

Beavers' Lead Cut to Four Games

FRISCO WALLOPS THREE PORTLAND PITCHERS TO WIN

Hollywood, in Second Place, Noses Out Sacramento 8 to 7; Angels Win 16 to 0.

Coast league teams were bunched for a blanket finish as they started the final three weeks of the season. Portland's lead was cut to four games as the Beavers lost to San Francisco Tuesday and Los Angeles went into a tie with Sacramento for third place by beating Seattle, while the Oaks lost to Hollywood.

Only eleven games separate the first five teams in the league.

The Oaks attacked three Portland pitchers and won 9 to 6, by staging a five-run rally in the eighth inning after starting the frame one run behind. Base hits were plentiful, the Oaks collecting 15 and the Ducks 10.

Shellenback Wins
Frank Shellenback, pitcher and handy man of the Hollywood Stars, went in as a pinch hitter in the eighth inning, collected a home run, and enabled his team to beat Sacramento, 8 to 7. The Stars were one run behind at the time, but there was one man on base, so Shellenback's drive scored two runs. Sacramento got 11 hits and Hollywood 12.

Win Ballou, Los Angeles hurler, held Seattle to three hits as the Angels won 16-0. The Angelinos fell on Hal Haid and Junk Walters for 21 safeties. Haid lasted only three innings.

The Missions had a 4-2 lead over Oakland after six innings, and then cut loose with five runs in the seventh and five more in the eighth to win 14 to 6. The Reds knocked Willie Ludolph from the box in the seventh and continued their attack on Clarence Fieber.

our misery we could hear the agonizing cries of those who had been in the wreckage, most of them horribly mangled.

"The Chinese soldiers refused to help them, saying: 'What's the use of dragging them out, there are no doctors here and they will bleed to death anyway.' I then started to rescue some of the victims myself. Only when daylight came did we feel safe from another attack."

Other victims arrived here stripped of their clothing, including their shoes, many suffering acutely from injuries.

Henry Kinney, American public relations director for the South Manchuria railway, once resident of San Francisco and Los Angeles arrived clothed in a potato sack and a fragment of a canvas tent. He had narrowly escaped kidnapping. He was being manhandled by the Japanese by a group of brigands when he slipped away in the dark and hid in some bushes.

It was on his way to Geneva in behalf of the Manchukuo government, with George Bronson Rea, American adviser of the Manchukuo regime, who is now en route to the United States.

The Manchukuo authorities, at the behest of the Japanese, declared martial law in the vicinity of Kirin today as a result of repeated attacks by Chinese irregulars.

NEW STATE PLANNED
SHANGHAI, Sept. 14 (AP)—Chinese press dispatches said today a Japanese plot had been uncovered to establish an independent North China republic as a sister state to Manchukuo.

The dispatches said the Japanese were organizing a separatist movement near Peiping and Tientsin.

Having sailed away the American league pennant, the Yankees could sit back today and watch the progress of the race in the National and figure out what to buy with their share of the world series receipts.

Joseph McCarthy's young men assured their participation in the well known October classic with yesterday's 9 to 3 victory over the Cleveland Indians. They can lose all their remaining 11 games if they feel so disposed and still finish a lap ahead of the Philadelphia Athletics.

Cubs Well Ahead

Amateurs Enter First Round of Tourney Today

BAITIMORE, Sept. 14 (AP)—The veterans of American amateur golf could muster scarcely a corporal's guard today as the first round of the national championship started over Five Farms course here.

There were Francis Ouimet, the champion from Boston; George Volz, Charles "Chick" Evans, Chandler Egan and Jesse Guifford, but most of the others were with Bobby Jones in the gallery—forced out by the spectacular shooting of the newcomers in yesterday's final qualifying round.

Three of the four qualifying leaders were up for the first time, along with eleven others making their first bid for the Havemeyer cup of amateur supremacy.

Among these was Johnny Fischer, the 20-year-old University of Michigan sophomore from Cincinnati, who put together two fine tours of 69-73 to equal the 142 record for the medal competition held jointly by Jones and D. C. Carran of Baltimore.

Except for three narrowly missed putts, Fischer would have surpassed the record. A carelessly hit putt on the fifteenth, when he lay some 12 inches from the hole, probably cost him the new mark. He was blasting his tee shots and playing his iron shots crisply and accurately.

Johnny Goodman, of Omaha, a youngster possessing several years experience, came second with 144, but Wilfred Crowley of Dedham, Mass., and Perry Hall of Philadelphia, with 145, were rank outsiders.

Among the other prominent players who found the going too fast and failed to make the grade were Don Moore and Frank Dole of Portland, Ore.

Egg Demand Is Good; Price Is Steady to Firm

PORTLAND, Sept. 14 (AP)—Effective Thursday morning, announcement was made by E. J. Dixon, general manager of the Pacific co-ops, of an advance of 1c to 2c for extra eggs here. Mediums will be unchanged. Pullets with greatly increased laying are down 2c dozen at 13c dozen.

PORTLAND, Sept. 14 (AP)—Demand for eggs is taking care of not only immediate lay but there are quite fair withdrawals from storage all along the Pacific slope. A similar movement is reflected through the country generally according to a late survey.

Prices are generally steady to firm with fractional advances in spots at some points.

Receipts of fresh eggs are still decreasing but the loss is not as serious as last week. This stimulates the call for the better grade short held storage.

Very heavy supplies greeted buyers on the east side farmers' wholesale market today. Price changes were limited and practically a standstill as regards advances and declines.

Game Commission Agrees on Budget
PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 14 (AP)—The Oregon state game commission Tuesday adopted a budget calling for the expenditure of \$375,000 during the fiscal year beginning October 1.

Of the budget \$184,000 is apportioned to the executive division as follows: State police, \$132,500; supervisor's office, \$5,000; research, \$9,000; education, \$10,000; fishways and streams, \$14,000; bounties, \$10,000; and miscellaneous, \$65,000.

The division of fisheries is to be allowed \$134,000; the game division \$43,000; and the division of audit and records, \$13,500.
