary to obtain her freedom under bond on a charge of killing her millionaire husband a month ago. The former Broadway blues singer called on all her knowledge of theatrical effects, of swift changes of roles and costumes for the stage setting of her 2 a. m. dash to a retreat, such as she has occupied since the inquest at which a coroner's jury held the heir to the Reynolds tobacco fortune came to his death at the hands of a person or persons unknown. Instead of yesterday's sombre black gown and heavy veil, Libby today wore a snappy sports outfit of tan, with a comparatively short skirt and a matching sweater closely moulded to her figure.

Capt. Lancaster On Stand Today In Murder Trial

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 9 (AP)—Captain W. N. Lancaster testified in his murder trial today that Haden Clarke had promised him before he left on a business trip to the west that he would care for Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller "so that I would remember his friendship." The state charges Lancaster shot Clarke to death after the latter had replaced him in the affections of Mrs. Keith-Miller, his Australian flying partner. Lancaster said Clarke made the promise after he had cautioned Clarke to keep Mrs. Keith-Miller from drinking too heavily during his absence. "When she drank heavily her conduct was not normal," Lancaster testified. "I spoke confidentially to Haden before I left about my love for Mrs. Keith-Miller and urged him to take care of her," the witness continued. Clarke was shot April 21, less than 12 hours after Lancaster returned from his western trip on learning the two planned to marry. Lancaster told his admiration for Mrs. J. M. Keith-Miller turned to love during their London to Australia flight in 1927-28. "We were in the public eye at that time, of course, and after our arrival in Australia, and we had little opportunity to see each other," he testified. "Since the long Australian flight, my love for Mrs. Keith-Miller has increased during the years." Mrs. Keith-Miller testified yesterday she no longer loved the memory of Clarke, who replaced Lancaster in her affections, and that she no longer loved Lancaster although she was intensely fond of him.

GERMANY AGAIN TURNS TO IRON FIST FOR PEACE

(Continued from Page One) emergency decree into final form for promulgation late today without waiting for President von Hindenburg's return from East Prussia, which is expected tomorrow. Members of the government were certain they could secure his approval by telephone. Meanwhile, speculation on the part of the nazis might play in the new government was upset by a vehement editorial in the nazi Berlin organ, Der Angriff, demanding for the nazis "a decisive influence in the government's course." This was interpreted as meaning the more radical members of the party had prevailed upon Hitler to challenge von Papen for the chancellorship. "If we are denied the leadership," the editorial concluded, "there is only one answer—a ruthless fight." As he prepared to go into action, Chancellor von Papen, whose manner usually is nearer breezy than belligerent, assumed a new role. In a brief semi-official communique last night after riots had taken two more lives, he declared the government would take the most drastic measures and added: "Our authority must be wielded brutally." Death Toll High Since his government took office June 2, well more than 100 have been killed and nearly 1500 seriously injured in political battles. In the press today there were complaints that the relief had come too late. The list of outrages overnight increased as further reports came in. A fresh outburst was recorded in Schleswig, where a Jewish store was bombed as well as the home of a Jewish citizen. Two victims of mob violence died during the night, and a child injured by a hand grenade was not expected to live. At Breslau a national socialist was fatally injured when a bomb exploded prematurely in his hands. At Seldenberg a member of the reichsbanner was killed. At Marlenburg a child of six received probably fatal injuries when a hand grenade was tossed through a window of its bedroom.

NEW KIND OF SPEAKEASY

CHICAGO, Aug. 9 (AP)—Chicago has a new kind of speakeasy, but it's O. K. with the prohibition enforcement officials. This is because it gives off nothing more potent than pure water. It's a fountain, donated to one neighborhood by a laundry and it operates on the photo-electric cell principle. All you need to do is walk up to it, speak a word or two softly, and water begins to flow from a jet.

THREE OFFICERS RESIGN

Menus Of The Day

Tuna Salad Filling (For 12 Sandwiches) 1 cup tuna, 1 hard cooked egg, 4 tablespoons chopped pickles, 1-3 cup chopped celery, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon paprika, 1-3 cup salad dressing. Pour boiling water over tuna. Let stand 10 minutes. Drain and chill. The tuna will then greatly resemble chicken in flavor. Mince tuna with a fork. Add rest of ingredients. Spread on buttered slices of white bread. Add bits of shredded lettuce. Cover with other buttered bread slices. Press firmly and remove crusts. Frozen Berry Dessert, for 8 (Any kind of berries can be used) 2 cups berries, 2 cups sugar, 1-3 cup lemon juice, 2 cups cream, 1/2 cup milk. Crush berries or press through sieve. Add sugar and lemon juice and let stand 5 minutes. Stir several times. Stirring slowly, add cream and milk. Pour into tray in mechanical refrigerator and after 30 minutes, remove tray and beat the partially frozen mixture. Return tray and after another 30 minutes, repeat the beating. It requires about 4 hours to freeze this dessert. The dessert also can be frozen in the regular freezer.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Aug. 9 (AP)—Domestic wool continues to move freely but lacks the rush that characterized trading late last week. Values show a slight upward trend as selling prices approach the maximum of recently quoted ranges, but the consensus is that price ranges have not been extended above recent levels. Original bag offerings of bulk French combing 64s and finer western grown wools recently selling on the low side of the range, 32-35 scoured basis, are more frequently realizing the high figure of this range.

Scrubwoman Finds Peace And Quiet At Grand Isle, La.

By Lenwood Bowman GRAND ISLE, La., Aug. 9 (AP)—The scrubwoman of the middle west who pointed the nose of her skiff down the Mississippi river and rowed away from civilization, has cast her lot here with the descendants of the pirate Jean Lafitte — and she likes it. Randi Lerohi has found the peace she sought. To the natives of French, Spanish, German and other extractions, she is the "mystery woman." When she arrived three months ago, they welcomed her with their frugal hospitality but she would have none of it. "I want to be left alone" — she said. And she has been left alone. The U. S. coast guard station has added her to its guarding duties. She first anchored a stone's throw from where Jean Lafitte and his crew once moored the fleet that preyed upon Spanish galleons. The coast guard towed her into the sheltered waters of Bay Des Ilottes and anchored her craft, "The Wanderer," in the quiet waters back of this island. Here she has stayed in the Gulf of Mexico's hot sun and soft breezes which once she said she hoped would bring relief to a back bent from miles of floors' scrubbed clean. That she has found the land of her dreams is vouched for by John Ludwig, whose old store is the island's postoffice, and Captain Martin Anderson, head of the coast guard. Her skiff is secured to the life boat which New Orleans sympathizers gave her. A canvas cabin protects her from the rain. Therein she defies any breach of the privacy she demands. And the natives respect her wishes.

Secretary Accused Of Theft of Money

SALEM, Aug. 9 (AP)—Fred M. Gearin, of Donald in Marion county, was in the county jail here this morning following his arrest last night on charges of embezzling \$17,000 from two fire relief organizations of which he was secretary. Gearin is accused of diverting to his own use \$19,000 from the Farmers' Fire Relief association of Butteville and \$5000 from the Hopmen's Fire Relief association. The diversions are alleged to have extended over a number of years. He was expected to be arraigned today.
