The Union County Labor exchange has received a letter from E. E. NEW SILENCER MUFFLES NOISE OF GIANT GUNS
NAPLES, Italy (AP)—A device which greatly reduces sound and smoke in the discharge of artillery has been invented by two young Italian engineers and offered to the government.

It can be attached to the muzzle of any field gun and in trials before war department officials it declared that the sound of the discharge carried only a few hundred yards. Only a light puff of smoke arose, quickly disappearing.
