### REOPENING OF IDAHO, OREGON BANKS LIKELY

BOISE, Ida., Sept. 27 (AP)—Reopening of ten affiliated banks in Southern Idaho and Eastern Oregon, whose closing Aug. 31 tied up approximately \$10,000,000 in deposits, was the object of a plan announced here last night.

The plan was made public following a conference between a committee of leading business men in cooperation. Under the plan, which fixed no date for the contemplated reopening, it was stated frozen assets of the banks, all affiliated with the First National bank of Boise, will be removed by subscription of \$800,000. Half of the stock already has been subscribed, the announcement said.

Depositors would be assured 100 per cent on the dollar under the plan and those with less than \$200 might withdraw all or any part immediately.

### One Section Of State Tuition Law Not Legal

### NAVY BALLOON WINS GORDON BENNETT CUP

WARSAW, Poland, Sept. 27 (AP)—The United States navy balloon participating in the Gordon Bennett cup race landed at 10 a. m. today close to the town of Wajulje, near Vilna on the Polish-Latvian frontier.

The exact distance it had traveled from Basel, where the race started, had not been computed, but it appeared virtually certain that the navy bag had won the race and the cup.

The navy balloon won last year's American national race also. The pilot this time was Lieutenant G. W. Settle and Wilfred Bushnell.

Word from the little town where they landed said they had been forced down when the balloon cover burst. They landed safely, however, and loaded the bag into a farmer's cart which took it to the railroad station at Ignalino on the line between Vilna and Riga.

## SENATE BECOMES DEMOCRATIC WITH APPOINTMENT

DENVER, Sept. 27 (AP)—The Democratic outburst in the United States senate today in the United States senate with the appointment of Walter Walker, Grand Junction newspaper publisher, to that body to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Senator Charles W. Waterman.

On the roster of the upper house now are 48 Democrats, 47 Republicans and one Farmer Labor member.

Appointment of Walker by Governor William H. Adams yesterday was not unexpected. But Colorado political circles were still uncertain today whether the recently retired chairman of the Democratic state central committee would serve in the lame duck session of congress, which convenes in December or whether he will serve only until a successor to Waterman is chosen at the general election November 8. Waterman's term expires March 4.

Colorado election laws make no provision for the nomination of candidates in circumstances of this nature. Governor Adams said he has received widely varying advice on the matter. He declared his appointment was made to fill the vacancy as provided by the law and that the term of office is for others to determine.

Walker has long been active in the Democratic party in the state, was a delegate to the last three national conventions and was chairman of the Colorado delegation at the Chicago convention in June. He served as state chairman for two years, retiring voluntarily last week. He has been a confidant and advisor of Governor Adams.

## HOOPER NAMES CRISP MEMBER OF COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—President Hoover today appointed Representative Charles D. Crisp (D., Ga.) to the tariff commission filling the vacancy created several days ago by the death of Lincoln Dixon.

A statement from the White House pointed out that the tariff commission is a bi-partisan body, of which not more than three of the six members can be members of the same political party.

The appointment of Crisp, it was explained, will preserve the bi-partisan character of the commission.

The late commissioner Dixon served as a Democrat in congress for several terms before his appointment and was a member of the house ways and means committee during his service.

Crisp was acting chairman of the ways and means committee during the last session.

Crisp later said he had informed President Hoover he would resign his seat in the house within two weeks to take up his new duties.

## Forest Lookouts Work Until Rain

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27 (AP)—Forest lookouts in Oregon and those who still remain on duty in Eastern Washington will remain at their posts until the first heavy rain this fall, says an announcement from the regional office of the forest service here.

All lookouts west of the Cascades in Washington have been withdrawn but virtually all lookouts are still on duty in Oregon. The earlier opening of the deer season in Oregon, Sept. 20, is responsible for keeping Oregon lookouts on the job, the announcement said. In most sections of Washington the season does not open until October 1.

## \$86,160 Advanced To Klamath Falls

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The reconstruction corporation today advanced \$86,160 of emergency relief funds to Klamath county, Ore.

## SENATE BECOMES DEMOCRATIC WITH APPOINTMENT

DENVER, Sept. 27 (AP)—The Democratic outburst in the United States senate today in the United States senate with the appointment of Walter Walker, Grand Junction newspaper publisher, to that body to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Senator Charles W. Waterman.

On the roster of the upper house now are 48 Democrats, 47 Republicans and one Farmer Labor member.

Appointment of Walker by Governor William H. Adams yesterday was not unexpected. But Colorado political circles were still uncertain today whether the recently retired chairman of the Democratic state central committee would serve in the lame duck session of congress, which convenes in December or whether he will serve only until a successor to Waterman is chosen at the general election November 8. Waterman's term expires March 4.

Colorado election laws make no provision for the nomination of candidates in circumstances of this nature. Governor Adams said he has received widely varying advice on the matter. He declared his appointment was made to fill the vacancy as provided by the law and that the term of office is for others to determine.

Walker has long been active in the Democratic party in the state, was a delegate to the last three national conventions and was chairman of the Colorado delegation at the Chicago convention in June. He served as state chairman for two years, retiring voluntarily last week. He has been a confidant and advisor of Governor Adams.

## CONDITION OF GANDHI SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

POONA, India, Sept. 27 (AP)—Mahatma Gandhi was progressing favorably today, his physicians said, after breaking his "death fast" yesterday.

His diet today consisted of grapefruit juice and sugar, and tomorrow he was expected to be able to take some barley water and milk whey.

He was visited in his quarters at Yeroda fall, this morning by the noted Indian poet, Rabindranath Tagore, Pandit Mandan Mohan Malaviya, and several other prominent Indian leaders.

This was the mahatma's 63d birthday, according to the Hindu calendar, but there was no special observance here.

## Submarine Death Toll At 3 Today

CHERBOURG, France, Sept. 27 (AP)—The death toll of the explosion aboard the French submarine Persee off Cherbourg yesterday rose to three today as two more of the 31 injured died.

The number of injured this morning was 29, four of whom were in a very serious condition.

The Persee was towed in and moored beside the arsenal here. There were large fissures in the motor compartment, but the hull was undamaged.

## Car License Sale Shows an Increase

SALEM, Sept. 27 (AP)—Sales of three-quarter year automobile licenses have shown a marked increase this fall over 1931 sales, announces Secretary of State Hal E. Hove.

Since Sept. 21 when three-quarter licenses went on sale, 3701 have been sold, as compared to 1442 up to Oct. 1 last year. Hove predicts the sale of 5000 by Oct. 1.

Total registration for this year is now 188,548, as against 228,549 on Sept. 24 of last year.

## Postal Employee Sentenced to Pen

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27 (AP)—Henry P. Peacock, formerly assistant postmaster at Astoria, Ore., pleaded guilty in federal court here Monday to a charge of embezzling post office funds, totaling about \$8000, and was sentenced to four years in a federal penitentiary.

Peacock had been employed by the postoffice department since 1902. He was indicted by a federal grand jury on the embezzlement charge in the spring of 1931.
