DEMOCRATIC PARTY GAINS; G. O. P. LOSES

Recorded in the 11 additional counties filing complete registration figures with the secretary of state Monday. Of this number the Democrats added 8907 while the Republicans lost 7928.

A decrease in registration in other parties, members of which joined either Democratic or Republican ranks, accounted for the difference between the total gain and the total of the Democratic and Republican registrations. Comparisons are made with the registration for the presidential election in 1928. Sixteen counties have yet to report.

The counties reporting were Deschutes, Douglas, Klamath, Lake, Linn, Malheur, Union, Wallowa, Washington, Wheeler and Yamhill. Increased registrations were reported in all but Wallowa county. The Democrats showed gains in all of them while the Republican party reported small losses in Wallowa and Union counties.

Klamath Gains Large Klamath county reported the largest gains in both parties and in the total. The list includes 8579 Republicans, an increase of 1350; Democrats 9445 or a gain of 2565; 605 from all other parties for a total of 16,039 registered voters, an increase of 3936.

The smallest Democratic gain was made in Lake county with 108, while the Republicans here added 346. Total figures were 1791 Republicans, 962 Democrats, 34 from other parties and a total of 2787.

In Linn county the Republicans also added more to the roll than did the Democrats, for a total registration increase of 2331. The figures are 3404 Republicans, 4941 Democrats, 339 from all other parties for a total of 13,681.

Wallowa Shows Loss Wallowa county reported a loss in both Republican ranks and in the total. The loss was 238 in the former while there were 81 less registered than in 1928. The report shows 1872 Republicans, 1528 Democrats, 52 from other parties for a total of 3452.

The 20 counties filing complete returns to date, Washington county reported the largest registration with 18,927. The Democrats gained 1260, Republicans 1013 for a total of 2144 in this county. The complete figures include 13,017 Republicans, 5141 Democrats and 769 from all other parties.

Douglas county showed a gain of 563 voters, of which 301 were Republicans and 262 Democrats. The list includes 9505 of the former, 4191 of the latter, 422 from other parties for a total of 14,298 voters.

The Republican party in Deschutes gained 1320 while the Democrats there added 911 for a total gain of 2228. Figures filed show 4922 Republicans, 2316 Democrats, 199 from all other parties and 7387 complete.

Wheeler Reports Gains

Malheur county reported gains in both parties with a 385 greater gain in the Republican ranks over the Democratic. Totals give the county 3634 Republicans, 1967 Democrats, 144 from other parties and 5745 total.

Wheeler reported 1308 Republicans, 350 Democrats, 10 from other parties for 1668 total. Republicans here added 233 while the Democrats increased their total by 109.

Yamhill county reported 887 more Republicans and 994 more Democrats. Figures submitted showed 7643 Republicans, 3797 Democrats, 263 from other parties for a total of 11,702.
