Jackson county line section of Pacific highway, 2.06 miles of 20-foot concrete pavement.  
Marion county: Aurora-Woodburn section of Pacific highway, 5.1 miles of grade widening and gravel shoulder construction.  
Tillamook county: Neahkahnie Creek section of Oregon coast highway, 1 mile of grading.  
Baker county: Three bridges on the Lime-Huntington section of the Old Oregon Trail.  
Benton county: Bridge over Miller Creek near Monroe on west side Pacific highway.  
Douglas county: Two bridges, about three and one-half and five and one-quarter miles respectively east of Reedsport on the Umpqua highway.  
Multnomah county: Bridge over Columbia slough at north edge of Portland on secondary highway No. 120.  
Adding to the difficulties confronting the highway commission is the fact that the reconstruction finance corporation has decided not to advance money directly to counties. The highway department will be asked to serve as an intermediary and accept the responsibility for funds advanced to the counties.  
The matter will be taken up with Raymond B. Wilcox, chairman of the state relief commission, highway officials said.

**LEGION VOTE IS TAKEN ON BOTH ISSUES**

lary of War Patrick J. Hurley today denied he had anything to do with distribution of a pamphlet at the American Legion convention in Portland, referring to the "bonus marchers in Washington."  
"I sent no such statement to the legion convention nor did I authorize use of the war department frank," the secretary said.  
He expressed surprise at distribution of the pamphlet at the convention, but admitted having written the statement.  
**WAR DEPARTMENT CENSURED**  
AUDITORIUM, Portland, Sept. 15 (AP)—A violent outbreak of shouting climaxed a vote of censure for the war department, interrupted the closing session of the national convention of the American Legion here today.  
The viva voce vote was taken after Harry M. Arthur, department commander of South Carolina, lodged a vigorous complaint because envelopes containing a speech by Patrick J. Hurley, secretary of war, on the bonus question, had been placed in the chairs of all delegates. These envelopes bore the frank of the war department.  
After Commander Arthur shouted a bitter complaint against such action the convention by acclamation declared its opposition to such action by the war department "or any other governmental department."  
The envelopes contained sheets headed "Statement by Patrick J. Hurley, secretary of war, on the bonus question, had been placed in the chairs of all delegates. These envelopes bore the frank of the war department."  
It repeated in essential details the statements that had come from the administration recently on the bonus march and the eviction of the veterans by use of troops.  
A part of the letter was devoted to the order that Secretary Hurley issued calling the army into action on the afternoon of July 28.  
The statement concluded with the paragraph "all fatalities incident to the riot took place before the arrival of the United States troops. After the arrival of the United States troops, a force of about 600 men, not one shot was fired and no person was seriously injured. Law and order were promptly restored."  
The ayes and noes both were loud but Commander Stevens declared the vote of censure had been passed.  
**Radio Resolution Tabled**  
A motion by Walter Edwards, Muskogee, Okla., condemning the National Broadcasting company for taking Floy Gibson, war correspondent, and radio announcer, off the air on legion broadcasts was tabled after another disturbance. A few boos came from the gallery.  
Speeches on the bonus were limited by a vote of the convention to five minutes. Commander Henry L. Stevens Jr. said he felt sure the resolution would be adopted overwhelmingly but that both sides should be given a respectful hearing.  
Representative Wright Patman, of Texas, author of the soldier legislation and a leader of the "bonus" fight, was the first speaker.  
Patman said the congress had been trying to find a way to put money into the pockets of the "bonus" men before the "bonus" was paid. He said the bonus, had it been paid, would have had a far more beneficial effect than the advances to the reconstruction finance corporation. "The international bankers," Patman said, have been the "enemies of the veterans on the question of bonus payment."  
"The bonus will promote the welfare of this country," Patman said. "I believe the American people will be grateful to you if you go on record for payment now. The benefits will not be restricted to the veterans and their families."  
Sam Reynolds boomed  
Loud booms greeted Sam Reynolds, of Nebraska, as he was called to present the case against the bonus.  
National Convention. Stevens intervened. "Let's hear them all," he said.  
Scattered booms continued to heckle Reynolds.  
"All the nation," he said, "is awaiting the action of this convention. All the people know we are under fire. Unless we stop that storm which is growing we will see the day when men run for office on the basis of 'stop the veterans.'"  
"We've got to say to the people of America," Reynolds said, "that we want nothing for ourselves but that we want to help all the disabled veterans."  
"How can we raise our hand for the disabled veteran while with the other we beg gratuities for ourselves. Let there be one organization that puts country first. Let us ask every-
