KENSO NUSHIDA HAS HARD LUCK; PORTLAND LOSES

ROCKFORD, Ill., Aug. 25 (AP)—The battle for the western amateur golf championship roared on today with the defending titleholder out of the picture and stars from Illinois, Iowa, California, Wisconsin and Texas still in the drive.

Only one thing was sure in the struggle over the rolling hills of the Rockford country club layout and that was that Illinois would have a finalist. By fate of the numerical draw and golfing class, the entire lower bracket was jammed exclusively by Illinois entries. Three of them came from Chicago while the fourth was Don Armstrong of Aurora.

Arthur Bartlett, of Ottumwa, was probably the most discussed entry in the surviving field. The 42-year-old Iowa veteran, who had won 35 minor golf championships in his quarter-century of play, defeated Charles "Chick" Evans Jr., of Chicago, yesterday, two-up after the Chicago veteran had eliminated the defending titleholder, Don Moe, of Portland, Ore., in the first engagement of the match play battle.

CHICAGO GOLFERS GATHER PARK IN MARATHON FEATS

CHICAGO (AP)—You've heard of endurance feats on the golf links, but this is the story of a Chicago golfer who combines skill with his golfing marathons.

Frank Nelson set out to break his own record of 108 holes played in one day, with this result:

He covered a 6,300-yard course nearly seven times in a single day, finishing 117 holes, making 45 holes in par, capturing three birdies, and averaging 84 for 18 holes.

He covered the distance of approximately 30 miles in eight hours, 45 minutes.

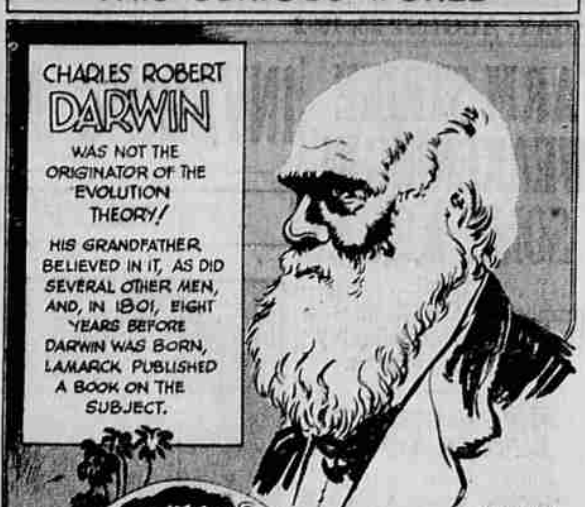
CHICAGO BEARS TO THROW 276-FOUNDER INTO LINE

CHICAGO (AP)—The Chicago Bears this fall expect to display the biggest linesman in the National Professional Football league.

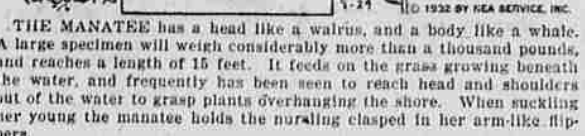

Annual Aviation Classic Will Be Staged at Cleveland Starting Aug. 27

CLEVELAND (AP)—The 1932 curtain on the national air annual aviation classic, will be rung up by derby fliers heading for Cleveland over lanes covering nearly half the states in the union.

America's carnival of aerial sport and speed will take place August 27-September 5, but, for several days before the official airport opening, planes on both coasts will be going through their speed paces and then start their dashes for arrival on the inaugural day.

Four derbies, one starting from the west coast, another being divided into Pacific and Atlantic wings, and two starting in the east will make up the program for cross-country fliers.

First competitive blood will be drawn by the national handicap sweepstakes derby, starting August 21 from Washington, D. C., and Los Angeles, Cal.

Fliers Meet in Oklahoma
A common rendezvous has been arranged in Bartlesville, Okla., the Pacific wing heading from Los Angeles over a route including Yuma and Tucson, Ariz., El Paso, Tex., Roswell, N. M., and Lubbock and Abilene, Tex. The Atlantic wing will head from the national capital by way of Winston-Salem, N. C., Spartanburg, S. C., Atlanta, Ga., Birmingham, Ala., Jackson, Miss., and Shreveport, La.

From the merging point the two wings will proceed together to Cleveland by way of Jefferson City, Mo., East St. Louis, Ill., Indianapolis, Ind., Cincinnati and Akron.

Each Lap a Complete Race
All planes will be rated with a speed handicap and each city-to-city dash a complete race in itself with points awarded on each performance. Cash prizes totaling nearly \$10,000, in addition to lap prizes, will make up the derby purse. Mrs. Phoebe Omile, Memphis, Tenn., aviatrix, was the 1931 winner of the sweepstakes award.

Official entries in the eastern wing include Joe Fields, Bradford, Pa., Cecil Coffrin, Brooklyn, W. P. Cummings, Donaldsonville, Ga., and Henry Brown, Washington, D. C., while in the western wing will be Bob Buck, youthful, Westfield, N. J., flier, Russell Jace, Cleveland, Roy Hunt, Norman, Okla., and Jean LaRene and Jack Berke, Dallas. Scores of others are expected.

Two derbies will mark the opening day of the national classic, the second annual amateur air pilot cruise proceeding from Washington, D. C., to Cleveland by way of Columbus, O., and a handicap race from Roosevelt field, N. Y., bringing owners of private planes into competition.

Alan Eustis, New York banker, will be defending champion in the amateur race.

The race will be for a trophy and a cash purse of \$2,000. Planes will be flagged off on the basis of official handicaps, the slowest starting first.

The high-speed contest of the cross-country program will be the Bendix trophy race from Los Angeles, a free-for-all dash limited to a single day's flight. The distance is more than 2,000 miles, and an added purse of \$2,500 awaits the pilot who can land in Cleveland and continue on to New York in new record time for the transcontinental dash.

Maj. James H. Doolittle, who won the race with an average speed of 223 miles an hour in 1931 and continued on to New York to establish a transcontinental record of 11 hours and 16 minutes, is the defending champion.

CUBS VICTORIOUS OVER BROOKLYN

Dodgers Repulsed in Yesterday's Encounter in Chicago 7 to 4.

Victorious in their first engagement with Brooklyn's storm troops, the Chicago Cubs dug in behind a four and one-half game lead today and prepared to deal another blow for the cause—a bigger and better world series on the shores of Lake Michigan.

The Dodgers, who invaded the west with high hopes of crashing through the Cubs barrage and again making a race out of the National league, were repulsed in yesterday's encounter, 7 to 4. What was more, they didn't look at all like a team that might ever stop the Chicago pennant drive.

Three of their pitchers, including the brilliant Van Mungo, were pounded for 10 hits, and their fielding was spotty. The Cubs, led by Billy Herman with three rousing hits, made six of their hits good for extra bases and secured the game with a four-run drive in the fourth inning.

Charley Root, after a wobbly first frame, settled down and held the Dodgers at bay until the seventh, when Bob Smith went in and finished the job.

Pittsburgh Losses
Pittsburgh failed to take advantage of Brooklyn's reverse, losing to the Phillies, 9 to 6, and remaining in third place. The Pirates started well, scoring six times in the first two innings, but from there on it was a picnic for the slugging Phils.

Dizzy Dean did an admirable job of beating the Giants. The Cards' eccentric star yielded only five hits and drove in four runs with a home run and a single. Pepper Martin was his little helper, hitting two doubles and a single and stealing a base.

Boston and Cincinnati played a dicey race at the start of the season, the Braves winning the first, 5 to 2, and the Reds squaring matters, 3 to 1, behind Larry Benton's noble pitching.

Jim Leary of the St. Louis Browns pitched a homerun with one on in the eleventh inning to defeat the Athletics, 5 to 3. Homeruns by McNair, Dykes and Fox accounted for all the A's runs.

Monie Weaver's pitching and Johnny Kerr's timely hitting gave Washington a 2 to 1 verdict over Detroit. Kerr knocked across both the winners, rana as Weaver scored his fifth victory.

Pitcher Ted Lyons scored a personal triumph over the Boston Red Sox 7 to 3. In addition to keeping nine hits off the Sox, the White Sox star drove in three runs with a double and two singles and scored once.

A similar achievement was credited to Charley Ruffing of the Yankees, who racked up his 15th victory as the expense of the Cleveland Indians, 9 to 3. He pitched eight-hit ball and started at bat with a brace of doubles and a single.
