PRESIDENT IS EN ROUTE TO DES MOINES

Three bands were playing as the train entered the city. There were applause and cheers as the president and first lady emerged. He leaned over the railing to shake hands with those nearest him.

Governor Dan Turner, of Iowa, and an official reception committee boarded the train at Davenport where another crowd estimated by police at 15,000 cheered the president and first lady.

One of President Hoover's secretaries termed the speech he will deliver tonight as a "fighting" address, and Senator Dickinson (R., Iowa), who boarded the train at Chicago, and conferred the president about it en route, said it would mark the beginning of a new phase in the campaign.

"Up to this point," Dickinson said, "the campaign has been to attack President Hoover's record. He has made such an outstanding record that the attacks will fall by the wayside.

"The next phase of the campaign will be attacks on the Democratic program as unworkable. This speech is the foundation for that program."

Expects Farm Approval
Dickinson also expressed the view that the president's speech would give the Republican cause a great boost in the farm area.

When the president finished speaking he and Mrs. Hoover stood for a few moments waving to the crowd.

Then little William Butler, one of the hundreds of school children in the crowd, got a bright idea. He handed a piece of paper to the president, saying:

"How about your signature, Mr. President?"

Smilingly the president took the paper and signed his name. In a moment the air was filled with hundreds of scraps of paper, notes or anything available. The president had signed scores of slips before the train pulled away.

DES MOINES, Ia., Oct. 4 (AP)—Back to his native prairies and his childhood friends came Herbert Hoover today.

He was welcomed not less by the woods and plains and creeks, now touched by fall's alchemy, than by those persons with whom he was swimming and nutting, and tramping fifty years ago.

There were scores of persons from President Hoover's boyhood village of West Branch who arrived in automobiles, or in the president's special train, to recall again the days when he was "Bertie" Hoover, and pledge support in his campaign for reelection, in the interests of which he will speak here tonight.

Mrs. Mollie Carran and Mr. and Mrs. Fred Albion, who still live in Quaker-built West Branch, prepared to board the special at West Liberty, envious of hundreds of their neighbors who counted on going down to the station to get a glimpse of Mr. and Mrs. Hoover.

Mrs. Carran, one of the president's early teachers, even since she got the invitation from the president a week ago, has prepared for this occasion. She was "all thrills," she said.

His first teacher, Mrs. Elizabeth Chandler Sumner of Iowa City, hoped to go to the station there while the train paused for a few minutes. She did not plan, however, to come to Des Moines.

Mrs. Sumner, who remembers "Bertie" as an apple-cheeked lad who could be trusted to sit in the back of the room, says she's sure of his reelection "if people just stop to think."

Next Butler, who lived a half block from Hoover's home in West Branch and frequently played with Bert in his father's blacksmith shop, is a Democrat, but he said he would vote again for the president.

"It will be a close race, but Hoover will win," he said.



BIRDS HELPED IN AMERICA'S DISCOVERY
COLUMBUS CHANGED HIS COURSE AND FOLLOWED THE LINE OF FLIGHT OF MIGRATING BIRDS, AND IT WAS THE SIGHTING OF LAND BIRDS THAT GAVE THE DISCOURAGED SAILORS THE HEART TO GO ON.

COLUMBUS, by changing his course to correspond with the line of flight of the migrating birds, shortened his route to land by 200 miles, eventually landing in the Bahama Islands. At the time the birds were first seen, Columbus was some 650 miles from the Bahamas. His men were on the verge of mutiny, through fear and superstition, but the sight of the birds changed their spirits entirely.

BETTINA SALAD, SERVING 8
2 tablespoons granulated gelatin
1/2 cup cold water
2 cups boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup lemon juice
1 cup diced celery
2-3 cup crab meat
4 tablespoons chopped olives
3 tablespoons chopped pickle relish
3 tablespoons chopped green peppers
1 teaspoon chopped onions
3 slices tomatoes
Soak gelatin in cold water 5 minutes. Add boiling water and stir until gelatin dissolves. Add sugar, salt and lemon juice. Cool. Add celery, crab, olives, relish, peppers and onions. Pour into shallow mold which has been rinsed out in cold water. Chill until stiff. With round cutter cut out circles of salad and arrange on slices of tomatoes which have been placed on lettuce. Top with mayonnaise and serve.

Supreme Stuffed Celery
12 three inch stalks crisp celery
3 tablespoons pimiento cheese
1 tablespoon chopped nuts
2 tablespoons salad dressing
1-8 teaspoon salt

Windsor Stuffed Celery
12 three inch stalks celery
4 tablespoons white cream cheese
2 tablespoons broken pecans
3 tablespoons chopped pimiento
stuffed olives
2 tablespoons mayonnaise
Mix cheese, pecans, olives and mayonnaise. Stuff celery and chill. Chocolate Sauce Lenox
2-3 cup dark brown sugar
2-3 cup sugar
2 squares chocolate
2 tablespoons flour
1-8 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups water
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla
Blend sugars, add chocolate, flour, salt and water. Cook slowly and stir constantly until sauce thickens. Add vanilla. Serve warm or chilled.

IDEAS ABOUT GOD

A little girl who was extremely dissatisfied with her red hair was told by her grandmother that she mustn't mind the color of her hair because God had made it and whatever God had made must be quite all right.

The child, however, refused to accept the proffered comfort and answered stoutly: "Well, if God made my hair I don't want him ever to make anything for me again."

The utterance is typical of the child's naive, untutored attitude toward the idea of God. The concept of the Deity can have for him no special attributes of essential goodness, sanctity and omnipotence until he is definitely taught these things by adults, who themselves have faith.

The evolution of childish ideas about God often goes through strange phases. A German author writes of a little boy, who while listening to his mother's discourse upon the nature of God happened to look out of the window at a golden rooster weather vane shining in the afternoon sun.

While she was explaining that God was not a man but a spirit the child

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felt a sudden conviction within himself that the shining weather vane outside the window must be God. Later when a picture book containing an illustration of a magnificent eagle was given to him he privately changed his opinion and decided that such a creature must indeed be God.

Childish attitude toward God, then, not to be taken as irreverence even if they seem to indicate a lamentable lack of proper respect.

Until the child has passed beyond the primitive, concrete phase of thinking until, in other words, he has reached a certain degree of intellectual and emotional maturity, all criticism of the way he chooses to envisage God must be to him meaningless or confusing.

before a savings division meeting. "A huge government building program to relieve the depression may defeat its own aim," he said. "We must bear in mind that funds for public construction work are derived from taxes, most of which must be paid now when we are little able to carry the added burden."

Approximately 3000 persons are assembled here from various parts of the continent for the convention, the fourth to be held in Los Angeles. Harry J. Haas, of Philadelphia, president of the association, will call the convention to order and deliver his annual message. In a pre-convention statement, he said he would urge bankers to fight against any radical change in banking principles that may be put forth as a result of the economic disturbance, declaring that fundamentally banks are sound.

Following Haas, William B. Munro, professor of government at the California Institute of Technology and a nationally recognized authority on the problems of government, will deliver an address on "the political foundation of national prosperity."

The feature event of the opening day's program will be an address in the evening by Secretary of the Treasury Ogden L. Mills.

NEW CLASS IS ORGANIZED IN BIBLE SCHOOL

A new class to be known as the College Young People's class was begun in the Bible school of the Church of Christ Sunday morning. This class will be of special interest to young people attending Normal school. The pastor of the church, Rev. Paul De F. Mortimore, will act as teacher for the first meeting of the class Sunday that instead of following the uniform lessons as outlined in regular Bible school literature, he intends to make a "problem discussion" class of it, trying to find an answer to the questions which the young people themselves bring to the class.
