

Portland Still in Slump---Lead Reduced to 3 Games

STARS ADVANCE BY WINNING 5TH STRAIGHT GAME

Seals Make it Two to Nothing Over Beavers While Seattle Whips Angels 3 to 1.

Hollywood advanced to within three games of the leading Portland club by beating Sacramento Wednesday night while the Beavers were losing to San Francisco. The Seals went into a three-way tie for third place with Los Angeles and the Senators.

The Seals made it two straight from Portland by winning 6 to 4, finding little difficulty in touching Bill Shores, leading pitcher of the Ducks, for 11 hits. Jimmy Zinn pitched light ball for Hollywood. Each team reached two opposing pitchers for 11 safeties. Ben Tincup, starting for the Bolons, lasting only three innings, while Tom Sheehan pitched ten frames for the Stars. Seattle Team Wins
Lynn Nelson, Seattle moundman, held Los Angeles to five hits as the tribe won, 3 to 1. It was Nelson's twenty-first victory this season. Black Spider Is Expected to Win Fight With Snake

ST. CHARLES, Ill., Sept. 15 (AP)—Science is predicting victory for the common black spider in its long fight with the ten-inch garter snake around which it spins its web 24 days ago.

Suspended in the air, with its head embedded in a strong silken rope, the snake began its twenty-fifth day of struggle to disengage itself, but, in the opinion of Walter Necker, of the Field Museum of Natural History, there is no chance to escape.

Under a magnifying glass the reptile was seen to be as securely bound as though held in chains or iron. An investigator for the Illinois humane society asked Mayor I. G. Langum to stop the struggle. Mayor Langum, who is betting on the spider, refused to interfere.

Cubs In Need Of 7 More Wins To Clinch Pennant

As the Chicago Cubs continue to back in a little closer to the National League flag day by day, gradually winning the thing by default, so to speak, their manager is perfectly satisfied with their conduct and steadfastly refuses to view with alarm Charlie Grimm's words "I say, not that he wouldn't like to win every day. He's in there fighting on every pitched ball, but he isn't in any great hurry to see up his pants. He wants his team to remain keyed up as long as possible, doesn't want them to have an extended 'let-down' before they meet the Yankees in the world series.

"I believe it's better for a club to keep on its toes right up to the series," he said. "Those Yankees, now, have nothing to do for a couple of weeks except to play out their schedule, and it might be hard for them to get back the same edge they had while they were winning the flag."

Giants Win in 11th
The Little Bears lost to the New York Giants yesterday, 4 to 3, when Freddie Lindstrom hit a home run in the 11th inning, but it didn't damage their status any to speak of, as the Pittsburgh Pirates were dropping another game to Boston, 5 to 2. The Cubs thus remained 5½ games in front with 11 games to play, making it possible for them to clinch the title with seven more wins.

A triple play, started by Bill Urbanski, enlivened the Braves' victory over Pittsburgh. Brooklyn climbed within 2½ games of second place by taking the St. Louis Cardinals again, 3 to 1, behind Van Munching's steady curving. The Phillies subdued Cincinnati, 4 to 1, Roy Hansen limited the Reds to four hits.

Yank Vets Rest
Some of the Yankee veterans took a well-earned rest, but the "dayves" were able to beat the Chicago White Sox, 3 to 2. Walter Brown, making only his second start of the year for the champions, allowed six hits, but the ninth inning, Detroit whaled four Washington pitchers to win an 8 to 3 verdict.

Jimmie Dykes' home run with two out and the bases loaded in the ninth round set off an eight-run rally that saw the Athletics submerge St. Louis, 18 to 6. Mel Harder kept seven hits scattered in pitching Cleveland to a 9 to 0 win over the Red Sox.

HORSE TRAINED ON RANCH WINS AUSTRALIAN HURDLE
MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—Polygamous for a former ranch hand, has won Australia's greatest hurdling event—the Grand National Hurdle—and a prize of \$6,800.

On a ranch in Victoria, Polygamous, used for rounding up cattle, became famous for the way in which he took fences in his stride. He was speedy, too. His first race was in a country hurdle event and he ran so well that he was entered with the metropolitan cracks—and beat them.

Cattlemen who backed him out of sentimental reasons got odds of 20 to 1.

Sport Slants

Assuming there will be no apathy on the part of the New York and Chicago baseball public in connection with the world series, the "gate" figures to pass the million-dollar mark this year if the hostilities last only for five games or, if they are prolonged, to touch a new record high mark of close to \$1,500,000.

The Yankee Stadium, with its capacity now increased to just a few seats short of 70,000, and Wrigley Field, which will have its limits extended for the accommodation of about \$2,000 cash customers, offer two of the biggest battlegrounds in the minor leagues. Only the Polo Grounds can accommodate more than the home park of the Chicago Cubs in the National League.

"We are superstitious enough not to order the erection of additional bleachers at Wrigley Field until we have the pennant clinched," President Bill Weck told me after he had discussed world series details with Commissioner Landis in New York. "However, since the series opens in time to rush the additions as soon as we are in."

A full house at the Yankee Stadium means about \$234,000 in the coffers, so that, if the limit of four games is played there, it requires no lightning calculator to discover that capacity crowds will mean an aggregate of more than \$900,000. Three additional games at Wrigley Field, where capacity means slightly over \$300,000 per day, would add \$900,000 more to the war-chests in needy times.

SEVENTH GAME PROBLEM
Of course the managers may be a trifle optimistic in figuring the customers will mob the ball grounds at the same old pre-depression prices, ranging from \$1 for bleacher seats to \$5.50 for reserved seats and \$8.00 for box seats.

The seventh game of the 1931 series was a "bust" financially, due mainly to the system of not selling tickets for the seventh game until after the sixth is finished.

World's series tickets are sold in three game "strips" by each club, and the series does not go that far. The managers fear that if they also included seventh-game tickets in their pre-series sales, the public would become unduly suspicious of their expectations.

However, since the preference in event of a seventh game, is given to the previous ticket-holders, anyway, it would seem the more business-like method to cover the whole situation at once, save the fans a lot of unnecessary inconvenience and assure a better "house" for the seventh contest. The refunding system could operate just as efficiently, whether one, two or three unplayed games were involved.
