BATTLESHIPS, CRUISERS ON DOOMED LIST

(Continued from Page One) which hold world speed records. Its headquarters will be at Taranto. There will also be an Adriatic squadron of destroyers.

Retirement sounds the death knell of the battleship so far as Italy is concerned. Although the navy is far below the total of 170,000 tons in battleship granted by the Washington treaty...

MANEUVERS COMPLETED The entire Italian navy recently completed the most extensive maneuvers held since the end of the World war. They were designed to test the practicability of bringing transports from the Mediterranean colonies through an enemy line.

It was demonstrated that this could be done, but only at great cost. This drill came shortly after the adjournment of the world disarmament conference at which the Italian delegation submitted a sweeping program for limiting land and sea arms.

Would Reduce Standard The plan struck at the German "pocket battleship," the 22,000-ton French cruiser and the battle fleets of Great Britain and the United States. It would bring all the navies of the world down to Italy's own standard of 10,000-ton cruisers.

The memorandum presented to the conference did not mention ratios between countries, or parity with France, but it reaffirmed the four points which Italy laid down at Geneva last February. These related to land and sea armaments and provided for abolition of heavy artillery and tanks, battleships, submarines, airplane carriers, bombing aircraft, and chemical and bacteriological warfare.

The memorandum also demanded government control of civil aviation. The memorandum recommended that disarmament be accompanied by revision of the laws governing warfare and by adequate measure for control of civil aviation.

This memorandum was tabled by the general conference for consideration by separate committees of experts. Subsequently, when President Hoover presented his proposal for a general reduction of about one-third in the world's arms, Italy was among the first to express approval.

Fingerprint experts of the Portland police bureau said today they found a record for Moore in the local files. In February, 1931, they said, he drew a two-year jail sentence on a larceny charge in Frankfort, Ky., and was paroled after serving 12 months.

May, the officers said, he served 20 days in Ventura, Cal., on a vagrancy charge, and on a similar complaint in Sacramento the same month, drew a suspended sentence.

A priest, summoned by detectives at Moore's request, spent considerable time with him late Tuesday. The prisoner refused to talk about the Hilgard shooting.

TO ARRIVE HERE TONIGHT Arrival of the two detectives and their prisoner in La Grande was not expected before late tonight, and it was held unlikely that Moore would be questioned before tomorrow.

TRADE BALANCE FAVORABLE LAST MONTH, REPORT (Continued from Page One) totaled \$260,453,000, or excess of imports totaled \$258,555,000.

Silver exports last July were \$826,000 and imports \$1,288,000, an import excess of \$462,000. In July 1931 silver exports were \$2,305,000 and imports \$1,683,000, an export excess of \$622,000.

For the first seven months of 1932 silver valued at \$9,098,000 was exported, while imports totaled \$13,041,000, imports exceeding exports by \$3,943,000.

During the same period last year silver exports were \$17,080,000, and imports \$15,896,000, or an export excess of \$1,184,000.

A. T. & T. CO. PAYS DIVIDEND NEW YORK, Aug. 17 (AP)—The American Telephone & Telegraph Co. dividend record was kept inviolate today when directors declared the regular quarterly payment of \$2.25 a share.

The company, which ranks as America's premier public utility, is one of the few of the nation's first rank corporations which have maintained their regular dividend course against the onslaught of business adversity since 1929.

Standard Oil of New Jersey, American Can, American Tobacco, R. J. Reynolds, National Biscuit and some of electric power companies are others which take rank in this group.

U. S. steel, General Motors corporation and all but one of the big railroads, Chesapeake & Ohio, have been forced to either reduce or in many cases to omit payment of their regular common dividends.

The decision of the directors to continue the regular payments, in the face of decreased earnings, was widely interpreted in financial quarters as indicating expectations of improved business over the next several months.

The dividend is payable October 15 to stock of record September 20. No formal statement was issued by the management.

DISCOUNT RATE REDUCED TOKYO, Aug. 17 (AP)—The bank of Japan reduced its discount rate today from 5.11 to 4.38 per cent.

LOUIS LANG DIES PORTLAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—Louis Lang, 66, last of the Lang brothers who for many years operated a wholesale grocery firm here and were prominently identified with the growth of the state, died at his home early today.

He had been seriously ill for three days following a heart attack. His widow, Mrs. Grace H. Lang, survives. Within the past few years his brothers, I. Lang, Henry, Julius and Edward died in Portland.

Franklin P. Walker Dies in Portland PORTLAND, Aug. 17 (AP)—Franklin Pierce Walker, 80, for many years prominently identified with Republican politics in Oregon, died at his home here yesterday.

He had been ill only a few days. Despite his age, Walker continued active in political life, and last week attended a meeting of the Republican central committee here.

The request was made after the jury deliberated two hours and twenty minutes and was denied when Defense Counsel James M. Carson, declined to agree to grant the request.

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VIENNA, Aug. 17 (AP)—By a vote of 81 to 80, parliament today ratified the Lausanne loan protocol.

By this protocol Austria receives \$42,000,000 under the auspices of the league of nations. Most of it will go to conversion of short term notes held by the bank for international settlements, and loans from the Bank of England into long term obligations.
