Several Special Services Sunday In Churches Here

Methodists, Christians and Lutherans All Announce Programs of Unusual Interest.

A number of interesting sermons and services have been scheduled for Sunday in the La Grande churches.

At the First M. E. church the morning service will be devoted to the Woman's Home Missionary society, and at the Central Church of Christ Evangelist Teddy W. Leavitt will occupy the pulpit.

The Zion English Lutheran church will observe Reformation Sunday with appropriate services.

Other churches have announced very interesting programs for Sunday as follows:

First M. E. Church (Fourth and Spring)

The special services at the First Methodist Episcopal church Sunday, honoring the work of the Woman's Home Missionary society, will be addressed by Mrs. C. T. Hatton, superintendent of the Jason Lee home of Seward, Alaska. Mrs. Hatton will have an interesting story to tell of this orphan's home, that is a project of the society.

The day will be the annual "Thanksgiving Day" of the society and the services are in charge of the local auxiliary, Mrs. R. P. Tyler, president.

Mrs. Ray Fuller will sing another of her delightful soprano solos and the chorus choir will sing J. E. Rogers' anthem "Fear Ye Not, O Israel." Miss Helen Williams will preside at the organ.

At 6:30 Miss Fern Broomfield will lead the High school Epworth league discussion group on the subject of "Prohibition" and Robert Bakin will speak to the senior league on "Obligations of the Young Voting Citizen."

At 7:30 the "Teaching of Jesus" subject discussed by the pastor will be "The Golden Rule." The church orchestra will play both at the opening of Sunday school at 9:45 a. m. and at the evening service.

Central Church of Christ (Pennsylvania Avenue)

Evangelistic services will be continued next week at the Central Church of Christ with Evangelist Eddy W. Leavitt leading. The pastor, Rev. Paul De P. Mortimore, states that the meetings are attracting many people who do not regularly attend church, and extends an invitation to all such especially to be present at these meetings. During the coming week, the evangelist will continue his messages dealing with Bible truths as applied to present day needs.

Sunday morning, the Bible school will meet as usual at 9:45. There are classes for all ages and the public is cordially invited to attend. Miss Dorothy Smuts is superintendent of the school.

At 11 a. m. the Lord's supper will be served for all Christians. The choir will sing the anthem, "Praise The Lord," by McPhail. Evangelist Leavitt will preach, using the subject, "The Power of a Surrendered Life."

Island City Community Church (Island City, Oregon)

At the 9:45 morning worship service the pastor will speak on the subject, "The Abundant Life for Country Folk."

First Presbyterian Church (Sixth and Washington)

The minister will speak on "Choose Ye!" E. E. Hurley will sing the response to the sermon.

Christian Endeavorers will immediately enter upon their program at the close of the vesper.

Sunday Bible school, still growing, meets at 9:45 a. m. All ages invited and will be cared for in classes suited to their age, by competent teachers.

Church of the Nazarene (Birch and Y)

Services at the Nazarene church Sunday begin with Sunday school at 9:45 which is followed by the morning service beginning at 11 o'clock. The pastor will deliver an inspirational sermon. Frank Cain is organist. A junior meeting will be held during the service hour.

The Junior league is planning to present an exercise about the Luther league emblem, which is taken from the coat-of-arms of the Luther family. Eleven boys and girls will take part in this exercise just before the showing of the pictures Sunday evening.

The Sunday school will continue its study of India considering the way India's people live. Betty Swarr, Yvonne Neumann and Molly Trull will have part in presenting this subject. There is a great deal of interest in our picture map of India, which the boys and girls of the school are completing. Every boy or girl who does not attend Sunday school will be cordially welcomed at 9:45 Sunday morning.

At the regular 11:00 o'clock worship service there will be a sermon by the pastor. The public is invited to worship at this church.

So I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Matt. 28:20. A holy life is not one of long faced, pietistic attitudes. It is rather a mind and heart so filled with awareness of the Lord's presence that go wherever one may, or do whatever one will, he cannot escape the sense of Divine Presence and Guidance. The Bible, and all mystic literature, is replete with joyous testimony to the experience of such awareness. In the 139th Psalm, David voiced it in the words: "Whither shall I go from Thy Spirit? Or whither shall I flee from Thy Presence? If I ascend up into heaven Thou art there; if I make my bed in hell behold Thou art there. If I take the wings of the morning and dwell in the uttermost parts of the sea, even there shall Thy hand lead me, and Thy right hand shall hold me."

Whatever else these words may be they are at least the outpouring of a soul filled for the moment with the incomprehensibility of God, and not merely with this sense of incomprehensibility, but with the exultant joy of His loving presence in every state of life. Even our most perverse states are not beyond His love and directing. How glorious to live life under this conviction. Possible to all, few attain to those who do are never permanently cast down, for they that trust in the Lord are as the mountains round about Jerusalem which cannot be removed forever.
