

Egg and Butter Market Steady; Butterfat Firm

PORTLAND, Oct. 20 (AP)—Trading in the butter market continues to reflect more or less steadiness. No change in the price of either prints or cubes was suggested. Butterfat values are generally firm.

There was no change in the selling price on eggs for the day. The late advance in mediums named by the Pacific co-ops was being maintained generally for fresh offerings.

There remains a very good demand for live hens of all weights with prices maintained generally at the recent advance. Values here, however, continue below those at other leading coast points. Leghorn springs continue weak.

First Oregon walnuts of the 1932 season were reported in. They were priced 20c for large fancy, 17c for fancy, 13c for standard and 10c for baby stock in sack lots.

Fair demand from retailers is showing for Oregon filbert nuts. Sales are generally reported around 14c for Duchilli and 12c for the usual premium.

Market for country killed calves continues to show weakness here with a general top of 8c lb. Hogs and lambs are quoted steady at late prices.

Weakness is continued generally in the market for potatoes at Pacific northwest primary and consuming points. Deschutes stock is still finding most favor but is following the course of the market.

Notes of wholesale trading: First carload Emperor grapes is here, priced 8c lb.

Hothouse tomatoes are showing a better movement at 40c for 10c. Outdoor tomatoes are dragging a trifle with weakness in prices.

Some California shell lima beans are offering at 11c for 12c lb, with sprouts 8c lb. Chokes are around 2c for 3c lb.

Head lettuce market is fairly steady locally but there is no shipping demand.

RAILS UNABLE TO MAKE GAINS; CLOSING HEAVY

May Compel Mott To Investigate Alleged Swindle

SALEM, Oct. 20 (AP)—James W. Mott, state corporation commissioner, was cited to appear before the Marion county circuit court on October 27 to show cause, if any, why a writ of mandamus to compel him to investigate alleged fraud in connection with the sale of stock of the Pacific Bancorporation and the American National corporation, should not be issued. Demand that a writ of mandamus be issued against the commissioner was contained in a petition filed in the circuit court yesterday by J. R. Gilstrap, Portland resident and an allegedly injured stockholder. Judge L. H. McMahan later issued an alternative writ to the plaintiff citing Mott to appear.

Gilstrap asks that the mandamus compel Mott to turn over all records and facts in his possession regarding the two corporations to the attorney general or to a district attorney for full investigation.

Credit Sales To China Denied And Wheat Goes Down

CHICAGO, Oct. 20 (AP)—Influenced by discrediting of rumors of big credit sales of United States wheat to China, grain prices underwent an early setting back today. Comparative weakness of securities was also a bearish factor. Opening 1/4 @ 1/2 cent down, wheat afterward declined further. Corn started unchanged to 1/4c off and continued to 3/8c.

Adding to bearish sentiment among wheat traders was a Winnipeg report that 192,328,000 bushels of Canadian wheat had been delivered by farmers this season, 49 per cent of the marketable crop, against 98,999,000 a year ago.

Wheat soon went 1 1/2 cents under yesterday's finish, and all deliveries of corn reached new bottom quotations for the season, December corn the lowest since 1897.

Wheat equalled the season's minimum, December contracts touching 47 1/2 cents a bushel. Stop loss selling orders were automatically forced into operation before the market received sufficient support to bring about rallies.

The new organization was formed through federation of Oregon turkey growers of Roseburg, Central Oregon turkey growers of Redmond, and the Eastern Oregon turkey growers of Hermiston. Other local associations are expected to unite in maintaining this central sales agency.

Local or district associations will continue to operate in much the same manner as in past seasons, except that the central organization will assume full control of sales.

PARIS, Oct. 20 (AP)—Marquis Boni De Castellane, for many years "arbiter of elegance," bon vivant and Beau Brummel of the Paris boulevards, died today, aged 64. The end came after a week's serious illness in which the results of a paralytic stroke were complicated by bronchitis.

LIMIT PRIESTS TO 56
GUADALAJARA, Mexico, Oct. 20 (AP)—A law limiting the number of priests in the state of Jalisco to one for each 50,000 population—a total of 56—was passed by the state legislature last night and sent to the governor today for promulgation.

A conference of national revolutionary party leaders afterward recommended further legislation fixing a penalty of confiscation of property for persons allowing clandestine religious meetings within their homes.
