"And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thy hands, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes. And thou shalt write them on the posts of thy house and upon thy gates." Deut. 6:8-9. The "commandments, the statutes, and the judgments" of the Lord were the things to be so written. While it does not appear that the Israelites did so, their descendants, the Jews, took this command literally, and actually enclosed the written laws of Jehovah in little boxes and tied them to their hands and foreheads. This, in itself, did no harm provided it helped them to cherish the law in their hearts, for only this could any virtue be derived from them.

Lutheran Church Makes Arrangements For Interesting Evening—Other Programs Listed.
