The fire started about 4:30 and the firemen responded quickly but the house was soon enveloped in flames, and not even furniture was saved. The house, owned by Leon Levy, was occupied by the Neuner family and Mrs. Neuner was reported to be preparing supper when fire broke out in the roof. She collapsed during the fire and a physician had to be summoned to care for her. Speaking of the antiquity of the building, Sam Haynes remarked that it was the only one standing in the southeast section of town and already was an old building when he came to Union 55 years ago. It was occupied at that time by A. F. Argensinger. No insurance was carried.
