NORMAL — OR JUNIOR COLLEGE?

The city of La Grande has been flooded this week with a bright yellow folder asking in pretended sincerity: 'Which would La Grande rather have? A small, undernourished Normal or a thriving Junior College?'

The originators of this little handbill evidently think they have the authority to tell La Grande to make a choice, and to threaten La Grande with the loss of its normal school if it does not choose a junior college.

In the first place, the sponsors of the bill know that there is no such thing as a thriving junior college in a sparsely settled area.

In the second place, the subtle insinuation of the question on the folder is that the Eastern Oregon Normal school is sickly, inefficient, and of no credit to the community.

As the Observer has repeatedly pointed out, we already have a junior college, and about fifty students at the Normal are taking the junior college course; moreover, plans are already under way for gradual enrichment of the curriculum as the demand increases.

Another question on this same yellow sheet, intended to fool the unthinking voter, is this: "Are there not more students in your locality desiring general college training than teacher training?"

The final statement of this folder is this: "Oregon needs junior colleges — It does NOT need and will not continue three small Normals." We should like to ask, "Who says so?"
