## COX WITHDRAWS AS CANDIDATE; SUPPORTS F. R.

(Continued From Page One) suffering American people." Roosevelt, Cox said, "has pledged himself to the protection of the interests of the common man. He has been frank and courageous in advocating the repeal of the eighteenth amendment. He has pledged himself definitely to policies which will aid in the economic recovery and the restoration of work. He has endorsed the principle of large public construction by the federal government in

times of depression." The priest, known in Pittsburgh as "The shepherd of the poor" because of his work among the poverty-stricken, made a tour of western states several weeks ago after announcing as the jobless party's presidential candidate. He said today that while "my campaign has been a success... it is so arranged that Roosevelt or Hoover must win" and that therefore he is withdrawing.
