

Eggs One Cent Higher; Advance Is General One

PORTLAND, Sept. 20 (AP) — Further general advance of 1c in the price of eggs in the Portland market appears the result, chiefly of improved outside market conditions and values.

The advance which became effective during the day was the first showing for some time of strength for all grades and sizes. Recently the strength has been confined to the large sized offerings but the latest advance includes all offerings by local co-ops as well as private firms.

Receipts of large sized eggs are still decreasing with the volume scarcely of normal size. This together with decreasing storage stocks prove considerable aid to marketers toward forcing a higher price level.

While to some extent the steady advances recently have been due to the anxiety of speculative interests to get profits on their live house goods, the shortage of top quality has been apparent.

Profit taking by speculative interests who are withdrawing liberal supplies from storage, is causing a slight undertone of easiness in the market for butter here and along the coast generally.

Very good trading tone continues in the market for live chickens. No price changes are suggested. All sorts are in favor with prices generally maintained.

Market for country killed meats continues to reflect a firm tone. Sales continue up to a dime. Lamb is a trifle easier with hogs about steady.

Cattle and sheep are a trifle firmer to higher for the day. The Dillard stock is not ripening as fast as requirements. Best stock is up a dime for the day.

Increasing scarcity of offerings has resulted in a further advance in the price of cucumbers for pickling here with an especially great shortage in the dill size.

Peaches Fairly Active

Fairly active trading tone is showing for peaches with practically no further changes in prices. Dales and local stock continue in most favor with sheer quality and better packs. Phillip clings from The Dales are moving well.

Best quality home grown lettuce is being offered here but there is still considerable spread in values. There remains a lack of shipping demand which keeps values down to \$1 extreme.

Notes of wholesale trading: Dillard casabas are very fancy and are finding fair sale.

Potato markets are again indicating a steady tone.

Onions show a quiet demand but prices are inactive.

Green peas market continues congested.

There is a shortage of crabapples and prices are firmer.

Cabbage market is inclined to show weakness.

Movement of Late Crop Spuds Gains During The Week

CORVALLIS, Ore., Sept. 20 (AP) — Movement of late crop potatoes increased rapidly during the past week while prices were variable in the several coast and midwestern markets, said a review issued today by the O. S. C. extension service and the government agricultural bureau.

In Portland the market was steady to firm; in San Francisco it tended weaker; and in Chicago prices were slightly higher than a week ago but considerably under a year ago.

Shipments to date are only about 64 per cent of last year at the same time, while shipments for the past week ran about 1000 cars under a year ago.

Material shrinkage in estimates that occurred in the past month. Unfavorable conditions in Maine and some other important districts reduced the total crop prospects to 357 million bushels or 19 million bushels under a year ago. The 18 surplus-producing states show 10 million bushels less than a year ago.

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Asks R. F. C. To Finance Sale Of Wheat to Chinese

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 20 (AP) — More than 300 representatives of 6,000 co-operative growers in Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington demanded here Monday that the reconstruction finance corporation finance a sale of 20,000,000 bushels of northwest wheat to the Chinese government.

The farmers represented nearly every local co-operative affiliated with North Pacific Grain Growers, Inc., northwest regional marketing unit. The meeting was called by A. B. Shumway, of Milton, Ore., president of North Pacific.

More than a score of speakers indicated co-operative farmers of the region were willing to pool 25 per cent of their 1932 crop as a guarantee that 20,000,000 bushels can be delivered.

Henry Collins, of Portland, western vice president of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, said the 1932 crop for the Pacific northwest would be about 68,000,000 bushels and there is a 10,000,000 bushel carryover from 1931. The 1932-1933 feed and seed requirements he estimated at 25,400,000. With 5,000,000 bushels already sold, he said there are 38,000,000 bushels to be disposed of.

V. R. Hyslop, Deep Creek, Wash., summed up the farmers' situation as: "We farmers have the wheat; there is no market for it now. We must sell it. China is the natural market, but can buy only on credit. There is only one answer—the R. F. C. must finance the sale and we farmers must guarantee the wheat for delivery."

Collins said Canadian, Argentine and Australian growers are attempting to make a credit sale to China now.
