Chats With Parents By Alice Judson Peale A little boy whose parents were rearing him according to modern methods, began one day in a moment of anger to strike his father. Told again and again to stop, he persisted until suddenly his father caught his hands and held him fast. "Now hit me if you can," he said. Angry still the child struggled and then realized his helplessness. "You can think anything you want, sonny," his father said, "and you can say straight out whatever you think, but you can't hit me. You see, I am stronger than you and I won't let you." After a little further talk, the boy climbed upon his father's lap and they were good friends once more. That was an excellent concrete lesson in the limits of freedom which a child may be allowed. It is important for a child to learn, no matter how liberal his environment, where his power ends and the rights of others to protect their comfort and safety begin. Of course this particular lesson is possible only in a home where corporal punishment is never used. Where it is the child would only accept such a demonstration as evidence of his father's unjust strength, against which he must hide his time. It does no harm to let the child learn just where the might of his own will ends and that of unalterable external circumstances begins. One should not try to soften the edge of the experience which teaches him that if one dawdles one comes too late to go on the automobile ride, that if one breaks a toy it is not miraculously made whole again; that if one spends his money it is gone, a genuine lesson which if pure superior force he most certainly will be worsted. (Continued from Page One) he said, "the whole job must be done over." "I want to see our budget balanced by careful economy and scientific revenue," he said. "The moment that is done, money will flow here from all the world and from all domestic hoards, seeking safety and employment, and then we shall move back into God's sunlight much faster than any of us dream." "Cites Hoover 'Errors'" Every element in President Hoover's 1023 plan to aid industry and labor was "error," he said, and every error brought disaster. Among them he cited increased tariffs and the farm board. The depression, he said, did not come from abroad but from "our own folly and illusion, not the least of which was that prosperity was so great that poverty would soon be abolished." "In my opinion," he said in summing up, "it is the administration's mucky, involved and obscure financial policy that is responsible for much of the continued uncertain conditions."
