can remember," young Sorrell told police. The youth made no resistance to arrest and was outwardly calm while describing family affairs which "worried me all the time." He said his father was cruel to his mother and sisters.

The father lies critically ill at a Salem hospital and the son is being held on a charge of assault with intent to kill.

Annoyed by Radio.
Mrs. Sorrell told police that her husband had a violent temper and last night after going to bed about 9 o'clock was apparently annoyed by radio music which Melvin had turned on, for he dressed and left, slamming the back door.

Young Sorrell informed officers that he stationed himself in front of the house and began shooting when his father entered the yard. The shots were fired in rapid succession from the .38 caliber revolver, inflicting two wounds in the father's back, one in the abdomen and three in the left arm. The remaining cartridge in the gun was fired into the ground a short distance from the father, Albert Green, an eye witness, stated. Green said Melvin paced up and down the sidewalk until police arrived, muttering, "He'll never beat up on her again."

The gun was kept by the father in a dresser drawer and was always loaded, Mrs. Sorrell stated.

Young Sorrell was graduated from high school in Aberdeen, Wash., where his father served as a police officer. Sorrell also served in the same capacity at Port Townsend.

the case he alone made an extended statement last night. He said it was not surprising that Walker resigned because he (Walker) "simply could not explain." He praised Governor Roosevelt's conduct of the hearing.

"Mr. Walker had no defense," Seabury said. "It was conclusively proved that he enriched himself as the result of his majority."

"The elimination of Mr. Walker as mayor of this city is a distinct victory for higher standards of public life, and in the elevation of this standard Governor Roosevelt did much to contribute by reason of the manner in which he conducted the hearing."

To Resume Inquiry
Before falling last night, Seabury announced he would resume the inquiry after Nov. 15.

The continued investigation, he said, will be devoted to the assembling of evidence designed to build up, rather than tear down, the city government, and his findings will be in the nature of "recommendations for change in the laws relating to the city charter."

There was still considerable doubt as to whether Walker could run for election in November. Legal experts were understood to have agreed a special election must be held in November to fill the vacancy.

This opinion held that the special election would include the offices of mayor, president of the board of aldermen, and alderman from the ninth district. The aldermanic presidency was made vacant by the elevation of Joseph V. McKee, who held that post, to the mayoral chair. The ninth district aldermanic vacancy has been created by the elevation of Dennis Maho to McKee's old post.

Reports Unconfirmed
Reports that Tammany Hall had made a definite commitment to name Walker to run in November for the one year remaining of the term lacked confirmation. John H. McGoey, leader of Brooklyn Democrats, said it had not been "fully decided" that Walker could run again.

There was talk, too, of a fusion ticket aimed at the defeat of Walker should he run and the wresting of control of the city government from Tammany Hall.

The former mayor, worn from the strain of the hearings at Albany, remained in seclusion.

Mr. Combs is reported to have said that 800 names are needed to call a special election to recall the mayor. Names needed must equal 25 per cent of the vote cast in the city for state supreme court justice at the last general election.

The clerk is allowed under the law one day to check each 200 names. If the required number of names has been secured and the signers are qualified the mayor will be given five days in which to resign. If he refuses the city clerk must call a special election to be held within 20 days.

If the mayor is recalled the other two commissioners will appoint a successor to serve until the next general election.

Fishing Is Good Now in Wallowa, Imnaha Rivers

With a two-day holiday before them, many La Grande anglers are planning trips into the mountains for fishing, hunting and camping. For excellent fishing, the La Grande branch of the O. M. K. association suggests the larger river of the Imnaha and the Wallowa, and the high mountain lakes.

Wallowa lake is one of the leading fishing and camping spots of North-east Oregon, offering a variety of sports and scenery. The Lostine river, out of Lostine, also is one of the beauty spots which offers ideal camping spots besides excellent fishing. The river leads into the high mountain lakes in the Wallowa basin—Aneroid, Ice lake and others. The lake basin also is accessible by the Wallowa Lake route.

The lower Grande Ronde river offers opportunity to the fisherman. It is said, an ideal spot being near Troy which is reached via Enterprise and Flora or Wallowa town. Enterprise is the gateway to the Imnaha country, leaving the highway between there and Joseph and following a well marked road into the river country. The Imnaha furnishes fish for the fisherman, while the nearby hills furnish grouse in profusion for the hunters. It is reported. Good grouse hunting is found between Troy and Flora, also, and the majority of hunters return with the limit, four in one day or eight in any long is comparatively easy.

The best grouse hunting reported to be a mark of 400-900 miles an hour in the vicinity of Buckhorn and Cold Spring in the Imnaha country. The so-called Imnaha river branches and one leads to Imnaha and the other to the springs. However, if campers are not familiar with the position of the springs they are urged to take their own water.

The grouse are now coming from the bottoms to the ridges, and hunting is comparatively easy.

Fishing is not very good in the upper Grande Ronde river which is now very low.

In America, it will build yet others to come and thus add to the safety and stability of our institutions."

Referring to the inability of building and loan associations to redeem the mortgages they held, Senator Watson said "we have never had sufficiently free capital in this country to finance on a proper scale home building and home-owning."

Only Resort Left
"Many times," he continued, "the home builder has been compelled to resort to a second mortgage, the terms of which usually are so drastic and at times so exorbitant that they make it exceedingly difficult for the home builder to succeed with his enterprise."

Under the home loan banks, the building and loan associations will be enabled to "do business on a proper scale," he declared, explaining that these banks will advance money to the associations on mortgages they hold, thus relieving the buyer who is unable to meet monthly payments on his loan.

An increase in home-building and a marked recovery in the automobile industry are at hand, the convention was told by Dr. C. O. Hardy, of the Brookings institute, Washington, D. C.

Dr. Hardy saw encouragement in the rising prices of stocks and bonds, saying these "always improve first after a crisis."

Today's average bettered the unofficial mark of 293.193 miles an hour Doolittle set Wednesday during the eclipse and was well above the 282.673 miles an hour in an official test with a biograph Thursday.

Before the new record can become official, the biograph must be calibrated and the mark homologated by the federation aeronautique internationale, world governing body of sporting aviation, Paris, France.

While the flier's feat shaded the existing record, he was still far short of the maximum air speed record, Lieutenant G. H. Stainforth, having set a mark of 400-900 miles an hour in a seaplane in 1931 at Lee on Solent, England.

Two Planes Collide
Johnny Miller, of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and Al Wilson, Hollywood, Cal., today collided in front of the grandstands for the second major crackup in two days at the national air races.

Wilson flying his model of a 180 pusher airplane, and Miller, in an autogyro, were staging a demonstration of the old and new in aviation. The condition of the two pilots was not determined.

The announcer informed the audience that Miller was unhurt but Wilson was unconscious.

Wilson, apparently badly injured, was taken to the emergency field hospital. His seat in the plane was entirely open to the air and there was nothing to absorb the shock of the impact.

Woman Misses Record
Because she flew diagonally across the measured straightaway, Mrs. Mae Hester, wife of the transcontinental speed king, was defeated today in her attempt to set a new women's air-plane speed record.

She averaged 231.639 miles an hour, 21,003 miles an hour in excess of the mark set April 13, 1931, by Ruth Nichols, Rye, N. Y., society flier.

A brisk wind blew across the course, causing her to "crab" her plane, but her inability to keep to the straightaway was believed by timers to have been due to her mistaking the correct pylons.

Her plane was the same in which her husband set a new west-east transcontinental record of ten hours and 19 minutes Monday and which he flew today over the heavy kilometer distance at 256.44 miles an hour for the four lap average.
