New Scoring Rules In Contract Bridge Announced By Authorities

NEW YORK, Nov. 1 (AP)—Penalties for being set are changed under a new code of rules for the game of contract effective today.
Non-vulnerable doubled undertricks will cost about ten per cent more and all categories of vulnerable undertricks about ten per cent less. The old method of scoring undoubled non-vulnerable undertricks is retained.
There are five major changes in scoring and many changes in penalties for infringement of the rules under a code promulgated today by the Whist club of New York, the Portland club of London, and the Commission Francaise du bridge. A committee of representatives of American bridge organizations endorsed the changes, but if the comments of some of them are any indication, moves to have a representative American body make future changes will be intensified.
Here are the scoring changes:
Undertricks—50 points penalty per trick not doubled and not vulnerable; double and not vulnerable, 100 for the first undertrick, and an increase of 50 for each successive undertrick; vulnerable and undoubled, same as doubled and not vulnerable; vulnerable and double, twice the vulnerable undoubled.
No trump valuation—Three no trump equals five diamonds or five clubs. This is brought about by valuing:

penalty for five down doubled and not vulnerable and also for five down vulnerable.
The penalty for any particular undertrick doubled and not vulnerable is 50 multiplied by a figure computed by adding 1 to the number of the trick. That is the penalty for the third undertrick is 50 (3 plus 1) or 200.
The Whist club in effect upheld psychic bidding by deciding not to increase the not vulnerable undoubled penalties. To remove the psychic possibility completely from the game, says its announcement, would take cost and variety and make it too cut and dried.
Penalties for infringements of the laws, in the view of the Whist club, have been considerably ameliorated, though Ely Culbertson thinks some of such penalties are a little blood-thirsty. Heretofore the partner of a player who bid out of turn was debarred from the auction. Now the opponents of such an offence may call for a new deal.
Players must have better memories in one respect. No longer can one have a free look at a quitted trick. Also there is a penalty for looking at one's cards while they are being dealt.
