Breakfast
Tomato Juice in Tall Thin Glasses
Sausage Cakes on Hot Corn Bread
Eggs in Buerre Noie
Coffee — or Tea

Tuna Baked in Biscuits—Fried Bananas
Coffee, Tea or Chocolate

Broiling

Broiled Steaks — Meat Accompaniments, Platter Meal
Tomato Juice Cocktails
Add plenty of seasonings — salt, pepper, tobacco, Worcestershire, bit of sugar, lemon juice, onion juice, celery salt. And, of course, serve thoroughly chilled.
Sausage Cakes on Corn Bread
Cream 3 tablespoons shortening—add ½ cup sugar 1 egg and 1 yolk beaten lightly. Add ¾ cup milk alternately with the following mixture:
1½ cups flour
¾ cups cornmeal
2½ teaspoons baking powder
¼ teaspoon salt
Bake at 400 degrees F. for 20 to 25 minutes. Cut into squares, split each square and use under.
Sausage Cakes
Shape pork sausage meat in rounds about 2 inches in diameter and ½ inch thick. Cook in an aluminum spider or bake in oven until brown.
Eggs in Buerre Noie
Melt 2 tablespoons butter in a small frying pan and cook 4 eggs over heat until set. Remove to hot plates, season with salt and pepper and sprinkle with finely chopped chives. Add 2½ tablespoons butter to frying pan, let it turn brown. Add 1 tablespoon vinegar. Remove from heat and pour over eggs.
Brunch
(We choose our color scheme)
Grapefruit
Notch edges of grapefruit and prepare for serving. Allow 1 tablespoon sweet sherry or sweet port flavoring to each half of grapefruit. Prepare night before so flavors will blend. Top with a maraschino cherry.
Tuna Fish in Biscuits
Make 2 cups white sauce and into

Meat Accompaniments
Sherry Sauce — Reduce ¼ cup cooking sherry to ½ cup. Add 1 cup or more of rich brown sauce. Beat until boiling. Simmer until it coats a spoon.
Broiled Steak with Marrow Cubes — Broil steak as usual. Flange beef marrow into boiling water for a minute and drain. Fry fresh mushrooms and serve with marrow cubes around steak.
California Frozen Pudding
Whip 1 quart cream and fold in ½ cup sugar, 1 cup chopped assorted candied fruits, ¼ cup sweet sherry flavoring. Freeze in automatic refrigerator.
Platter Meals
