And he arose and rebuked the wind, and said unto the sea, Peace be still. Mark 4:39

Conditions today have come to the point where many men believe—honestly believe—that the teachings of Christ cannot be carried into business, and certainly not into politics or the management of public affairs. So they have a religion for week-days, and another which they keep carefully brushed and folded and put away for Sundays. And the man who has only the one kind, and tries to use it on week-days as well as on Sundays, knows what the storm on the Sea of Galilee was like. There are the fears and the doubts, like the evil breath of the helms, sweeping down upon him. "Is it worth it? Does it pay? Can Providence care for me—does the Lord even know? Isn't He asleep there, utterly unaware of my difficulties? Why not forget religion, and get into the swim, make my pile, and then give some attention to the church?" And so forth.

If any man thinks that it is not a real storm, let him try it—and stick to his principles through thick and thin. Let any man, any woman, honestly seek to cross to the other side with his or her religion, and carry it into actual practice in business, in the home, wherever he or she goes in life, and they will know what a storm means. And it will be such a storm as they themselves cannot still. Only when the Master stands at the prow of their little vessel, and cries, "Peace be still!" will the evil spirits who arouse that storm cease their efforts and the soul find peace.

LUMBER MARKET
SEATTLE, Aug. 19 (AP)—With only 112 mills out of 321 reporting to the West Coast Lumbermen's association operating, production for the week ending August 13 was 19.8 per cent of capacity, a gain of one tenth of one per cent over the previous week, and compared with 38 per cent for the same week last year.

A total of 216 mills reported current new business was 23 per cent over production and shipments were 15.7 per cent over production. Inventories reported by 144 mills decreased \$287,000 feet from the week ending August 6 and were 23.2 per cent less than at the same time last year.

AUGUST DINNER MENU

Broiled Lamb Chops Potatoes Samsoet
Buttered Corn
Jelly Pin Wheels Butter
Head Lettuce Russian Dressing
Jam Cake Coffee

Potatoes Samsoet. Serving 6
4 cups hot mashed potatoes.
1 tablespoon butter.
1/4 teaspoon paprika.
1/4 teaspoon celery salt.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
2 tablespoons milk.
1 egg yolk.
2 tablespoons chopped pimientos.
2 egg whites, beaten.
Mix potatoes, butter, paprika, celery salt, salt and milk. Beat one minute. Add rest of ingredients. Roughly pile in buttered baking dish and bake 20 minutes in moderate oven.

Jelly Pin Wheels
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
4 tablespoons lard.
2 1/2 cup milk.
2 tablespoons butter.
4 tablespoons jelly.
Mix flour, baking powder and salt. Cut in lard with knife. Mixing with knife, slowly add milk. When soft dough forms, pat it out until it is 1-3 inch thick. Spread with butter and jelly. Quickly roll up and with a sharp knife cut off 1/4 inch slices. Arrange flat side up in greased baking pan. Bake 12 minutes.

Russian Dressing
(For lettuce or vegetable salads)
1/2 cup mayonnaise.
2 tablespoons chili sauce.
2 tablespoons catsup.
2 tablespoons chopped ripe olives.
2 tablespoons chopped dill pickles.
Mix ingredients. Chill. When ready to serve, beat with fork and pour over salads.

Jam Cake
1/2 cup fat.
1 cup sugar.
2 eggs.
1/2 cup sour milk.
1/2 cup jam.
1 teaspoon cinnamon.
1 teaspoon cloves.
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.
1/2 teaspoon vanilla.
1/2 cup flour.
1/2 teaspoon soda.
1 teaspoon baking powder.
Cream fat and sugar. Add rest of ingredients and beat two minutes. Pour into loaf pan fitted with waxed paper. Bake 50 minutes.

Fewer Fires In Northwest This Summer, Report

PORTLAND, Ore. (Special)—Greater carelessness on the part of the forest-using public, combined with favorable weather and an efficient forest protection organization, has resulted in substantial savings in the fire fighting costs on the 22 national forests of Oregon and Washington, thus contributing to the federal economy program.

The report just issued by the regional forester here, covering the period up to August 10, shows that last year there were 848 fires started, as compared with 457 for the present year. There were 179 lightning fires for this period last year, as against 133 this year. Up to August 10, 1931, there were 869 man-caused fires, while in 1932 there were only 324. Careless smokers are charged with 128 of the 1932 fires, and campers with 95, the 1931 figures being smokers 232 and campers 128.

The campaign of rigid law enforcement against maliciously set fires is apparently showing results, 1931 being charged with 165 incendiary fires, with but 78 in 1932 to date.

For the period covered by the report, 1931 shows 36.44 acres of national forest land burned over. This acreage is reduced to 10,038 acres in 1932. The cost of fire fighting this year is \$46,897, as against \$238,115 last year.

Quick and effective action on the part of the forest service crews has resulted in holding most of the fires under 10 acres each, only 99 out of the 457 exceeding this size. A few large fires, principally on the Whitman and Siskiyou forests, account for

most of the acreage burned. A total of 320 of this year's fires have been held to under one quarter of an acre, it is said.

All forest service fires this season are being handled by regularly employed road and trail or special crews, according to the regional forester.

In commenting on the favorable showing this year, foresters point out that there are yet several weeks in which dangerous fire weather could occur. A few days of hot weather and low humidity, a little public carelessness, and there would be grave danger and costly fires.
