DUCKS DROP TWO TO LOS ANGELES DURING THE WEEK

Seattle to Play at Portland and Hollywood at Los Angeles as Pennant Race Tightens.

The Coast league pennant race tightened over the weekend as the Hollywood Stars gained a half game on the Portland Ducks and drew up to within two games of the league leaders. The Ducks dropped Los Angeles, 17 to 12 Saturday night and divided a double header Sunday afternoon, while the Stars won their Sunday double header with Oakland.

In the twin bill at Portland Sunday, the Ducks took the first game 4 to 1 and dropped the second to the Angels 5 to 1. In the opener the visitors played errorless ball and hit safely 8 times to Portland's 6 but were unable to break them at the right time. The Ducks scored once in the fifth, again in the sixth and twice in the eighth. The lone Angel tally came in the fifth.

Win Ballou turned in a fine mound performance for the Angels in the second game, limiting the league leaders to 5 scattered hits and one run while his mates were collecting 14 hits and five runs, scoring the latter an inning at a time. No Speeches for Jones

LOS ANGELES (P) — If Coach Howard Jones of the University of Southern California is to assume, as is not a far belief, the role played by the late Knute Rockne in intercollegiate football, he will do so without benefit of oratory.

The former Notre Dame mentor coupled his reputation with his great coaching ability. Jones is by nature reticent and entirely lacking in the qualities of showmanship, but nevertheless a remarkable instructor of the game.

He is never given to oratory, either on the practice field or prior to a game. During a contest he sits passively on the sidelines, win, lose or draw.

Starting 21st Season

Jones enters his twenty-first season as a coach this fall, preparing the Trojans for the defense of their national grid title. In that score of years since he graduated from Yale, the Head Man, as all Troy knows him, has seen his teams win 136 games, lose 37 and tie nine for a .778 average.

His seven-year record at the University of Southern California is the most brilliant. The Trojans under his direction have won 64 games, lost 10 and tied two. Five of the ten defeats, four of them at the hands of Rockne coached eleveners, were lost by the margin of one point.

Teams All "In Money"

Since Jones' advent on the Pacific Coast in 1925, his team has won or tied for the Pacific Coast Conference championship four times, placed second twice, and third once, besides winning the national championship in 1928 and again last year.

Unlike Rockne, who devoted his coaching career to Notre Dame, Jones has been something of a nomad of the gridiron. He started out at Syracuse in 1908, went to Yale where he had played end, in 1909, returned to the state of his birth, coaching at Ohio State for three seasons, and then shifted back to Yale for a three-year stay.

In 1916 he became coach at Iowa University where he gained a name for himself in the Big Ten conference, winning the championship twice before going to Duke University for a one year stay in 1924.

Coached 16 All-Americans

During the 20-year period he coached 16 men who received All-American citations. The latest of these were Morley Drury, Morton

Kaer and Erny Pinkert, all of S. C. Although 47 years old, Jones still is the most active member of his coaching staff. He assumes complete control of his linemen in practice, physically demonstrating to his most rugged men the finer points of the game. He never swears at his men but does not praise or criticize in halting terms.

Like Rockne, he is a disciple of the shift. He is no less a stickler for sound fundamentals than was the Notre Dame coach. Given the same material to work with, many think it would have been difficult to choose between them.

In the banquet table Jones would have been outshined. He much prefers to be out hooking the limit on some mountain stream, or hooking to the limit on some golf course when football is out of season—and does.

Bear's Loss To Santa Clara Is Only Big Upset

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 26 (P) — With preliminary engagements behind them, eight of the ten members of the Pacific Coast conference will line up this weekend in games bearing on the 1932 championship.

The opening battle in the annual scramble for the major circuit title will take place Friday night at Los Angeles with Coach Leo Calland's University of Idaho Vandals opposing Bill Spaulding's University of California at Los Angeles Bruins.

Not much of a factor in conference play for several seasons, Idaho gave indications of going somewhere this year by administering a 49-0 trouncing to Whitman last Saturday. U. C. L. A. likewise made a strong impression in its non-conference test last week with a 26-0 victory over the California Aggies.

Trojans Show Class
In running the Utes into the ground, Coach Howard Jones' Trojans revealed a swift breaking offense built around the speedy backfield men.

Two contests in the Northwest will bring Stanford and Oregon State together at Portland with Washington and Montana in their traditional conference opener at Seattle. Stanford defeated University of San Francisco by a 32-0 score. Washington and Montana posted victories in their non-conference affairs, the former beating the strong Gonzaga eleven, 19-7, and Montana taking Anaconda club down the line 20 to 0.

The other conference members, ference opposition, Oregon's Game at Eugene will be one of the focal points of the season. The Webfoots, who are on University of Santa Clara, conquer last Saturday of California, by a 12-0 score.

California, as one of the teams to beat for the conference title, was outclassed from start to finish by the smoothest-functioning eleven ever to wear the colors of Santa Clara. As a result of the victory the Bronco won over many supporters who believe they will topple Oregon in the forthcoming encounter. Last Friday night, Oregon defeated Pacific, 26-0.

With the defeat by Santa Clara expected to act as a whip lash, California will take on an old time opponent, the San Francisco Olympic club, Saturday at Berkeley. In two previous starts, the club team lost to West Coast Army, 7-6, and to Stanford, 6-0.

ST. MARY'S GAELS WIN

MAJOR LEAGUES WIND UP SEASON

Phillies Move Into Fourth Place — Fox Hits His 58th Home Run.

The records of the New York Yankees and the Chicago Cubs for the 1932 season furnish a study in marked contrast as the teams await the signal that will send them against each other Wednesday in the world's series.

The Yankees ran away with the American league flag, finishing with the second highest percentage ever recorded by a pennant winner in the junior circuit, .692.

The Cubs won only after a terrific battle and then were only one game ahead of the lowest mark that ever won a National League flag. The Yankees won 107 games and lost 47 and might have done better if they had been pressed in the latter part of the race.

The Cubs recorded 90 victories and 64 defeats for a .584 average. The league records they approached are .714 by the 1927 Yankee team and .578 by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1926.

Yanks Never Blanked

The Yankees likewise knocked the daylight out of the major league record for consecutive games without being shut out by scoring in every one of the 156 games they played. This came on top of 35 games at the end of 1931 and gave them a total of 211 in a row and completely eclipsed the mark of 132 established by the Boston and Philadelphia National teams in 1894. The Cubs were blanked eight times this year.

One point of similarity cropped up yesterday when each team lost its final game of the season to a last place club, the Yanks succumbing to the Boston Red Sox, 8-3, and the Cubs going down before the Cincinnati Reds, 3-5.

Phillies In Fourth Place

In keeping with the tightness of the National league race all through the season, two places in the final standing were not decided until the final day. Philadelphia took fourth by winning the second game of a double header from the New York Giants 6-3 after losing the first, 5-3. The single victory kept Boston out of a tie with the Braves.

The Braves triumphed in Brooklyn, 13-7. New York and St. Louis tied for sixth as each split a twin bill. The Cardinals lost the first to Pittsburgh, 7-1, and won the second, 7-4.

The runaway race in the American league did serious damage to attendance figures but as a whole it was a financial success for most of the club owners.

Outside of the games, the real fans found plenty of excitement in Babe Ruth's physical condition and in the sudden upset of the Cubs at the end of July when Rogers Hornsby was dropped from the managerial post and Charley Grimm was given the job.

Leading the charge to the championship, Ruth was out twice with injuries, a torn leg muscle and a threatened appendicitis attack, but still managed to stay within shouting distance of Jimmie Fox of the Athletics in the home run race.

Fox Hits 58

Fox fell a trifling short of equalling Ruth's major league home run record of 60 but hit his 58th circuit ball yesterday. It came in the ninth inning as the Athletics lost a 2-1 decision to Washington. In the other American league games yesterday, Detroit took a 2-1 decision from St. Louis and Cleveland and Chicago played a 5-5 tie in the second game of a double header after the Indians had won the first, 6-4. Wise Money Goes On Schmeling To Defeat Walker

NEW YORK, Sept. 26 (P) — To the betting fraternity, Max Schmeling is a 5 to 1 shot to win little Mickey Walker in their 15-round, heavy-weight match in Madison Square Garden tonight but Mr. John H. Fan seems to have another idea.

Otherwise there's no explaining the heavy advance sale reported by the Garden nor the apparently reliable predictions of a "gate" of around \$200,000 and a crowd of 60,000 or more.

Perhaps the large percentage of prospective customers recalls the July night last year when Mickey stepped into the ring to face Sharkey, now the heavyweight champion. The Rumson, N. J., gamster conceded Sharkey 30 pounds in weight and every other physical advantage that night yet gained a draw in 15 rounds and, in the opinion of some critics, was clearly entitled to the decision.

Garden Expects Profit
But whatever the reason, the Garden expects to close the outdoor season with considerable profit to itself and the milk fund, always assuming a favorable "break" from the weather.

The fight, originally scheduled for last Friday, twice was postponed when Walker developed a case of boils and the delay has done nothing to hurt the receipts. Now it will catch the advance guard of customers arriving for the first game of the new series here Wednesday.

Just as in the Sharkey bout, Walker will have to concede all the physical advantages to Schmeling. The Teuton is five years younger, nearly 20 pounds heavier and will have corresponding advantages in height and reach. But Walker, provided he decides to fight a cagey battle, is conceded some chance of outsmarting the German if he can keep away from Schmeling's lethal right.

Battle of Body Punches
Apparently it will be a battle of body-punchers for Walker's best punch is a left to the body and Schmeling has been working on a right smash to the same sector. With the idea of counteracting Mickey's most effective weapon.

Weighing-in ceremonies were to be staged at the New York state athletic commission offices this afternoon. The fight was to go on between 9-30 and 10-00 o'clock eastern standard time.

PORTLAND, Sept. 26 (P) — Cantaloupes were firmer and generally higher today on the east side farmers' wholesale market. Offerings were of somewhat better volume from both Willamette valley and Yakima points. In general sales were made \$1.15 to \$1.25 top for fancy stuff with an extreme of \$1.35 and a low point for good stuff at \$1.01.

Demand for pickling cucumbers continued unabated with prices held firm at full figures of recent days. The situation in tomatoes continues steady with most sales of 15c to 18c and \$1.30 and a few \$1.35 again.

Peach prices were steady with Dalles Salways 40c and Philip clings 35c box while Yakima Elbertas were mostly 25c to 30c; and J. H. Hale 30c to 40c box.

Apples sold in greater volume but with little change in the price. Gravensteins were in favor at late prices with Northern Spy offerings increased. Sales of these were around 60c to 65c for face and fill while Kings moved 45c to 50c.

Grape market was very quiet with local Concord type around 25c to 30c for lug and 30c to 35c for crate. California Zinfandels were 60c for lug with Tokays around 70c to 75c. The Dalles Muscats were 60c for 15c with Tokays 65c.
