

Extra, Standard Eggs One Cent Higher Today

PORTLAND, Sept. 15 (AP) — The advance in extra and standard eggs of 10 cents, as announced yesterday, effective today was being generally followed by the trade here although outside interests continue their demoralizing attacks on the Portland price structure by pushing the sales of under-grades.

Trading in the butter market is firm here with prices strong to higher in spots for cubes despite the weakness in the east. An advance in low grade is shown for the late season.

The high price on chickens at San Francisco compared with Portland is forcing additional movement in that direction. Lights are quoted around 13 @ 14c there compared with 7 @ 9c here.

While there continues a fair demand for new crop live as well as dressed turkeys, the call is confined almost exclusively to light weight with heavy stuff almost stagnant.

Shortage of country killed calves continues here although it has been slightly modified during the last day or so. Prices, however, remain at the full point. Hogs and lambs are steady. Recent advances in the price of potatoes are not being fully maintained in the Yakima section, where the chief rises were shown following the government report of a smaller crop.

FLEECE TRADE IMPROVING IN COAST STATES

PORTLAND, Sept. 15 (AP) — Sale of an independent co-operative offering of close to 1,500,000 lbs. of Idaho-Eastern Oregon wool at Boise late yesterday, at 13@16c lb. marked a much better position in the fleece trade of the Pacific coast. The wool was bought by a Boston interest and is stored at Portland terminals for shipment.

The price paid was not only the highest available in this territory this current season, but was bought under competitive conditions that have been almost generally absent this year. While reports from Boston of late have differed considerably as to the status of the fleece trade, it is apparent that the improvement from the extremely low mark offered has been quite fair. However, leaders of the trade suggest that the extreme low prices shown at the start of the season were more of a debating list than any real appreciation among buyers that they would purchase more than a nominal supply there.

Further offerings of both Idaho and Oregon wool will be made at Portland and immediate activity in purchases is expected.
