Smoke Writing

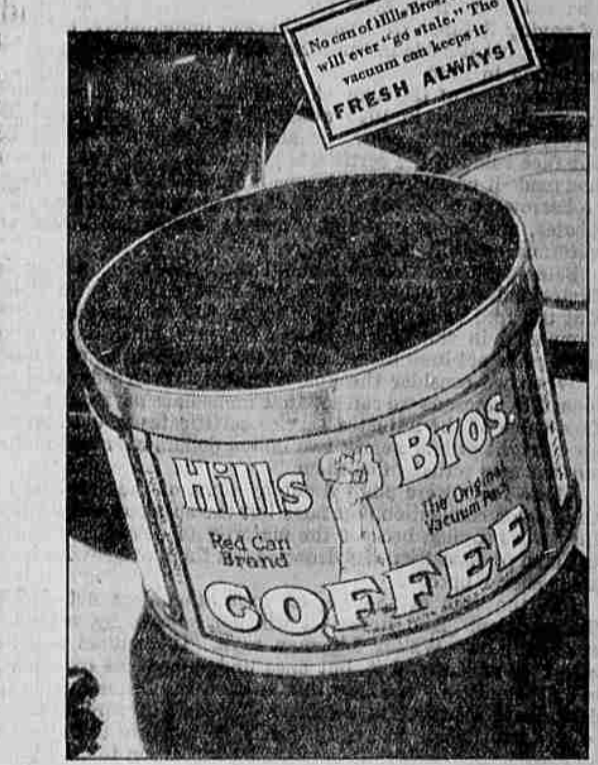
