Reld Cox returned home Thursday from a motor trip to Portland and Eugene. He attended the Oregon-Washington football game in Portland last Saturday.

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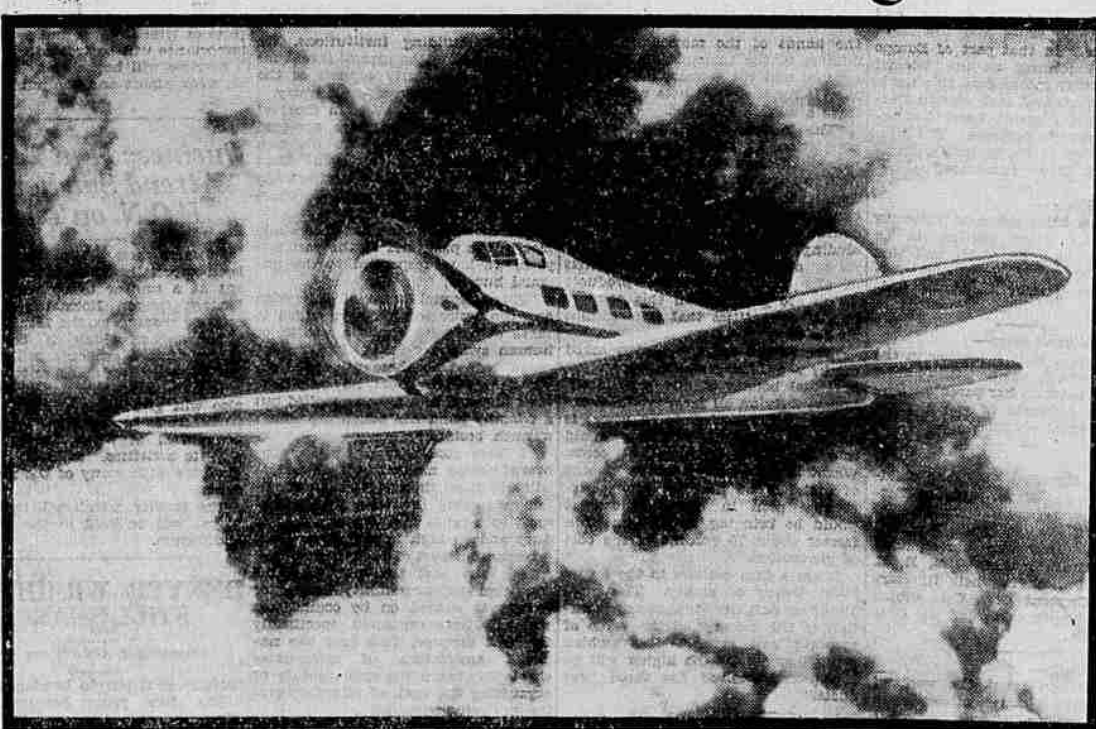
