

'Westward Ho' To Depict Trek Of Early Pioneers

PENDLETON, Ore. (Special) — "Westward Ho!" This cry ran up and down the east bank of the lower Mississippi river early in the nineteenth century as wagon trains rolled slowly west into a land whose gold was reflected in the setting sun.

This trek of courageous pioneers to the west has an echo in "Westward Ho!", the parade which is one of the features of the Pendleton Round-Up, Sept. 8, 9 and 10. In this spectacle of western history there passes in review a life of the plains; the covered wagons, which carried their precious burden of women and children; out-riders of the wagon trains on whose vigilance depended the life of every person in the little traveling community; Indians in bright war paint, whose spears doted the western trails with graves, and stage coaches which later careened over these same high-ways carrying gold bullion and adventurous travelers.

Westward Ho parade will be held Saturday, last day of the Round-Up, and as it swings past will present to view a cross section of life when the west was the great adventure.

Some of the coaches appearing in the parade were in active service on the old trails as early as 1850. These were owned by the Round-Up association and preserved for their historical value.

The Round-Up this year has added significance in the fact that representatives of the American Legion from all parts of the United States will stop off here for the western epic on their way to Portland for the national convention of the legion, September 12-15.

The best riders, ropers and steer bulldozers of the country have been signed up to take part in this year's Round-Up. These are headed by Bob Crosby, Jake McClure and Ike Rude, leaders among the champions of the arena. Other names which will give

prestige to the Round-Up this year are Hugh Bennett, Earl Thode, Richard Merchant, Carl Arnold, Hugh Strickland, Dick Trutt, Pete Knight, Chuck Wilson, Bob Askin, Lloyd Saunders and Ed Purdee. Just a few of the 250 men and women contestants for the \$20,000 in prizes. A string of fifty notorious bucking horses will be present to argue with these famous top hands.

According to advices from railroad officials special trains are being chartered in the east to bring the legions to the Pacific slope and will stop over in Pendleton for at least one afternoon of the Round-Up. These trains are coming from as far west as New Jersey, according to present information. Conservative estimates place the number of legions coming to the Round-Up, by train and auto, at 1000.
