

Beavers Win Three Over Weekend to Bolster Pennant Chances

DOUBLE HEADER GOES TO BEAVER CREW ON SUNDAY

Hollywood, Coming Fast, Loses Ground By Dropping One Out of Three Weekend Games.

Portland's Beavers regained their pennant edge with a doubleheader over the weekend, taking three games from the second place Hollywood Stars last night in the championship race, winning only two out of three games with Sacramento.

The Beavers pounded out 15 hits to beat San Francisco 15 to 5 in Saturday's game. Scoreboard Sunday the attack with four safeties in four times at bat.

Bill Brown, formerly of the Athletics, allowed the Beavers to score in Sunday's opener while his major was collecting the same number off Grady Mitchell to win 3 to 2. The Beavers' Jimmy Kinnison, a left-handed pitcher, pitched the second game and hit safely 11 times to win 6 to 2.

Los Angeles was still in the lead with Sacramento for fourth place in the league standings after beating Seattle 3 to 2 in 12 innings on Saturday and losing to the Indians 11 to 5 and 10 to 8 on Sunday.

The San Francisco Giants took further into the cellar over the weekend, dropping two out of three games to Oakland. The Oaks won the Saturday game Saturday 5 to 3 and the Sunday game 11 to 5, with the Oakland pitcher, Denny, winning the doubleheader 1 to 0.

Drive For Drive Intent of Coach At Walla Walla

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Sept. 19.—A drive to develop drive will be launched by Coach Harold Dimick this afternoon when he calls his Walla Walla Blue Devils together for a busy week that will include a game for the reserves against Walla Walla, Friday and the opening of the gridiron season here against Pasco, Saturday.

Varsity players will be given the most attention in the efforts to secure more drive than has been offered so far, for in Pasco Dimick sees a direct threat facing the Blue Devils in their first regular game.

Headed by the mammoth tackle, Brinkley and Myers, both of whom hit 250 or better, and with a scattering of veterans for virtually all positions, Pasco will bring a distinct threat for the game. Coach Dimick has been drilling his charges for a real bid in the opening season. It will be the first action for 1932.

Need is Notable
Need of drive in line and backfield efforts was particularly noticeable for Walla Walla in Friday's scrimmage with Mac-Hi. The backs were not hitting as they should have, and the line was displaying the powerful thrusts that should have been shown.

In addition to pushing the players for punch, Dimick plans to get in a few extra practice games, kicking formations and some straight football, more to figure things out. These will be important factors in the game. Kinnison also will be given some extra practice.

"We aren't exactly ready for a game, but it will take some such competition as Pasco will offer to really show what the squad can do," Dimick said Saturday. He intends to go a good bit of work before then, however, both on the varsity and the reserves who will go to Walla Walla. A stronger second string team than usual is expected to be on the field for the Friday game against Coach Otto Wagner's eleven at Walla Walla.

Transfer Mac-Hi Game
Further developments in Walla Walla football Saturday included a definite transfer of the Mac-Hi game to the stadium. A transfer of the game was agreed to yesterday between officials of the two schools. Dimick and W. A. Lacey, principal, also completed plans for a new ticket arrangement for the season yesterday. The old season pass system is being discarded in favor of tickets. Those who held season passes and when presented at the gate will entitle the holder to attend all football and basketball games here for half the regular admission charge.

Gonzaga's Bulldogs had the Oregonians on the defense until the final quarter when with only one minute and 17 seconds to go Harold Pange took a pass from Johnny Blanton and ran for a touchdown.

Loren Tuttle, first-team right guard, returned home with a fractured shoulder and will be out of the lineup until the game with Southern California Oct. 8. Umatilla County Wheat Estimated At 3,750,000 Bu.

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 19.—(Special)—The wheat crop in Umatilla county this year is estimated by local grain men to be about three and three-quarter million bushels, or 30 per cent less than last year's crop, which is placed at five and one-half million bushels. There is much grain still stored on farms, so accurate figures are not available.

Wind and wheat caused the decrease in the wheat crop this year. Shortening of season and failure of some of the wheat to head properly and much of a good stand were lacking factors causing the decreased yield which was light in almost all sections of the county.

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CUBS MEET BUCS IN FINAL SERIES

Chicago Hopeful of Clinching National League Pennant Tomorrow

Given an off-day by the schedule makers today, the Chicago Cubs celebrated all their forces for a last clutch grapple with the Pittsburgh Pirates that may clinch the National League pennant for the Cubs no later than tomorrow.

Their spectacular 4-1 victory over the Cincinnati Reds in fifteen innings yesterday put the Cubs in a position where they can clinch the flag by any one victory over the Pirates in the four-game series which opens with a doubleheader in Pittsburgh tomorrow. Single games will be played Wednesday and Thursday. Even should the Pirates sweep the series and win their four clinching games with the St. Louis Cardinals, the Cubs still could win the pennant by beating Cincinnati in their last two games Saturday and Sunday.

Manager Breaks Up Dead
It was the incredible playboy, Reddy Seminary, who broke up the Cubs' deal with the Reds yesterday. The young catcher laid out a double with John Moore on second base in the 15th. Loumie Warlick started for the Cubs but gave way to a pinch hitter and Charlie Root pitched the last three innings. Red Lucas went the full route for the Reds.

The Pirates got effective pitching from Larry French and Leon Chapman, splitting two games with the Cardinals. Al Spolter's simple decision the first game in the Braves' favor in the ninth, 3-2, but Dizzy Dean stopped the strike, 5-2, in the nightcap.

In the American league, the champion New York Yankees beat the St. Louis Browns, 7-2, to give Johnny Allen his 17th victory.
