TODAY WE HAVE

FREDERICK M. HUFFMAN

On Aug. 19, 1897, Fred M. Huffman was born to Charles D. and Jerusha Anne (McAlister) Huffman at Eugene, Ore. When he was three years of age he came to this county with his parents. They farmed on a place north of La Grande. Later they sold it and bought the farm where the mother now lives, one and one-half miles east from La Grande. When this place was purchased, there were practically no improvements but within a few years all kinds of fruit trees and plants which they had set out, began to bear fruit. The evergreen trees and shrubbery they had planted as a setting for the commodious house and the outbuildings which they had previously built, began to enhance the beauty of the place until now it is one of the well improved places of that locality.

C. D. Huffman was born in Salem in 1870. After attending the elementary schools in Lane county, he went to Monmouth where he completed a scientific course. He taught in the Western Oregon for a term of years and then he bought a hop farm which he operated until it was washed away by a flood. In July, 1899, he married Miss Anna McAlister of Union county. In 1899 he moved to Grande Ronde valley. In the 90s following the panic of '93, he was elected to the legislature as a representative from this district and held the office for several years. For many years he was very prominent in grave affairs, having held responsible offices in that organization until his death which occurred several years ago. Mrs. Huffman, a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Miller, came to Grande Ronde valley in 1862 with her parents, having been among the emigrants included in the Young wagon train.

Details Giving For Mutton Curing

There has been much wholesome agitation in the county the last week due to the visit of H. A. Lindgren, livestock specialist from the state college, along the line of palatable methods for preparing mutton. This is especially apropos as ewes can scarcely be given away these days.

Those who have eaten cured mutton say that it is difficult to distinguish between the taste of it and that of ham. To most persons cured mutton (uncooked) is very palatable. In the Scandinavian countries the curing of mutton is an old practice but it is almost entirely new in this country.

The following recipe for dry curing mutton or pork is one recommended by the extension service in home economics of Oregon State Agricultural college.

Curing agents used are: (1) salt—the main ingredient of all curing processes. Pure, finely ground salt is best to use. (2) sugar—either white or brown sugar is satisfactory. Brown
