COUNTRY IS IN GRIP OF MARTIAL LAW

Garrison at Cartagena, on the southeast coast, also was reported to have maintained. The cause of the trouble was obscure. Wheat, expecting a bullish government report, advanced after the close to 1 1/2 cents, to 1 1/2 cents, and showed net gains of about 1 1/2 cents a bushel. Cotton had an extreme advance of 15.9 a bale, while wool, after a decline in rubber quotations was steady.

Bonds Gain

A weekly review of the steel trade said producers were still confident in a September upturn even though there had been slackening in the operating ratio this week.

Closing prices of shares were mostly under the best, reactions from the high amounting in many instances from \$1 to \$3.

American Telephone, again a center of strenuous activity, closed \$4 up, at \$18.37 against its high of \$19.75. United States steel common, after rising to \$44.50, eased back to \$42.87 where the net gain was \$2.75.

MUCH WOOL SOLD

BOSTON, Aug. 10 (AP)—Private estimates of the volume of wool sold here last week range from 20,000,000 to 30,000,000 pounds. One large contractor has reported that he has secured the total for the previous seven months. Other large houses report their total above that for the entire month of July. A changed buyers attitude, which led in anticipation of raw wool requirements, is believed to have given rise to recent developments.

RAIL DEVELOPMENTS EXPECTED

NEW YORK, Aug. 10 (AP)—Wall Street looks for important developments this week from the series of railroad conferences getting under way today with the assembling of leading executives to discuss the proposed \$300,000,000 expenditure for rehabilitation of freight equipment, through funds supplied by the reconstructed finance corporation.

While there is keen interest in the decision on repair expenditures, far more significance is attached to the outcome of tomorrow's conference to consider proposals to reduce further the wages of the carriers' unionized employes. The unions accepted a 10 per cent cut early this year, but the railroad managements are now said to feel another reduction is imperative in view of the continued slump in earnings.

It was informed railroad circles, it was suggested the roads will wage scales adjusted to levels at least 15 per cent lower than those prevailing before the February 1 agreement. The third meeting of the week will take place on Friday, as a resumed conference of presidents of the eastern trunk lines to continue their study of the interest in commerce commission approval of the four-system consolidations.
