

Irish of Columbia to Tackle Rugged Mountaineers in Portland Tonight

E. O. N. TEAM IN PORTLAND FACES COLUMBIA SQUAD

Two New Guards to Get Chance in Irish Lineup According to Gene Murphy, Grid Mentor.

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 13 (Special)—The Columbia football clan, with its Sherman, Sullivan, Carrs, Thomases and Neils, and coached by the Irishest of em all, Gene Murphy, ex-Notre Damester, will clash with the Eastern Oregon Normal Teachers on Multnomah stadium field tonight.

The game starts at 8:15 o'clock. This will be the first Portland appearance of Bob Quinn, ex-Oregon State, and his school teachers.

Quinn comes with a club reared in the double wingback offensive as taught by Pop Warner at Stanford. This is Columbia's second start of the season. In the first, against Pacific, the Irish staged a brilliant passing attack that overcame a two-touchdown lead, and the score ended, 12-11, Pacific has a better outfit than Columbia, but not quite as fast.

Merri Nehl, Albin and John Thomas, Irish backs, do the passing and most of the catching. Albin, it was, who as a substitute, uncorked a long toss over the safety's head that Nehl picked on the dead run. He scored easily. John Corcoran is the punting back. Corcoran can hit a line like a power house.

Murphy tonight will open with two new guards, Dutch Dungan and Patrick Michael Carr, a pair of stalwarts trained at Grant by Walt Long, and regulars there last fall, will be in the starting lineup. Murphy will start Carr, a short, broad-shouldered guard, instead of Tony Rogers, ex-Commerce and the greatest of 'em all. Rogers will be given a rest in preparation for the coming game with Linfield next week.

In case the Teachers become too adept at smashing down the Columbia front wall, Rogers will be used only sparingly. Carr and Dungan, as freshmen, have shown much promise, and Murphy would like to give them a real chance in the heat of competition.

Tom Sherman is a veteran at center and an outstanding player both offensively and defensively. Pete Letzweber and John Slunbeck are two experienced tackles, while Morrison and Piskell have been at end in many tough contests.

Russ Doeschler, ex-Commerce fullback, reported to Columbia last week and has been added to the squad. This makes nine ex-Portland prepsters in the outfit. These include Rogers, Dungan, Carr, Corcoran, Terrence Harding, from Jeff, Frank Heniges from Washington, Joe Roholt and Philo Grimes.

BIG HIGH SCHOOL GAMES SCHEDULED

La Grande Vs. Enterprise, Baker Vs. Ontario, Mac-Hi Vs. The Dalles Listed

High school football in Eastern Oregon will reach a somewhat critical stage of the season this weekend with several important games on the schedule.

In La Grande the Enterprise-Savage, 1931 champions, will endeavor to defend their titular honors from a revamped La Grande team, and on Friday the Ontario Tigers, usually the leading team in the southeastern section of the state, will invade Baker, a team that has lost three straight games. The third game will see the Mac-Hi team invading The Dalles.

Three other games, none of them with bearing on the championship race will be played, two on Friday and one on Saturday. Friday North Powder will tackle Cove and Union will meet Wallawa. On Saturday the Bucks of Pendleton will play Heppner.

Baker Developing
Baker is expected to break into the win column soon, with reports from the Copper City that the team, new and inexperienced, is developing slowly but steadily. A win for Baker would put Ontario out of the running.

In the La Grande-Enterprise game, barring another tie, one of the two schools must take a back seat. If Mac-Hi were to lose to The Dalles, it would hurt the prestige of the Hoquiam but would not affect the team's title chances in the generally called Eastern Oregon football circles. Ordinarily The Dalles is considered in the Central Oregon group that includes Bend and other cities between the Cascades and the Blue mountains.

Most of the interest, however, is centered on the Savage-Tiger game, and an unusually large crowd of fans is expected to be on hand when the two teams kickoff.

Tony Canzoneri Beats Petrolle In Third Round

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—Coming almost together, the closing of New York's outdoor fistic season and the opening of the major indoor campaign serve to affirm today Tony Canzoneri's place at the head of the lightweight division and to fill in a blank spot which marks the featherweight division in the New York state athletic commission's list of champions.

Tonight's 15-round scrap between King Canzoneri, the clever Cuban negro, and Lew Feldman of New York carries the board's recognition as a featherweight championship affair. The place has been vacant here since Battalino forfeited the title through his inability to make the 136 pound limit although Tommy Paul of Burlington was recognized as champion by the national boxing association.
