The program for the dedication of Rankin Field east of La Grande Sunday, Oct. 9, was completed today. It will begin at 10 o'clock in the morning when visiting airplanes from neighboring states will begin to arrive, and will conclude with the Hamilton's parachute jump at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Dedication at 1:30 The field will be formally dedicated at 1:30 p. m. when Hugh E. Brady will deliver a dedication speech. The La Grande airport, one of the largest and most modern in Eastern Oregon, will be named Rankin Field in memory of Dudley Rankin, aviator who died of injuries in Walla Walla a few weeks ago. Mr. Rankin was very prominent in developing aviation in this community.

Flames Held in Check Today in Western Oregon By Man and Nature.

DANGER PERIOD BELIEVED AT END

MATERIAL LOSS AROUND \$3,000,000—HEAVY SMOKE DISRUPTS AIRMAIL SCHEDULES IN NORTHWEST.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 6 (AP)—Held in check by man and nature, forest fires smoldered in burned-over timber areas in Western Oregon today, sending vast seas of murky smoke over the countryside. In the Yaquina section of Washington fires continued to burn on a wide front but no further danger was anticipated, forestry officials said.

Gasoline Use Is Less Than in '31

Secretary of State Hal E. Ross announced today. Ross reported 14,879,520 gallons gasoline sold last month. The consumption was reflected in the return to collected under that state fuel tax law to the amount of \$52,243.43. Tax returns from the various companies amounting during August totaled \$607,748.91.
