

Withdrawals Of Butter Creates Some Uneasiness

PORTLAND, Oct. 5 (AP) — Heavy withdrawals of butter at practically all storage centers of the Pacific slope are creating more or less uneasiness in the pending trade.

There was no change whatever in the local egg situation for Wednesday. Prices were intact for the various offerings although the large supply of cold storage stock has an unsettling influence.

Live chicken prices here continue out of line with what other markets along the coast are quoting.

Weather conditions are such that operators are finding it impossible to give satisfaction in dressed turkey trading.

Despite the assurance of the trade there, Yakima is still shipping No. 2 potatoes to the Portland and other markets in carload lots.

Notes of wholesale trading: Central American coconuts have finally arrived after much delay, priced at \$4 hundred.

California walnuts are finding a slow sale for new crop at 15 1/2 c for No. 1 Emeralds.

Shipments of Grain To China Expected To Start Shortly

SPOKANE, Wash., Oct. 5 (AP) — Henry W. Collins, of Portland, western vice president of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, said Tuesday first shipments of grain to China, in connection with a \$15,000,000 bond credit sale to the nationalist government "probably will be made this month."

Although completion of financing arrangements for the credit sale have not been announced, Collins said he was "confident" the deal would be consummated soon.

At the same time A. C. Adams, general manager of North Pacific Grain Growers, Inc., northwest co-operative marketing unit, and manager of the farmers' pool being formed to guarantee deliveries of wheat, said the pool would be closed at 8 p. m. Oct. 12.
