The way has been paved by Madison Square Garden for Jack Sharkey to ward off the deadliest of all threats to the continued supremacy of the heavyweight champion—the rust that comes of ring inactivity.

And for some queer reason, by the same token, the Garden has made it possible for Sharkey to reach himself a nice punching around and lose his precious title, if he isn't very careful indeed.

The Garden has the sailorman under contract for his next major duel, and there was no idea that Jack would draw on gloves again until he faced Max Schmeling for the world title in New York next summer.

With a struggling arena in Boston, the Garden, however, decided that it would be all right if the champion fought once this winter in his home town, nothing serious, of course, and a fine guarantee that he would not lose his title while Schmeling is improving himself steadily with a full program this fall and winter.

BARRED 'BIG GUN'
So the Garden ruled that Sharkey could not box Schmeling, Primo Carnera, or Eddie Schaaf in the winter, and in the same breath announced that it would be all right for Jack to meet Johnny Risko, the India rubber man himself, of all persons.

Time may have dulled Garden memories, but it was just four years ago that Sharkey, fighting his way back from a Dempsey knockout, battled Risko in the big Garden pit and got himself pranced right out of Tex Rickard's last elimination tournament in fifteen rounds.

Someone had told Sharkey that the bounding baker boy from Cleveland was what the fight game calls a "soft touch." Sharkey believed what he was told. He had beaten Risko easily in ten rounds in Boston.

All Johnny did in their second meeting in New York was claw Sharkey from the opening bell, take everything the Tar tossed at him, and come bounding back for more as though he were being hit with a rubber rope. He not only won comfortably but he knocked Sharkey right out of the ring to provide the vehicle for Gene Tunney's farewell to arms. Tom Heeny finally eased himself into that spot and a dreadful beating by out-fumbling Risko in Detroit.

RISKO AT LARGE
Now Risko is on the loose again, apparently back in the form that made him the better of fighting heavyweights four years ago. His last effort was a convincing victory over Mickey Walker, the mighty one who made Sharkey so uncomfortable for fifteen rounds last summer that the best the next champion could get was a draw.

Vertical Air Race To Be New Stunt At Cleveland, O. Meet

CLEVELAND (AP)—A vertical air race will be one of the innovations at the 1932 national air races at Cleveland August 27 to September 7.

The race, proposed by the Aero Club of Poland, which will award a marble white eagle, Polish national emblem, as a trophy, probably will be a free-for-all event, but military and commercial planes.

If successful this year, the race will be an annual event, with the trophy going permanently to the contestant who wins it twice in succession.

TOURIST CROP FOR 7 MONTHS LESS THAN '31

SALEM, Aug. 11 (AP)—Tourist traffic through Oregon during the month of July fell off 19.3 per cent or 3798 cars when compared with the same month a year ago, according to the non-resident statistics just compiled by the state department.

There were 15,894 registrations made by tourists last month compared to 19,692 in July, 1931.

July 1931, however, was during the past month placed the total number of non-resident permits for the year 6.6 per cent lower than for the first seven months of last year. For the entire seven months of 1932 there has been 50,967 outside cars registered, compared to 54,578 over the same period last year.

Non-resident traffic is expected to be heavy because of the national conventions to be held in this state and the state department predicted the totals for the current year will be more than last season.

Yank Road Tour Ends With Third Of Games Lost

The early August road tours in the major leagues have ended with high honors for the New York Yankees, leaders of the American league, and few, if any, for the Pittsburgh Pirates at the head of the National.

The Yankees came through their trip to the middle west with ten wins out of 15 games. The Cubs, on the other hand, finished with seven victories and 12 defeats. Today they faced the Chicago Cubs in a "crucial" series with a margin of only three percentage points.

While Chicago was kept idle by rain yesterday, Pittsburgh broke its ten-game losing streak with a 5 to 3 victory over the Boston Braves in the first of a double header and thus kept their hold on first place. They followed it by losing a "mental breaker," 3 to 2, when home runs by Berger and Schumacher gave the Braves the decision.

Chicago took two games from the Cincinnati Reds, 6 to 1 and 10 to 9 in 13 innings, to make it 14 victories in 18 starts.

The St. Louis Cardinals completed the downfall of the Phillies with an eleventh inning onslaught that brought six runs and an 11 to 5 victory.

Philadelphia's Athletics captured second place in the American league by defeating the Chicago White Sox, 6 to 3, while rain held Washington and Cleveland idle.

The Yankees, meanwhile, maintained a nine game margin over the A's by slugging out 17 hits, many of them wasted, and taking a 7 to 6 decision from the St. Louis Browns.

Young Tommy Bridges stopped the Boston Red Sox with three hits and hurried Detroit to a 6 to 2 victory.

Fancy Frills May Make Jack A Dull Boy, Young Says

CHICAGO (AP)—Fancy frills may make a dull boy.

The fond parent who dresses her small son, or her little daughter with too many frills, overly conspicuous colors or ill-fitting garments, may be retarding his or her mental progress, in the opinion of Dr. Josephine E. Young, who makes a study of mental diseases in children.

She expressed her belief in addressing a health meeting held under auspices of the Chicago Woman's club.

"The child who is embarrassed because of his peculiarity in his appearance, or whose clothes are uncomfortable, has his attention distracted from constructive mental effort and is thereby unable to make progress," she said.

She also cautioned fathers not to shout at their young sons when they interrupt him while he's reading the newspaper after school.

Drove to Forti to review a group of Italian boys.

Had an interview with Achille Starace, secretary of the Fascist party.

Heard a report from the secretary of the Fascist party for the province of Forli.

Conferred with the director of the newspaper "Popolo di Romagna."
