BARTH FOOLS HOME FOLKS BY VICTORY AT OLYMPICS

CLEVELAND (AP)—Even the Cleveland sport fans were fooled when Carmen Barth—a good Italian name, Di Bartholomeo, appears over his doorbell here—tucked away the midweight boxing championship at the Olympics.
Though he had been fighting for four years and had more than 60 engagements to his credit, including some that had taken him to three city welterweight titles and one state welter crown, few saw in him a world's amateur champion when he boarded the train here for California.
Barth is only 19 and weighs 152 pounds. It was Stella Walsh upon whom Cleveland relied to bring home titles, but her points went to the Polish team, and it was Barth who brought home the city's only Olympic championship.

Society Protests Against Oregon Fair "Bull Fight"

SALEM, Sept. 8 (AP)—Officers of the Oregon humane society were here Wednesday to protest to Max Gehlhar the use of animals in the rodeo scheduled for the state fair the latter part of month and particularly against the advertised "bull fight" to be held nightly during the fair.
The officials declared state money should not be used for such purposes. Gehlhar, director of the department of agriculture and in charge of the fair, informed the delegation the state money was used for premiums only and that receipts would provide the entertainment. He further informed them the "bull fight" was an exhibition and no injuries would result to animals or men.
