

# Yakima, Wenatchee Apple Damage Heavy

## JONATHANS SHORT ALTHOUGH DEMAND IS NOT SO HEAVY

Loss By Worms Results in  
Inability Supply De-  
mand — Delicious Sea-  
son Opens Next Week.

PORTLAND, Sept. 17 (AP) — Severe damage to the early apple crop in the Yakima and Wenatchee sections stands confirmed. Owing to the loss of worm damage, the supply of Jonathans at the opening of the season, orders were not heavy, but they were in excess of current ability of shipping organizations to deliver, the Journal said today.

For next week's deliveries Wenatchee was asking 90c for extra fancy and 75c for fancy Jonathans with Yakima asking 85c for the same quality and 70c for the latter. The demand was still confined to the domestic territory although efforts are being made to secure foreign business and especially in France.

Opening of the Delicious season was due in the Washington producing sections next week with Oregon districts to follow quickly.

Last year's serious worm damage which pulled down the total crop of the northwest to a very considerable extent, was feared even on a larger scale in some sections the current season.

Local apple market was still following the Gravenstein with Kings starting to appear. Prices were based mostly upon jumble pack.

"The speeches were not mailed and

Secretary Hurley, who flew to Hur-  
on, S. D., after attending the con-  
vention here, said Thursday he was  
unaware that copies of his statement  
had been placed before the legion  
delegates and did not know how they  
were delivered.

GIBBONS HITS AT HURLEY  
Sept. 16 (AP) — Floyd Gibbons,  
newspaper and radio man  
and former war correspondent, said  
today that the American Legion con-  
vention in Portland this week "proved  
itself closer to the American public  
than the nation's political leaders."

En route home, the correspondent  
declared of the "B. E. F." at Wash-  
ington "the American troops ordered  
out by President Hoover set fire to  
the huts of the bonus army in Ana-  
costa camp. Secretary of War Hurley  
denied it on his sacred word of  
honor. Now Maj. Gen. George Van  
Horn, formerly chief of staff of the  
army, admits the troops did it. So  
much for Mr. Hurley's 'sacred word  
of honor.' I say that the night at  
back on the camp of the hungry,  
jobless veterans was an open-faced  
verdict of inhumanity on the part  
of the men who gave the orders to  
the troops."

## CAVALRY BREAKS LINE

ASUNCION, Paraguay, Sept. 17 (AP)  
—Reports from Formosa today said  
the Paraguayan cavalry had broken the  
Bolivian line near Fort Acre in the  
Chaco region, where a bitter bat-  
tle was in progress for the ninth con-  
secutive day.

Other reports said the Bolivians at-  
tempted twice during the night to  
break the Paraguayan blockade at  
Fort Esqueron without success and  
they added the Bolivians now had  
been entirely surrounded by the Para-  
guayan forces.

amounted in round numbers to \$3-  
500,000,000; our exports for the year  
ending June 30, 1929 under the 1923  
act amounted to \$5,000,000,000.

"Our imports for the last year of  
the Underwood act amounted to \$2-  
500,000,000 and in 1929 they amount-  
ed to \$4,250,000,000. x x x

"So you see the governor is mis-  
taken about the effect of the Mc-  
Cumber act on our foreign trade."

Curtis said that "through the

interest of the country," financial  
difficulties following Great Britain's de-  
parture from the gold standard had

## PENNSYLVANIA FOR HOOVER

ALLENTOWN, Pa., Sept. 17 (AP)—The  
Republican state committee today  
adopted a platform for the Pennsylv-  
ania campaign which contained a  
plank endorsing "President Hoover's  
pronouncement upon prohibition en-  
forcement and its evils in his mas-  
terful speech of acceptance."

The platform also says:  
"The wise, courteous, patient and  
courageous effort of our great presi-  
dent has kept the United States  
steadfast in times of political up-  
heaval and unrest in other nations  
of the world. We have maintained  
our high credit, and both our moral  
and financial obligations."

"The president has mustered,  
trained and directed the American  
people as a great army facing a re-  
lentless enemy and victory is about  
achieved. We place our confidence  
in President Hoover."

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Sept. 17  
(AP)—Checking off the eighth of the  
states he has crossed on his presiden-  
tial campaign to the west, Governor  
Roosevelt left behind Wyoming with  
its cheering crowds and reached Salt  
Lake City where tonight he will ad-  
vance proposals for relieving the na-  
tion's railroad situation.

Mr. Roosevelt arrived in Salt Lake  
City, one of the important railroad  
centers of the west, where he will re-  
main Saturday and Sunday. On Sun-  
day night his special train will head

be delivered in the famous Mormon  
tabernacle at 7:15 p. m. mountain  
standard time. A double radio hook-  
up has been arranged for the ad-  
dress. The speech, it is understood,  
will take up 45 minutes.

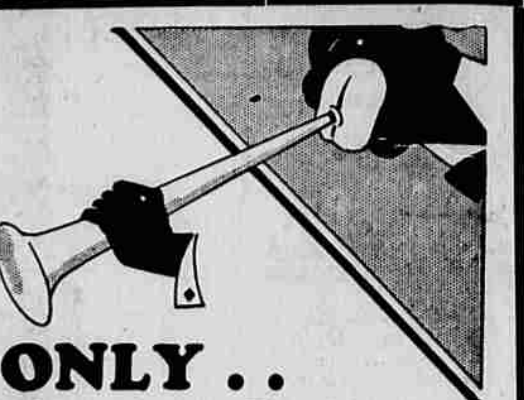
To Discuss Transportation  
It is understood that the Demo-  
cratic nominee, among other things,  
will ask for a broadening of the pow-  
ers of the interstate commerce com-  
mission, to include jurisdiction over  
bus, truck and airplane service.

Mr. Roosevelt's own home state of  
New York, at the last legislative ses-  
sion, raised the taxes on buses and  
trucks.

The New York governor has had a  
railroad background, his father hav-  
ing been a vice president of the  
Delaware and Hudson.

At Cheyenne, Mr. Roosevelt left  
his train to address a crowd and go  
for a motor trip through the Wy-  
oming capital and to Fort Warren and  
the veterans' hospital near the city.

In a short impromptu speech at  
Cheyenne, the Democratic pace-set-  
ter said he had had "assurances,  
stamped, sealed and delivered" that  
"Missouri, Kansas and Colorado would  
do better than Maine." Maine went  
Democratic last Monday in a state  
election.
