

# "It Really Looks as Though Stanford Should Win," Trojan Coach Says

## COAST TITLE MAY BE DECIDED ON PALO ALTO GRID

Howard Jones Expects to Stop Officials Hold Stop-Watches on Cardinals' Shift.

(Associated Press Sports Writer) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 20 (AP)—Coach Howard Jones scratched his head today and wondered if his Trojans of Southern California are as much weaker than the national championship aggregation of a year ago as comparative scores this season show, or whether it is a simple matter of their football opponents being stronger.

Troy's head man thinks his question probably will be answered Saturday when his team clashes with Stanford at Palo Alto in the game which also may decide the Pacific coast conference championship.

"We've looked pretty good offensively," Jones admitted, "but the boys certainly haven't clicked offensively. I wouldn't say they have failed to do the best they know how but whether this is going to be good enough against Warner's team Saturday is the problem I want answered."

"Stanford seems to have fewer plays than in recent years but far better execution. Of course the Indians may have more plays that I know about. Warner also has more and better reserve material to call upon, regardless of what he and some other coaches I know say about all the material being in his possession."

"I understand Pop's backfield has failed to wait a sufficient length of time after the shift on a number of occasions this fall so I may have all the officials hold stop-watches on his team. Being an opponent of the illegal shift, I know he will be willing."

"It really looks as though Stanford should win but I have an idea it will be quite a ball game."

All of which was something of a long speech for one so taciturn as Troy's head man.

Southern California has not been scored upon in four games, although the team's opponents chalked up 29 first downs and completed 13 passes. The significant thing is that eight of these forward flips were made by Utah in the first game of the year, a team Troy had not scored.

Coach Jones will take thirty-eight players north tonight, stopping at Castwood country club, near San Jose. The squad will workout Saturday Friday and move to Palo Alto Saturday morning.

## Oregon Staters In First Class Shape for Game

CORVALLIS, Ore., Oct. 20 (AP)—An Oregon State team in its best condition will romp onto Bell field here Saturday afternoon to face the Washington State Cougars in their Pacific coast conference football encounter.

The Orangemen were idle last weekend, and the two weeks' intermission since their last game with University of Southern California, has seen all injured players fully recovered. The only man still on the sick list today was Tar Schuyamuel, tackle, with a slight case of influenza, and he is expected to be in shape for the contest with the team that turned back California.

Loren Tuttle, out since he dislocated his right shoulder in the Gonzaga game a month ago, was back in uniform today and Coach Paul J. Schissler intimated he will be in the starting lineup at right guard.

Schissler has not disclosed the full opening lineup although he said today Keith Davis will be in at end and will handle the punting; Everett Dennis will have the other wing berth; Fangle will call signals from half or fullback position, and Curly Miller at right tackle will be field captain.

The Oregon State Rooks and the Oregon University Frosh will meet in a preliminary game.

## OREGON TO ENTRAIN

EUGENE, Ore., Oct. 20 (AP)—Oregon's football squad, 27 strong, will leave here at 4:30 p. m. today for Pullman, where they will remain until Saturday morning when they will motor to Moscow for their game with University of Idaho. The team will be minus the services of Captain Bill Morgan and Mike Mikulak, both being so badly crippled they will not make the Idaho trip. Oregon, following its sensational defeat by University of Southern California at Los Angeles last Saturday is not taking the Idaho game lightly. If the Vandals should overcome Oregon Prink Callison is determined it will not be via the aerial route.

## PENDLETON WILL PLAY BAKER TEAM

Buckaroo Coach Well Pleased With Showing Against Heppner Eleven

PENDLETON, Ore., Oct. 20 (AP)—Well pleased with the improved showing of his Buckaroo squad in the game with Heppner last Saturday but still unsatisfied with the offensive performance of the green and gold players, Coach Clarence Hines has been putting the Pendleton eleven through some stiff practice sessions this week in preparation for the game with Baker on the Round-Up field Saturday afternoon. With the exception of Warren, center, and Scriver, half, most of the players injured in the Walla Walla clash are reporting for practice and are expected to contest the boys who started against Heppner for places in the starting lineup this week.

Baker, having lost all of its first four games, seems to be about on a par with the Bucks for team strength this season. Many of the 1931 eleven were lost through graduation and Coach George Scott spent some weeks of intensive spring practice developing players to take their places. The Buckaroos, too, lost heavily through graduation and have had to fill big gaps in the line and backfield. With inexperience apparent on both teams fans are expecting a fairly close game but with the possibility of considerable scoring by each team.

With the return of Homer Hoover to the Buck squad Hines has shifted Cecil Tuter to right end for the clash with Baker and if Hoover can produce as a quarterback will probably leave him there for the remainder of the season. Tuter has had some experience at end and is expected to strengthen the right side of the Buck line considerably.

"Wild Bill" Crowwell, hard tackling and plunging Buck fullback, has recovered from a hip injury and will be back in the lineup against Baker Saturday in top form. Crowwell has led the Buckaroos in unassisted tackles during the last two games and is trying to set a season's record for the total number of tackles made.

## Bozeman Leading Eugene Cue Artist

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Gus Copulos, Eugene, Ore., won the sixth block of his 600-point match with Jay Bozeman, Vallejo, 56 to 50 in 54 innings here last night, but Bozeman continued to hold a total lead of 300 to 253 in 258 innings.

In the fifth block, played late yesterday, Bozeman took the match lead as he scored 50 points to Copulos' 10. Bozeman also broke his own world record by making 150 points in 100 innings of play.

## NECK AND NECK

There is a striking coincidence in the batting marks of Gehrig and Terry, each of whom made his first hit to the New York baseball castomers, on trial, in 1923, and each of whom has just rounded out ten seasons in the major leagues.

For the nine-year period up to this year, each showed a hitting average of .342. This season Gehrig finished third in the American league race with an unofficial .350. Terry was runner-up to Lefty O'Doul in the National league with a mark of .349. The Giant pilot collected more hits but Gehrig scored and drove in more runs.

Their offensive records are so remarkably close that over a ten-year stretch Gehrig has rapped out 1658 hits and Terry 1533.

## CONSISTENCY HIS JEWEL

The Yankee first baseman makes up in his consistency and reliability what he lacks in poise and agility. Starting June 1, 1932, Gehrig has now finished playing 1197 consecutive games, exclusive of 19 others in four world's series. Barring an accident he figures to pass Everett Scott's world record of 1307 games some time around the first of next August.

Gehrig has led the American league four times in the vital department of runs batted in, within the past seven years. Only Ruth, Simmons and Fox, in separate years, have topped the Yankee cleanup clouter in this respect. Terry, of course, is one of the most generous batters in baseball but over the stretch of the past half dozen years his records are not so impressive as those of his Yankee rival.

## JACKSON HALTS VAN HEE WITH TECHNICAL K.O.

SEATTLE, Oct. 20 (AP)—The sensational climb of Frank Van Hee, Seattle heavyweight, in Pacific Northwest fight circles, was halted here last night by "Dynamite" Jackson, when the big Los Angeles negro scored a technical knockout in the sixth and final round. Jackson scaled 207½ pounds and Van Hee 202.

Fighting only a year, Van Hee had molded together quite a record in the northwest, winning virtually all of his battles and chalking up eight knockouts in his last eight bouts. Jackson cracked the Seattle boy with a left to the chin that sent him to the floor for a three count in the first and walloped Van Hee again in the sixth for a nine-count. When Frank came up wobbly in the last canto Jackson whaled him with rights and lefts and the referee stopped the match a second before the gong.

Summy Santos, Seattle Filipino junior welterweight, continued a recent knockout spurt by dropping young Battline Nelson, Wallowa, Walls, in the third round of their scheduled six round bout.

Among the latest to voice an opinion, is A. B. Amorino, of an Enterprise furniture firm, and a former coach of Enterprise teams. Incidentally, when he was E. H. S. grid mentor, the Savages were ranked as one of the trickiest teams in Eastern Oregon, and he made life miserably uncertain for other teams with his cross-courses, trick passing attacks, etc., and pulled many a game out of the fire through use of surprise plays. Mr. Amorino's coaching ability is well remembered throughout this district, although it has been some time since he handled the reins.

The Observer received the following letter from the former coach this morning:

"I was indeed greatly surprised to read the article in the Observer regarding the 'wetting' of the La Grande field and also the matter covering the 'cleats'."

Stagg, himself, refuses to discuss the possibilities of his retention, except to remark:

"It's a little early for them (meaning the freshmen, who have started a campaign to keep him as coach) to start worrying."
