Speaking of hunting conditions, they said that the forests appeared very dry and that danger of fire has not passed, in spite of the recent showers, which did not soak up the forests to any extent.

ADMIRAL RESIGNS FROM LEGION DUE TO BONUS STAND

would seriously strain the national credit.

The directors also asked a \$400,000,000 out in federal expenditures.

In opposing cash payment of the bonus, the directors said:

"The veterans of the World war have been generously treated by the provisions of the adjusted compensation act as amended. To accede to a demand for immediate cash payment of this unearned obligation would place a staggering blow of \$2,200,000,000 on the treasury with a consequent strain upon the national credit in an unbalancing of the budget which might result in national disaster."

"Further recessions and an inevitable increase in taxation, would be unfavorable to the veterans themselves."
