PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 16 (Sp)—Ralph Hill, Oregon's great distance runner, who won an ovation for superlative sportsmanship in the 5000 meter race in the Olympics, has accepted an invitation to participate in a series of four races in Germany, Hungary and Austria during the fall months...
This announcement was made today by Daniel J. Ferris, of New York, secretary of the amateur athletic union of America, who is visiting in Portland...
Ferris said Hill's selection as a member of the five-man team which the United States will send abroad is tribute to the running ability of the former University of Oregon star, and an appreciation of his sportsmanship, for he could have protested the victory of Lehtinen, the Finn, in the 5000 meter race...
The amateur union official said Lehtinen fouled the Klamath Falls runner during the last 100 yards of the race by blocking him out three times...
The other members of the American team already selected to perform in the European meets are Percy Beard, hurdler; Ralph Metcalfe, sprinter; and Eddie Tolan, sprinter...

CURATIVE POOLS
In connection with treatment following infantile paralysis much has been written about therapeutic or curative pools...
It is interesting to note that such baths have been in use for more than 4,000 years...
Curative baths do not really cure, but assist the body in overcoming disabilities and handicaps. It was found that one can raise body temperature to as high as 106 F. by immersing a patient for 50 minutes in water measuring 108 F. This induces copious perspiration...
The activities of the internal organs and body metabolism are increased. The blood capillaries of the skin and underlying structures become dilated and suffused with blood, thus increasing the nutrition of more remote parts of the body. Toxins are eliminated more actively, and there is a definite increase in the white cells of the blood...
Muscular relaxation is easily secured in these baths. The body is relieved of 95 per cent of the load of gravity. Pain also is reduced...
Therapeutic baths have been shown to be of value in the treatment of nerve injuries and in infantile paralysis. In these conditions there is a marked relief of pain and an increase in blood circulation. Movement of the affected parts is possible with a minimum of strain...
The re-education of musculature debilitated because of a variety of conditions is more easily accomplished in these baths than elsewhere...
Other diseases, too, have been treated effectively in therapeutic pools. Among such conditions are joint diseases, chronic hip cases, and the re-education of muscles after the removal of splints, as in the case of congenital hip dislocation in children...
In addition, therapeutic pools have been found to be of benefit in nervous and mental disorders, in circulatory disturbances where the blood pressure is either too high or too low, and in certain chronic skin conditions...

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., Aug. 16 (Sp)—Russell N. Boardman, transatlantic flier, was seriously injured this afternoon as an airplane he was trying out crashed into the woods near here from a height of 2000 feet...
Boardman was in a semi-conscious condition when taken from the plane and hurried to a hospital...
Later it was reported at Springfield hospital Boardman's condition was "poor" and he was in critical condition. Surgeons were working over him and were not prepared to make any detailed statement as to the injuries...

SEATTLE, Aug. 16 (Sp)—Principles, rather than candidates, will probably form the basis of any political action the Woman's Christian Temperance Union may decide upon, Mrs. Ella A. Boole, of Brooklyn, N. Y., said during the national convention of the organization here Monday...
She recalled that it is not the custom of the union to support candidates. We support principles...
Her statement grew out of the announcement of Dr. Daniel A. Poling, chairman of the allied forces of prohibition, that the groups for which he spoke will support President Hoover for re-election...
"The allied forces is a single organization, not a group," she declared...
Dr. Poling's decision to support President Hoover is merely one group view. I do not see how we can announce a candidate, and I believe we will be followed in this by millions of dry women voters."
