

Babe Ruth In; May Have Appendicitis; Leaves Club Suddenly

PENNANT-BOUND YANKS CRIPPLED BY HIS ATTACK

Possibility Exists That New York May Enter World Series Without King of Swat

DETROIT, Sept. 8 (AP)—The pennant-bound New York Yankees today were without the services of their premier slugger, Babe Ruth, who left suddenly for New York last night, explaining to Manager Joe McCarthy in a long distance telephone call that he was ill.

Mark Roth, club secretary, said Ruth told McCarthy, who had remained in Buffalo, N. Y., over the open date, that he had been seized with severe abdominal pains and feared he had appendicitis.

In New York, Roth said, the Babe will be examined and treated by the club physician. In the absence of definite information, neither Roth nor Arthur Fletcher, Yankees coach, would discuss the possibility that the club might have to go into the world series without its famous home run hitter.

Ruth's departure, accompanied by his wife, was so unexpected that neither Roth nor Fletcher, who were in charge of the team during McCarthy's absence, knew of it until an hour and a half later.

The Yankees open a five game series here today with a double header against the Tigers.

Resting comfortably

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 8 (AP)—Babe Ruth, returning hurriedly to New York from Detroit where he was taken suddenly ill yesterday, was reported resting comfortably when his train passed through Buffalo early this morning.

He was expected to report to the Yankees' physician upon his arrival today in New York.

Even though the Cubs and the Pirates are keeping the National League pennant race steamed up so that they almost monopolize the fans' attention, there still is time to consider the case of Charles Fred "Red" Lucas of Cincinnati.

In his seventh season with the Reds, Lucas appears to have reverted to the days when a pitcher was expected to play almost as often as an outfielder.

The husky redhead, who has fallen below the 300 mark in games won and lost only once in his six seasons with a usually weak club, may repeat in that respect again this year as he seems certain to lead them all in the matter of finishing what he starts.

Lucas has started 39 games so far and he has been in there at the end of 27 of them. He ran up a string

of 18 complete games in a row, failed twice in a short time in mid July and since then has made a new string of eight. Unfortunately for his record, he has won only 13 games and lost 15.

Lucas took it on the chin again yesterday although he hurled a fairly good game against the Giants. He had a 5-3 margin in the seventh inning then ran into a home run assault that brought three runs and cost him the decision.

The woes that usually greet the leading clubs of the west when they start their final trip of the season turned up on schedule time. Chicago's league-leading Cubs ran into grief in Boston and took a double defeat from the Braves, 11 to 4, and 2 to 0.

The Pirates clipped one game off Chicago's lead by splitting a two-py program with Brooklyn. They had no trouble winning their 11th straight game, 8 to 3 as they drove Van Mungo to cover in the first inning of the opener. Freddy Heimach's porridge hurling proved a bit too much in the nightcap and Brooklyn won, 4 to 2. Heimach gave only seven hits.

Dizzy Dean, who had won his last four games for St. Louis, also felt the effects of going on the road and lost a 5 to 3 encounter to the Phillies. There were no American League games scheduled.

Portland Golfers Are Preparing For National Amateur

BALTIMORE, Sept. 8 (AP)—Maurice J. McCarthy Jr., one of the United States Walker cup youngsters who helped to turn back a British invader at Brookline last week, led his teammates and opponents to the five farms for practice for the national amateur tournament opening next Monday.

McCarthy arrived yesterday and played nine holes. He kept no card, but his partner, Eugene Romans, finished in the 1930 tournament at Philadelphia, turned in a 35. The other members of the United States and British Walker cup teams were expected today.

Low scores for the day's play was reported by Johnny Robbins of Portland, Ore., who had 72, two over par, considered remarkable for the strong northwest wind blowing over the course his fellow townsmen and a partner, Frank Delip, registered a 37 on the homeward nine.

Sam Perry of Birmingham, Frank C. Stevens Jr. of Hollywood, and John E. Hines of Garden City, L. I., each got a 75.

STEELE BEATS DAVE VELASCO IN SEATTLE

SEATTLE, Sept. 8 (AP)—After chalking up his 22nd consecutive victory with a win over David Velasco, Mexican City, last night, Freddie Steele, straight-punching, Tacoma lightweight, plans to leave tonight to seek fame and fortune in California and the East.

Steele's manager, Dave Miller, Tacoma, announced that he would take the youngster, who is fast developing into a middleweight, on his first road trip in the near future.

The sober-faced Tacoma boy who packs a knockout wallop in either hand is rated as the best American welterweight in the Northwest. He has cleaned up the boxers of his weight in this region and intends to go after bigger game this winter.

Steele scored a clean-cut decision over Velasco in six rounds, winning three and drawing in the other three. He twice rocked the Mexican with body blows but was unable to connect with his knockout swings, the clever Velasco bobbing away from them. Steele scaled 140 and Velasco 145½.

Canto Robledo, Los Angeles featherweight, put on a great finishing rally to gain the verdict over Hilo Hernandez, Mexican City, in six rounds. The Mexican took an early lead but Robledo punished him with a steady stream of body smashes in the last three rounds. The decision was unpopular with the fans.

Sammy Santos, Seattle lightweight, knocked out Teddy Fox, Portland in the first round of a scheduled four round bout.

MRS. DRUMHELLER DIES

SEATTLE, Sept. 8 (AP)—Mrs. Roscoe M. Drumheller, the former Hazel Jaycox, member of a pioneer Walla Walla family, died suddenly at a hospital here last night after she had been ill less than 48 hours. She was the wife of the Democratic national committee man for Washington.

The Drumhellers were married in 1904 and came here from Walla Walla 18 or 20 years ago.

MAN KILLED BY SNAG

PARIS, Sept. 8 (AP)—Happy over their twelve victories in Los Angeles, the French Olympic team came home with a stock of tales about America and Americans.

Philippe Cattiau, a member of the fencing squad said, "American cooking is really delectable."

"America," said Jacques Lebrun, yachting champion, "is the country of the automobile; and a machine for \$3."

Rene Bondoux, young attorney, also a member of the fencing squad, described an American as "a man who believes he is always in a hurry."

What struck the entire French squad was American discipline. They recounted many stories about the orderliness by which the Olympic games were ruled and how pedestrians crossed the street on police signals.

Davis Cup School New French Plan To Beat Off U. S.

PARIS (AP)—After receiving the biggest scare in the recent challenge round since French forces won the Davis cup five years ago, the French Lawn Tennis federation has decided to open a school to develop future Cochet, Borotra and Lacoste.

Announcement that tennis classes will be held next spring for 20 or 25 of the country's most promising young players was made by Max Decugis, president of the technical committee of the federation.

The course will consist of lessons in tennis strategy, competition with superior players and a routine of physical culture, exercises. A tennis film made by William T. Tilden II, great American Davis cup player of past years, will be used in the instruction.

As an inducement for promising youngsters to enter, students will receive special consideration in the selections for European tournaments.

Victory of Ellsworth Vines, youthful American champion, over the great Henri Cochet in the challenge round this year, is one of the chief factors back of the federation's determination to create a new set of stars.

The two singles victories of Jean Borotra, which combined with Cochet's triumph over Wilmer Allison resulted in keeping the cup for France, cannot be repeated in 1933, tennis followers here are confident.

Ewing Kemper, 17, lost the Nashville city golf championship when he blew a 15-inch putt on the 37th hole.

Grid Talent At U. C. L. A. Good; Big Year Likely

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8 (AP)—Increased assets in grid talent collected from the 1931 freshman team has all but relieved the football depression which has worried athletic heads at the University of California at Los Angeles since the Bruins moved to the fast company of the Pacific conference.

Although a bit puzzled about who will fill the hole at fullback left vacant by the graduation of Captain Norman Duncan, and who will protect the two flanks now that his star ends are gone, Coach Bill Spaulding is optimistic in the face of the latest conference schedule in the history of U. C. L. A.

"We are going to be pretty tough," Spaulding admitted with a grin. "We are going out to get some victories and it looks as though we have the best chance we ever had."

Strong Last Year

Spaulding's team stepped out of the moral victory class last fall when it handed St. Mary's its only intercollegiate defeat of the season, 12 to 0, and then went on to win an inter-sectional title from Florida, 13 to 3.

Under present plans, Joe Keable, southpaw halfback of last year, probably will step into Duncan's place. It was Keable who sent Florida back home in defeat. Coach Spaulding's best ends appear to be Bill Maxwell, a junior who was out much of last year because of injuries, and Walter Muller, a graduate from the freshman ranks.

An impressive list of other players will be competing for these wing positions left vacant by the graduation of Dick Mulhaupt and Leonard Weilandorf, two of the finest ends on the coast.

Half a dozen ex-fresh stand in line as probable members of the first and second elevens. Besides Muller at end, Walter Clark, a halfback, and Fard Boyer, a scrappy guard, appear as likely first string men, and Mike Frankovitch probably will play a great deal at both quarter and fullback.

The Bruin line inside the ends looks sturdy with Captain Homer Oliver at center, Fred Haslum, one-year man at the other guard, and Tom Rafferty and Mike Dimas, a couple of veterans at the tackles.

The other halfback probably will be Bobby Decker, a senior. The schedule provides a game with University of Oregon at Portland, October 15.

GRID WORK AT WILLAMETTE TO BEGIN SEPT. 12

SALEM, Sept. 8 (AP)—Football practice at Willamette university will begin Monday, Sept. 12.

The Bearcats have always been a big threat in the Northwest conference, but Coach Roy S. "Spec" Keene has only four regulars returning from last year.

Walter Erickson is the only regular backfield man from 1931 and Grannis Kaiser and Gomers are the returning linemen. Seven other lettermen from last season and other squad members will return. This will be Coach Keene's seventh year as Bearcat mentor.

Hollywood showed Portland the championship trail is not always smooth by upsetting the leaders 4 to 1 Wednesday night. Emil Yae, veteran Star southpaw, was too good for the Ducks, holding them to five hits.

Led by Rightfielder Al McNeely, who drove in three runs, Hollywood collected seven safeties from the offerings of Peterson. It was a speedy game, the eight and one-half innings requiring only 90 minutes.

The Seals jumped from third to second place, one percentage point ahead of Los Angeles and Hollywood, by trimming Seattle 5 to 1. Guido Simoni, formerly of Santa Clara, pitched for San Francisco, keeping six Seattle hits well scattered.

The Indians made six errors, but the Seals earned five of their runs.

Hits were plentiful on the Sacramento lot, and it was a bad evening for pitchers, as the Seals took a 10 to 7 contest from the Angels. The Senators chalked up 15 safeties off three Los Angeles hurlers. The southpaw knocked Flynn from the box in the first inning, Salvo replacing him, and the two were touched for a dozen hits. The victory was the tenth in a row for Sacramento.

Another slugging contest occurred in Oakland, where the Missions beat the Oaks 6 to 2 by fanning on Bill Phebus for 11 hits. Although the Aorns made 10 safeties off Lieber, he kept them well scattered, and was never in serious trouble. The Reds scored twice in the first inning, once in the fifth, and put the game away with three in the seventh.

Walker's Weight Small Factor In Schmeling Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Size doesn't count any more, it seems—not that insurance companies view kindly clerks who make a practice of swinging on safe movers.

The theory has grown out of speculation on the 15-round bout Sept. 19 in the Madison Square Garden bowl between Mickey Walker and Max Schmeling.

The former heavyweight champion will carry a weight advantage of around 22 pounds and will tower six inches taller when the pair enter the ring, but plenty of the wise boys will be down on "Mickey the Mouse" before the first gong.

Drew With Sharkey

Walker last summer proved that he is not over-awed by sheer bulk, even if it is hanging on an outstanding heavyweight. He held Jack Sharkey, new titleholder, to a draw in a 14-round bout. The majority of newspapermen at the ring-side thought Mickey entitled to the decision.

In that battle Mickey took most of the belligerency from the Boston Gook with a two-fisted attack from a crouching position, featuring a left hook that popped like a paper bag. He plans the same type of campaign against Schmeling.

Despite a hide as tough as a crocodile's, Der Maxie has let slip the secret that he shies from body punishment. Before he went down from a low blow in his first title fight with Sharkey, he had been considerably annoyed by body punches.

Body punches in the early rounds of his bout with Sharkey last June were in a large way responsible for the cautious offensive that cost him his title.

Succeeds Greb
