Miss Amanda Zabel, Secretary-Elect Of A. A. U. W., Will Attend Convention In Salem on Oct. 21-22 From La Grande

Miss Amanda Zabel, state secretary elect, American Association of University Women, is one of the members of the La Grande branch who plan to attend the state convention in Salem on Oct. 21 and 22.

Among the interesting notes which have been received in La Grande concerning the convention is that of the visit of Mrs. Melvin A. Brannon, of Helena, Mont., director of the North Pacific section of the association.

Mrs. Brannon (Anna Lytle Brannon) was privately educated through two years of high school work. She completed her secondary education in a preparatory school affiliated with the University of Nebraska and received her B. A. degree from the university. She received a scholarship from Wellesley college for a year of graduate work and continued her graduate study at the University of Chicago.

She was head of the English department at Agnes Scott college at Decatur, Ga., which was at that time a junior college; head of the department of English literature at the Milwaukee State Normal school, Milwaukee, Wis.; dean of women and head of the department of English at the state Normal school, Lewiston, Idaho, and dean of women and professor of English at Beloit college, Beloit, Wis.

Mrs. Brannon's fraternity affiliations are with Phi Beta Kappa, scholastic honorary, and Pi Beta Phi, national social sorority of which she was grand president during 1918-1919; and is at present a member of the national board of finances. She is a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and was the organizing regent of the American Colonists for the state of Montana.

During the year 1926-27, Mrs. Brannon was director of the Rocky Mountain section of the A. A. U. W. and since has been director of the North Pacific section, to which position she was reelected at the national conference in April. Mrs. Brannon visited the La Grande branch in the fall of 1930 and made many friends among local university women. She was accompanied by Miss Zabel and Miss Helen Moor to the northwest sectional meeting in Portland.

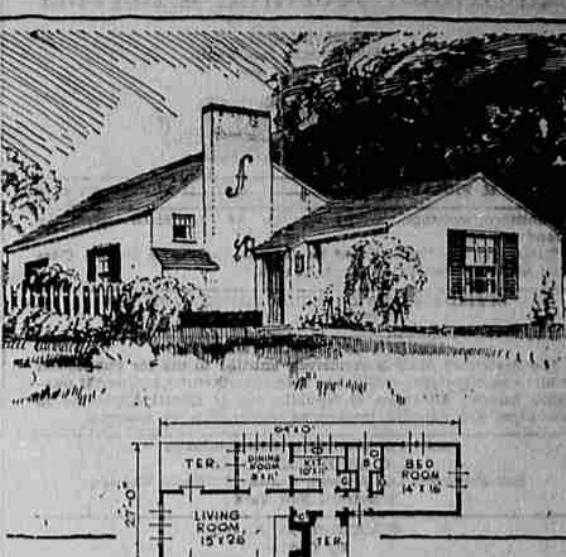
