

Hollywood Moves Into Second Place

BEAVERS BLANKED IN FIRST BUT WIN SECOND GAME 15-2

Sacramento, Seattle and Oakland All Win Double Headers—8 Games played Friday

Hollywood's Stars shone again in second place in the Coast league as the result of a 1 to 0 victory over Portland in the opener of an admission day double header. Tom Sheehan achieved the shutout in a sparkling mound duel with Bill Shores, crack Beaver hurler, in which each allowed five hits. Portland, however, came back with vengeance to take the second game 15 to 2, as Art Jacobs cut Hollywood off with but four safeties in the seven innings.

Sacramento continued its victory march by taking a pair of games from Los Angeles, winning the afternoon contest at Stockton 14 to 3, and the evening engagement at home, 4 to 3. The defeats pushed the Angels into third place. Of the 33 games the Seals have played since Earl McNeely became manager, 28 have been victories, and the Seals are only one game behind the fourth place Seals.

Junk Wins For Seattle
Junk Walters, Seattle pitcher, played a leading role as the Indians took a double header from San Francisco, 6 to 1 and 5 to 4. He pitched the first game and part of the second. Curt Davis, Seattle pitcher, had poor support in the opener, his teammates making seven errors. Seattle won the nightcap with four runs in the seventh and final frame.

Oakland rushed the Missions deeper into the cellar by taking a double header, 7 to 1, and 6 to 0, gaining a four to one edge on the series. Roy Joiner chalked up the shutout in the nightcap in spite of being reached for nine safeties.

BALTIMORE, Sept. 10 (AP)—Five Farms' treacherous contours and gloomy greens were tested today by scores of golfers who Monday will open their bid for the national amateur golf championship.

Moreland suffered a painful injury to a finger and was undecided whether he would be able to enter the qualifying round Monday.

U. swimming championships swam the 220-yard backstroke in 2 minutes 57.8 seconds, successfully defending her title and bettering by 2.8 seconds her previous world mark, established at the Olympic games in Los Angeles in August.

FAIR GRID TEAM AT WASHINGTON U.

Few Good Reserves, However; Huskies' Chances Up to New Backfield

SEATTLE, Sept. 10 (AP)—It seems to be the same old story at Washington. A fair first team with few good reserves.

The Huskies' chances of getting anywhere in the Pacific Coast conference football race this fall will be up to four young unknown backfield performers and a slightly revised veteran line that was none too strong last season even with the All-America Schwieger cutting his final capers.

Plugging two gaping holes left about by the graduation of Merle Hufford and Paul Schwieger gained the first attention of Head Coach Jimmy Phelan as he faced his squad in its opening practice session of the season today.

Schwieger, an All-Coast and All-America tackle last year, and Hufford, one of the leading linebackers in the conference the last three seasons, were the main cogs of the Husky machine and their departure left little hope for first division honors let alone the championship. Anything better will surprise the shrewd Jimmy more than anyone else.

Joseph Waltrak, a 191-pound substitute from the 1931 squad, is first in line for Schwieger's left tackle job. If he can't handle it, Phelan has few others to call upon. The only other hole in the line, a guard badly vacated by Lawrence Perrieh, will be filled by Negley England, a former second-string center.

Unless some youngster comes along with unusual ability the remainder of the forward wall will likely be left intact with Nesbit and Smith at the ends; 263-pound Isaacson at the other tackle; Captain O'Brien at the other guard and Howard at center.

Backfield material is plentiful but power lies in the newcomers. Figuring De Roia for quarterback, Bufkin and Muczynski for halves and Sukowky for fullback he would have the biggest backfield since the halcyon days when the late Enoch Hargrave tossed George Wilson and Charles Carroll, two All-Americans, and Elmer Tesreau at the opposition.

De Roia was a second string halfback last year while the other three are sophomores. This lineup would average about 185 pounds.

Veterans with lots of speed but little weight include Cherberg, Borden, Wolcott, Hanson and Pedersen. Another who may break into the lineup is Art Ahonen, a little sophomore who shines at kicking and passing. Phelan is fairly well fixed for passers but has no outstanding punters and may be forced to call upon the 158-pounder. The next best at both departments of the game is Muczynski.

Washington plays Oregon at Portland Oct. 8.

Senators Going At Championship Clip This Month

While the New York Yankees and Chicago Cubs proceed to snare the victories that bring them closer to the major league's two championships, Walter Johnson's Washington Senators are roaring along at a terrific clip that may yet earn them second place in the American league.

Twenty victories in their last 24 games had carried the Senators to within a game and a half of the Philadelphia Athletics and in excellent position to mount into the runner-up post should the A's continue to falter.

That streak of Washington's has been featured by excellent pitching, especially from Fred Marberry. Bill McAfee and Alvin Crowder but it was the Senators' bats that beat back the St. Louis Browns, 6-4, yesterday. The Senators scored their six runs in the first four innings and held a five-run lead as the Browns came to bat in the last half of the seventh. Then Crowder weakened and before the frame was over the Browns had scored three runs and were very much in the game. Marberry stopped that rally and Lloyd Brown pitched the ninth and held the Browns scoreless.

Yanks Lose Two
The Yankees, needing four victories to clinch the pennant, got absolutely nowhere, dropping two games to the Detroit Tigers, 14-13 in 14 innings and 4-1 in five frames. The first game was a wild affair marked by 24 walks, 14 by Yankees pitchers, and five errors. MacFadden walked four men in the nightcap, forcing in one run in the second inning. Arad Jorgensen's error permitted two more to cross the plate.

The Boston Red Sox overcame a six-run lead and shipped the Chicago White Sox, 9-6, in 10 innings.

The Cubs moved one game closer to the National league pennant by beating the Boston Braves, 5-2 as Lonnie Warneke scattered nine hits and hung up his 21st victory of the season against only five defeats. Twelve more Cub victories automatically will give Charley Grimm's club the pennant.

Don Hurst's single in the 12th drove in the run that enabled the Phils to trim the St. Louis Cardinals, 3-2 and make a clean sweep of the series. The New York Giants split two games with the Cincinnati Reds, dropping the first 10-4 and winning the second 11-1. Mel Ott hit a home run in each game to boost his season's total to 34.

Cochet Defeats Allison In Fifth Set Today, 7-5

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 10 (AP)—Henri Cochet, of France, beat William Allison, of Austin, Texas, 7-5, in the fifth and deciding set of their semi-final match in the national tennis championships today to win the interrupted match by scores of 6-1, 10-12, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5.

Allison, playing inspired tennis held his own with the French champion until the score reached 5-4 where he suddenly slumped, making a series of disastrous errors, permitting Cochet to run off the two decisive games with the loss of but four points. Two double-faults in the 11th game cost Allison dearly.

As a result of his victory, postponed when darkness halted play after four sets had been played yesterday, Cochet qualified to meet Ellsworth Vines Jr., of Pasadena, in the final match in the national tennis championships today to win the interrupted match by scores of 6-1, 10-12, 4-6, 6-3, 7-5.

He will have sole supervision of the varsity, leaving Relswig and MacMurdo to handle the others, but will take as much time as he can to see that the younger players get necessary training in fundamentals and some playing experience.

With such a record turnout, Dimick now not only wants to fill out the varsity schedule, but he also is after weekly games for the second and third teams beginning the latter part of the month. The second team has one date with Walla Walla, Sept. 23, and others are wanted.

The first full scrimmage for the squad will come Tuesday of next week, but will be fairly light. By Friday, however, he expects most of the players to be in condition for a stiff season.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (AP)—Those twinges in the side which sent Babe Ruth back to New York for a medical examination have responded so quickly to treatment that the New York Yankees' mighty slugger already is fretting at his enforced idleness.

Ruth's worries left him as soon as his physician told him that an operation would not immediately be necessary.

"That means I'll be ready for the world's series," the Babe said. "In fact I believe I feel well enough to be out there and play right now."

But Mrs. Ruth vetoed that idea. "The doctor said you must have three days of absolute rest," she told the Babe, "and you are going to stay in bed if I have to call out the reserves."

position of the two major presidential candidates. It added that "no national political party convention can bind senators and congressmen" who are responsible only to their constituents for the manner in which they meet their official obligations.

The board of strategy last night discussed a proposal by Canon William S. Chase that drys support a third party movement and decided to center campaign efforts on senatorial and congressional races. Senator Borah, of Idaho, and Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, had been suggested by Canon Chase as third party leaders.

Dr. Ernest G. Cherrington, prominent board member, said the third party resolution had not received a second and that while not formally voted on, he felt the matter was closed so far as the board was concerned.

"The place to support the eighteenth amendment is in congress," Cherrington said, "and this board and probably all other dry organizations will center its support on candidates for congress who are friends of prohibition."
