Methodists Are Preparing For Rally Program

Promotions to Be Made in Sunday School — Programs For Other Local Churches Announced.

Careful preparations for a Rally day program and promotions are being made in the First M. E. church Sunday school and the growing enrollment is being provided with instruction. Sunday school will begin at 9:45 o'clock with well prepared teachers for all classes.

Hurley Speaks For Hoover In South Dakota

HURON, S. D., Sept. 15 (AP)—Secretary of War Patrick J. Hurley arrived here yesterday in a trimotor airplane to deliver an address at the state fair as the opening gun of the Republican campaign in the north-west.

Hurley said President Hoover is "successfully piloting this nation through one of the greatest economic storms in history" and credited him with saving "millions of dollars" for American agriculture.

The secretary of war declared that Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic presidential candidate, "has no plan to break the depression or to put men and women back to work."

The war secretary lauded administration steps that he said had kept the United States "firm, solvent and confident of the future." He also told this northwest farming section the Democratic house passed "bills that would have more than doubled the cost of the federal government if they had not been stopped by the senate and the president."

Secretary Hurley dealt at some length with the agricultural marketing act, under which the farm board was set up, inland waterways development and the president's effort to aid banks as they affect the farming sections.

The change in improvement plans came, Scott said, as the result of the government's refusal to withdraw from the federal system the Nye-Hopner junction section of the Oregon-Washington highway.

Scott said the highway department did not wish to postpone the project now deferred but that the circumstances were such that any other course was impossible.

Weight of the Earth
Dr. Paul R. Heyl of the United States bureau of standards in Washington has worked for several years on a new figure for the gravitational constant from which the weight of the earth is calculated. Doctor Heyl announced that the estimated weight of the earth is 5,972,000,000,000,000,000 tons.

Readjustment Of Federal Aid Map Made In Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 16 (AP)—Highway map in Oregon, resulting in postponement of a number of major projects, was effected here Wednesday in a conference attended by W. H. Lynch, district engineer of the bureau of public roads, Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the Oregon highway commission, and Carl G. Washburne and E. B. Aldrich, commission members, and other highway department executives.

The following were named as the projects upon which work will be started immediately with the \$3,000,000 federal aid allocated and advanced to Oregon:

Wolf creek, 64.1 miles; Canaan beach-Nehalem, 21.8 miles; Pendleton-John Day, 81.8 miles; Vale-Burns, 121.3 miles; Willamette highway, 29 miles; Beaverton-Forrest Grove, 19 miles.

This group of roads, when completed, Scott said, will represent an expenditure of \$4,500,000. Of this amount \$3,750,000 will have been spent in Western Oregon and \$1,750,000 in Eastern Oregon. Scott pointed out construction costs in the western part of the state are much heavier than in the eastern section.

The projects upon which work will be postponed are: South Santiam-Wilson River; Cold Springs, north of Pendleton; Klamath Falls-Weed; Forest Grove-McMinnville; Dolp connection; Fourth street extension in Portland.
