charge, Einzig, the governor asked if there were any comment or action. Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss said: "I have no action." The governor then

pounded on the table and said:

"The meeting adjourned." The board started its session without the state treasurer, and when he arrived a few moments before he introduced his resolution, he appeared pale and nervous. His speech was apparent when the routine of the business was concluded and Holman announced he had a resolution. The controversy closed the session with dispatch.

The terse action by the governor of Holman's request was the first break between the state treasurer, a Meier appointee, and the governor. The controversy between Holman and Einzig was precipitated about three weeks ago when the state treasurer received the secretary of the board of receiving free medical attention from state hospitals. This Einzig denied.

Denial Appointment
At the opening of the meeting the governor denied he had an appointment with Holman in Portland this morning. Holman had requested Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss not to attend the meeting in Salem until he, Holman, arrived, because he had been delayed because the governor failed to keep an appointment with him. The governor arrived here early and reiterated at the board meeting he had had an appointment with the state treasurer.

The meeting of the board was called without Holman, with Secretary of State Hoss and the governor present. Hoss did not comply with the request not to attend when the meeting was called.

While the governor previously had stated he would fight for the retention of Einzig as state purchasing agent because he held the official "highly competent," the attitude of Hoss was not known. Hoss had voted against the employment of Einzig more than a year ago when Holman voted with the governor to employ him. Today Hoss said he had "no action."

so recently granted to Germany by her creditors, it must be accounted "untenable."

The announcement of the British stand was met with general, though not unqualified approval in London today.

Reports from Paris said French newspapers greeted it as a "pleasant surprise," revealing that French and British views were not far apart. They pointed out it scotched reports of a disagreement between the two countries circulated in various quarters last week.

The note created a favorable impression in official circles at Washington.

The British government, the note said, could not support the view that under a correct legal construction of the treaty of Versailles, Germany is legally entitled to abrogate part 5 (which limited German armament) even though the other nations should fail to agree to disarm or to reduce their armament.

the following year he went up the Ohio river and saw the government improvement there, visited in Cincinnati and through the Mammoth caves in Kentucky. He stopped 10 days in New York City, where he slept on docks for his entire stay. He was not in any hurry, so he saw everything, he said.

Mr. Sanford did not go to a speaking in New York, he said, because at the age of eight years he signed a pledge that he would stay away from liquor. "Carrie Nation isn't dead yet," he exclaimed.

He visited his rich sister in Philadelphia for a couple of days, he added, but she was too "high-toned" so he left for a weeks' sojourn in Washington. The winter of 1930-1931 was spent in North Carolina, and in the following summer he ate peaches and watermelons in Georgia before going

to Birmingham.

When he got to Birmingham, a negro boy stole his bicycle and he was forced to return to his home in Oakland.

This spring, however, he set out again to see the Yosemite valley, cross the desert to Yellowstone park, and is now returning to Portland, but he states that it is too far away to tell what he is going to do when he arrives.

Mr. Sanford says that he prizes the people with whom he has come in contact more than all the things he has seen on the entire trip.

Labor Exchange Very Active In Last Two Weeks

"The Union County Labor Exchange has been extremely active for the past two weeks, and while on the face of matters their activity does not appear great, considerable has been done to relieve unemployment and distress among many families in this vicinity," Lester M. Bramwell, manager, announced.

The exchange is based on barter, as many as four turn-overs have been made without one dollar exchanging hands. People having work of any kind which they want done are requested to call the exchange, where information will also be received concerning trades, such as work for produce and so forth.

Mr. Bramwell says, "The fire at the school will not affect things materially so far as the changing from coal to wood for the winter is concerned. Some iron was evidenced for awhile, and it was feared the school board had acted unwisely in purchasing so great amount of wood, but conditions are now working out very fine in the matter, as the L.D.S. people had also changed their furnace to burn wood as had the other places as well which will be used to house the school children until the school can be rebuilt. The school boards action in making the change from coal to wood which was done purely to relieve unemployed should receive every commendation. It must also be understood that on account of the present price of wood the school will save several hundred dollars."

Stock Market In Sag; Losses Are One, Two Points

NEW YORK, Sept. 19 (AP)—After drifting quietly in a narrow price range, the stock market sagged late today and many issues showed losses of 1 to 2 points. Selling of U. S. Steel Pfd. which broke around 7 points, extended to steel common which lost more than 2. Rail shares held better than industrial, although declines of more than a point occurred in Santa Fe and Union Pacific. Transactions were approximately 1,300,000 shares.

Butter Market Trade Continues Mostly Steady

PORTLAND, Sept. 19 (AP)—Trading in the butter market continues more or less of steady character with call still the best for the under grades although all were holding values on cubes during the day. Butterfat is steady.

Market for eggs is a trifle misleading to come. It is strong at recent price advances for top quality but not so favorable for others and for short held storage. Only the larger sizes are favored.

Cheese prices appear steady as in leading primary and consuming centers of the country. While the trade does not indicate the full snap of the previous week, the eagerness

parent in prices at the Wisconsin sources appears insufficient to create any price change. Buyers simply did not take hold in volume.

There was no change reported on the North Pacific coast.

With California prices still far in excess of those available here and buyers for that account taking all offerings, the market for live chickens retains a very strong tone generally.

Market for lemons is firm at recent advances with some jobbers asking further rise over \$10 case.

There is a real scarcity of pickling cucumbers. Survey shows that the crop is at present curtailed 25 to 30 per cent from normal with many vines dying on account of the lack of moisture. Prices are firmer.

While there is practically no further change in the price, market for peaches is inclined to show strength for all offerings with little being offered from the Willamette valley.

Mulrs are offering around 30c but clings are topping at 85c box.

With the east and midwest not taking their normal supplies, a glut of fresh green peas is shown. The Oregon coast supply is rather liberal at present with the bulk being forced upon Portland and occasionally at very low prices.
