STRIKES AT OPPONENT IN INDIANAPOLIS

Declares if He Had Time, He Could Drive F. R. From His Position.

CHEERING CROWD HEARS ADDRESS

Hoover Says Roosevelt Has Been Forced to "Shift" on Tariff; Answers Many Charges.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 29 (AP)—President Hoover's campaign trail led him eastward today from a fourth invasion of the midwest in which he struck out more directly than ever before at Governor Roosevelt, characterizing the Democratic nominee's positions on election issues as "all equally untenable."

The president was swinging back through Ohio and West Virginia from Indianapolis where he told a capacity crowd that he would drive F. R. from his position.

Hugh E. BAKER High school's football team, as strong if not stronger than last season, was unable to defeat La Grande yesterday afternoon at Baker, but the Bulldogs did succeed in holding the Tigers to one touchdown.

The final score was 7 to 0 for La Grande, thus keeping the Tiger goal line unscored on by an Oregon team this season.

The lone touchdown was made on the last play of the first period when Sailer slipped past the line of scrimmage and then raced 38 yards to scoring territory, with Captain Owsley blocking out three Baker backs after taking care of his own man. It was probably the best exhibition of blocking during the afternoon. Alvey, La Grande lineman, kicked goal for the extra point.

In the third period the Tigers, aided by a 39-yard forward pass from Sailer to Irwin, carried the ball 70 yards to within a few yards of the Baker goal line. Then a five-yard penalty gave La Grande the ball on the Baker two-yard line. A smash at the Baker forward wall failed and La Grande lost yardage on an attempted end run. Then, instead of trying something else, the next two plays were directed at the line, which held and the Bulldogs took the ball on down.

Baker Never Threatening
This was the only serious La Grande threat following the touchdown, and Baker did not at any time get possession.

HERRIOT WINS BATTLE FOR DISARM PLAN

Chamber of Deputies Approves New Proposal in Paris Today.

CONSCRIPTIONAL ARMIES PROVIDED

American Accord Sought; Plan is Greeted in Germany; England Studying Proposal.

PARIS, Oct. 29 (AP)—Premier Edouard Herriot today won the chamber of deputies over to a new French disarmament plan providing for conscriptional armies in Europe and a short-term conscriptional system. American accord in such guarantees for security as the United States "had envisaged itself."

The conscription plan was the basis of the new scheme and would abolish all professional armies, such as guarantees was one of the conditions under which France would be willing to launch into the conscriptional army plan. The point was not outlined by the premier in his address to the chamber.

Just before debate closed, however, the premier said he had taken note of the interpretation placed on the Kellogg-Briand pact by the American secretary of state, Henry L. Stimson. Neutrality No Longer Possible
This interpretation, he declared, meant that neutrality no longer is possible. "The fact that there will be no longer any isolated wars is in itself a guarantee," the premier said.

In his recent New York speech, Secretary Stimson said: "... consultation between the signatories of the (Kellogg-Briand) pact when faced with the threat of its violation, becomes inevitable." The secretary had just recalled the recently recognized American policy not to recognize any situation, treaty or agreement brought about contrary to the pact, etc., by aggression, and the League of Nations' endorsement of this position.

The chamber voted confidence in the government on the new disarmament plan by the overwhelming count of 430 to 20 after the premier had outlined the idea.

HITS "BLACKJACK" METHODS OF FORD

Ritchie Tells Indiana Crowd of 15,000 That Democratic Success Will Save the Nation.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 29 (AP)—Indiana Democrats resumed their campaign today fresh from participation in an old-fashioned political rally which culminated last night in an address by Governor Albert C. Ritchie, of Maryland, in which he told them "The only hope in America is in putting in a Democratic administration which can succeed."

Thousands of Democrats from throughout the state joined in a rally here, which was enlivened by an old-fashioned redfire torchlight parade that recalled campaigns of years ago. Then they filled to capacity Cadie tabernacle, with its 15,000 seats.

After a wild 10-minute ovation for Governor Ritchie had subsided, the Marylander launched into an attack upon the Republican administration for what he termed "mismanagement" and asserted the only hope in America is in "putting in a Democratic administration which can succeed."

The governor departed from his prepared address at a few points, and omitted much of it because of time limitations for radio broadcasting.

At one point he attacked Henry Ford, the manufacturer, for what he said was "blackjacking employees into voting for Herbert Hoover," and added that "this plan of x x x telling workmen how to vote is un-American, and, thank God, un-Democratic."

The 12-year-old girl, Geraldine Glansky, was badly frightened but escaped harm in last night's incident, when she ran away from two men in a dark sedan who tried to entice her into the car, she said, by offering her candy.
