### Manchukuo May Annex Part Of Northern China

CHANGCHUN, Manchuria, Oct. 12 (AP)—A possibility that a large part of Northern China might be annexed to the new state of Manchukuo, with the aid of the Japanese army, was at least part of the old Chinese monarchy restored under the former "boy emperor," Henry Pu-Yi, was predicted here by sources close to Pu-Yi's palace.

These sources described the move as a cherished ambition of Pu-Yi and his followers and said they hoped to be able to bring it about next spring after the Japanese army has occupied the province of Jehol, which was described as "inevitable."

After that, the "boy emperor" and his associates were represented as believing the extension of the Japanese military operations southward to the Peiping and Tientsin districts would be an inevitable sequel.

Pu-Yi, now dictator of the new Manchukuo state, under the advice of dozens of Japanese counselors, recently received emissaries from the Chinese provinces south of the great wall, the sources of information said, and discussed with them the possibility of such provinces as Hopei, Shantung, and Shanai joining Manchukuo and restoring Pu-Yi to the throne where his Manchu ancestors ruled in grandeur for three centuries.

Such an ambition, if realized, would double the present territory of Manchukuo.

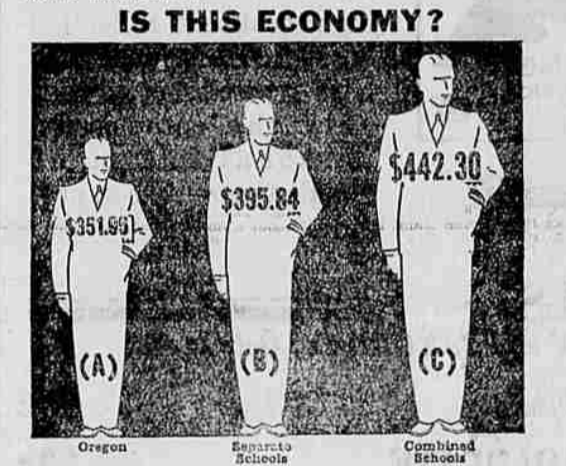

The following graph, which is compiled from the authentic figures of the United States Office of Education for the school year 1931-32, will enable every taxpayer to prevent this increase in instruction cost, resulting from an experiment proposed by unknown interests.



IF OREGON is forced to combine the University of Oregon with the Oregon State College, there would be an increase in instructional costs of \$90.00 each year per student, or over \$450,000 ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTION costs for a combined student body.
