He does it by buying used boxes from those who have done with them and reselling them to others who need them.

His investment consists of a small office, a large warehouse and a horse and wagon. Thus equipped he handles on an average more than 10,000 wooden boxes a year, selling them for prices ranging from 10 cents to \$1 each.

### INDIANA RELIEF GARDENS AID IN FEEDING UNEMPLOYED

LAFAYETTE, Ind. (AP)—Indiana has turned extensively to relief gardens to feed unemployed and part-time employees. H. E. Young, of Purdue university, has reported.

Fifty communities and 30 industries have projects. These include 7,500 industrial gardens of 1,000 acres, 21 community gardens of 750 acres and 45,000 supervised home gardens of 6,000 acres.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Federal and state statistics disclose that 1850 acres in San Francisco are under agricultural cultivation. Further, the swine herds in the city exceed the size of those in 40 of the other 57 counties in the state. No less than 500 milk cows graze in San Francisco, or more than the herds of Alpine and Mono counties combined, the report said.

### Hoover Refuses To See Writers At White House

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11 (AP)—A delegation of writers representing the national committee for the defense of political prisoners Wednesday called at the White House to protest against President Hoover's part in the eviction of the bonus marchers from the national capital, but were denied admittance to the chief executive's office.

Theodore Joslin, one of the president's secretaries, received the delegation which included Sherwood Anderson, James Harty, and Waldo Frank, and accepted from them a written statement bitterly assailing the use of federal troops against the bonus army.

He said Mr. Hoover was too busy to receive the delegation personally. This result led the writers to attack Mr. Hoover verbally as they left the White House.

While speaking to Joslin, Frank said he knew Mr. Hoover had received petitions, school children and boy scouts carrying birthday greetings and he considered the refusal to meet the writers as "proof that Mr. Hoover holds intellectual opinion in contempt."

He said he accepted the president's action in connection with the bonus army as "proof that when activity by organized groups meets with the president's disapproval it will be met by force."

Anderson stated he had seen "increasing evidence of brutality by small officials" in various parts of the country and believed Mr. Hoover's action would set "a dangerous precedent leading to more brutality."

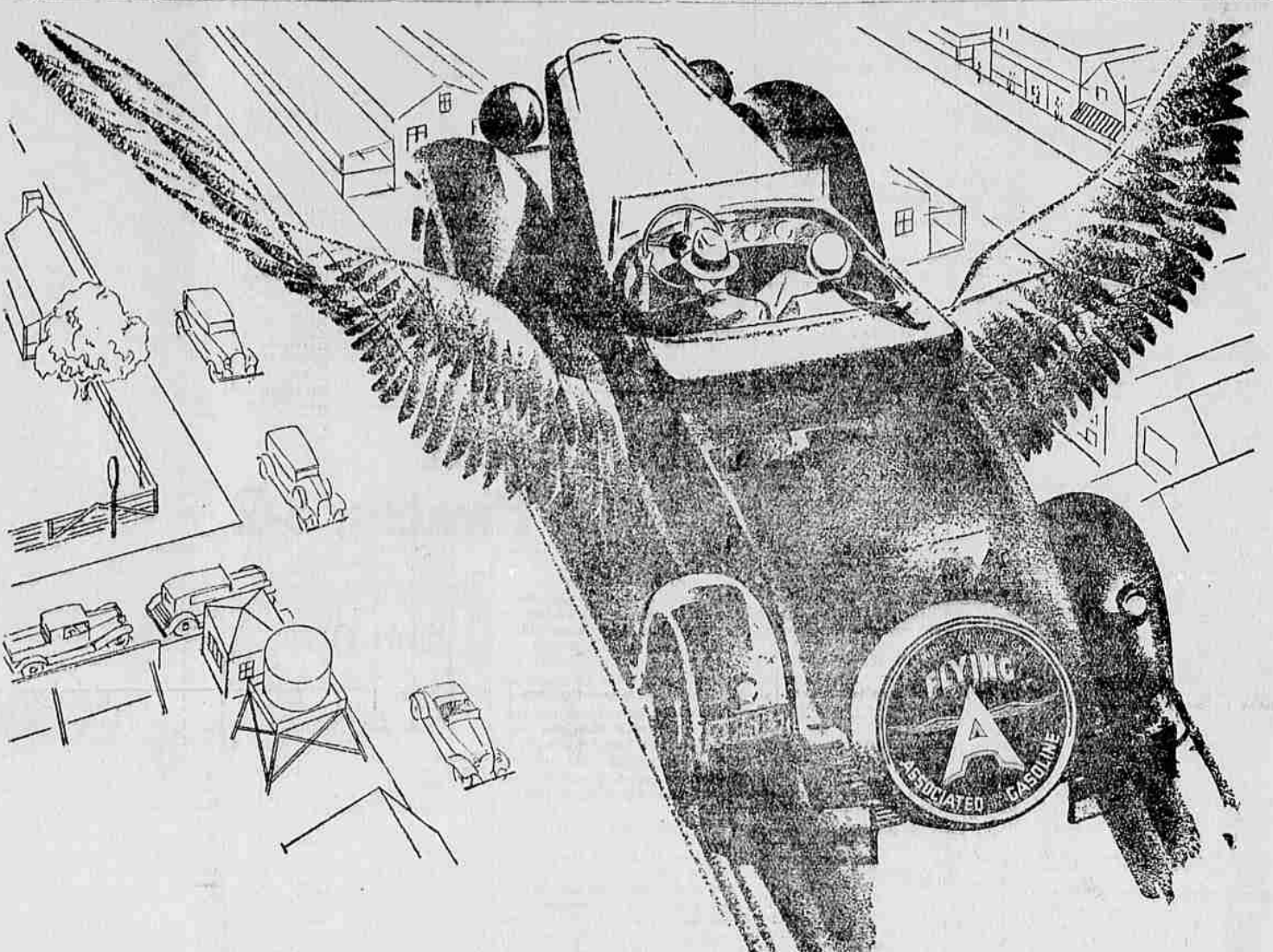
