Troutdale Construction Firm Presents Best Figure on La Grande Job.

FOUR ESTIMATES EXCEED \$100,000

Work Will Be Started on More Than 116 Miles of Road and 28 Bridges and Trestles.

PORTLAND, Nov. 2 (AP)—Bids on 25 state highway projects on which the total amount of \$1,121,747 to \$1,098,477 were opened by the state highway commission here today while the number of bidders on each project was generally lower than on previous contracts, 158 bids were considered. Awards will be announced later in the day.

Four of the highway grading jobs ran over \$100,000 in the bids submitted. With the letting of the contracts, work will be started on more than 116 miles of highway improvement and construction of 28 bridges and trestles. Most of the work will be paid for by the federal government.

Portland Firms Bid Low

The La Dee Logging company of Portland and was low bidder on the largest job to be awarded, the 3.8 miles of grading on the Humboldt Mountain-Range Station section of the Wolf creek highway, a part of the new road from Portland to the sea, in Clatsop county. Its bid was \$157,970. Only one other bid was received for this job, that of Fred H. State of Portland at \$164,940.

Kern and Kibbe of Portland was low on the second largest job, that of grading 18.9 miles of the Odell Lake-Walker Mountain section of the Willamette highway in Clatsop county. Their bid was \$132,580. The Newport Construction company of Portland was low on the 10.71 miles of bituminous surfacing on the Umpqua-Washington state line section of the Columbia river highway in Umatilla county. The bid was \$129,400.

A. L. Lynde of Portland was low on the 10.71 miles of grading on the Tillamook county line-Sunset Camp section of the Wolf creek highway in Washington county. The bid was \$124,439.

GALE CAUSES MINOR DAMAGE ALONG COAST

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—With only minor damage in its wake, the first gale of the season passed inland today and continued eastward after having whipped the Oregon coast-line, sending small craft scurrying to harbors and delaying other shipping. The southerly gale reached a velocity of 64 miles an hour during the night, stirring up an angry sea. Heavy rain accompanied the wind.

Transportation and communication services were little disturbed. There was some wire damage in scattered communities during the night. The eastbound mail plane out of Portland at 9:45 p. m. returned an hour later because of thick weather and low ceiling. This plane took off at daybreak today. All others were on schedule. All trains into Portland were limited from California which was delayed only ten minutes.

Mild temperatures prevailed over Eastern Oregon. Mechanism alone reporting snow flurries. At Baker where a trace of snow fell several days ago, the temperature was 32 degrees at 5 a. m. today.

Harding Praised By H. M. Daugherty

COLUMBUS, Nov. 2 (AP)—Warren G. Harding was a tolerant, but sadly underrated president, H. M. Daugherty, attorney general in the late president's cabinet, declared in a speech here today commemorating the 67th birthday anniversary of Mr. Harding.

Daugherty, in one of his few public appearances since he retired from the cabinet, asserted "no man suffers from the so-called 'freedom of the press' as did President Harding. That the abuse came after his death is all the more shameful."

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Heavy Snowfall Continuing In North Cascades

Drifts Average Two Feet Deep in Washington—Naches Pass Closed For the Winter.

SEATTLE, Nov. 2 (AP)—With drifts averaging two feet deep already clogging two passes, snow continued to fall in the Cascade mountains today despite warmer temperatures.

Both Stevens and Naches passes were reported under two feet of snow and Washington automobile club officials advised motorists not to attempt a passage over them.

The club officials said no effort would be made to keep Naches pass, leading from Sunrise park at Mount Rainier to Eastern Washington points, open for the remainder of the winter season.

They also said it was doubtful if Stevens pass would be reopened this season.

On Snoqualmie, the main route of travel between eastern and western portions of the state, five inches of snow was reported with the fall continuing. Warmer temperatures there had melted a considerable amount of the old snow and only an inch was added during the night, the club reported.

Conditions in Blewett pass were reported to be about the same as in Snoqualmie.

Both club officials and the state highway department advised the use of chains for travel over Snoqualmie and Blewett passes.

FINDS GOLD IN EAST CASCADES

Rich Strike Reported at Swauk Basin—Mining Area is Excited.

ELLENSBURG, Wash., Nov. 2 (AP)—A small fortune of twenty six and a four pound of gold, so pure that it needs no refining, was on the way to the government assay office today and its owner, Ollie Jordin, has also secured a patent on a pocket two feet with the same precious metal but a little less pure, together with 300 pounds of heavy gold-bearing rock.

Roughly estimated by jeweler and bankers as worth at least \$10,000, Jordin revealed that his last week's find, which startled the whole Swauk mining area by the eastern Cascades, came from a pocket two feet long and 18 inches wide. The Swauk basin is about 25 miles from here and was a heavy gold-bearing area in the late 80's.

Jordin found the claim just a week previous to his find, from Roy Milne, who had uncovered a \$250 pocket of gold but who wished to give it up. About three feet lower down Jordin and his helper made their strike, they said.

Mining men said the heavy wire texture showed that the gold was not an original rock deposit, but had flowed while still hot from some original vein in the rock, from some nearby vein.

POWER RULING ESTABLISHES A NEW PRECEDENT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—The federal power commission today ordered the Pennsylvania Electric company to restore to the Clarion River Power company the latter's property and rights in a dam on the Clarion river in Pennsylvania, sold at a foreclosure sale several months ago.

In making public the order, Chairman Ollis Ellis of the commission said the action had established an "important precedent."

"It announces," he said, "that where a holding company, by a foreclosure sale against the property of an operating utility licensed by the commission, procures a transfer of such property to another company likewise under the holding company's control, the federal power commission will refuse to recognize the transfer as an involuntary sale."

Woman Driver Is Held in Death Case

Unemployed "Hunger Marchers" On Way Home After Bloody Rioting

LONDON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Balked last night in their third attempt to enforce their demands by violence, the unemployed "hunger marchers" who straggled into London last week turned homeward today.

W. A. L. Hamington, the Communist agent who organized the march of the idle from Scotland, Wales and the industrial centers of England, was in jail. His associates who precipitated a riot in Parliament Square last night also were in the hands of the police.

So this morning 30 ragged men who had trudged with the others through the rain last week climbed aboard a charabanc and started back for Brighton whence they came. One contingent prepared to go back home before the end of the day.

Mass Attack Halted
Meantime, the historic precincts of Parliament Square were in the hands of police after a mass attack by thousands of jobless had precipitated the bloodiest of four recent riots.

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DRILLS TO TEST RIVER DAM SITE

War Department Plans Definite Step Toward Harnessing Columbia

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—As the first definitely significant move to harness the Columbia river, Major Oscar O. Kuentz, district engineer for the United States, said today his office is ready to start work immediately on preliminary work authorized under an appropriation of \$50,000 for test drilling to determine the best site for a dam across the Columbia river near Warrendale.

"Drilling to determine the depth of bedrock and types of soil at various sites should require about six months," Major Kuentz said.

"We would endeavor to complete this part of the survey before spring," he said, "and then the drilling of the facts we find, requiring, probably, an additional year or so of work."

First Definite Step
This investigation will be the first step toward development of the Columbia river for water transportation and hydroelectric power. It considered the outgrowth of a general survey completed by army engineers last year.

The war department last Monday appropriated an amount of \$50,000 for the field investigation and detailed survey.

When the best dam site is found, Major Kuentz said, a tentative design for a dam probably 84 feet high, will be made.

Six or seven sites are under consideration, some as far down the river as Crown Point, 20 miles below Warrendale.

NORRIS SAYS HOOVER NOT MAN FOR JOB

Republican Progressive From Nebraska Speaks For Gov. Roosevelt.

3000 PORTLANDERS LISTEN TO SPEECH

Attacks Republican Administration as Short-Visioned, Indecisive in its Workings.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Reiterating his denunciation of the Republican administration, Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska, headed for California today after an address here last night bristling with attacks on the president and concluding with the declaration that "we do not believe Herbert Hoover is the proper person to rule the United States."

The independent Republican will speak Thursday in San Francisco, and the next day in Los Angeles where he will cast his vote for Franklin D. Roosevelt for president.

Senator Norris ironically characterized Hoover as "the super-man" and "the miracle man" who "is again asking for the votes of the American people after he has been weighed in the balance and found wanting; after every one of his prophecies have proven false; after every one of his promises still remains unredempted."

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Leaders Watching Senatorial Races In Dozen States

Three-Way Struggles in California and Iowa—Old-Fashioned Battle Under Way in Utah.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—Aside from general interest in the presidential, congressional, and gubernatorial contests next Tuesday, political leaders are paying particular attention to senatorial races in a dozen or more states.

Chief interest of the party captains is centered on the senatorial races in California, Idaho, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Ohio, Oklahoma, Utah, Washington and Wisconsin, along with several others.

In California, Tallant Tibbs, young Republican senatorial challenger, and McAdoo, former Democratic secretary of the treasury, and Rev. Robert P. (Bob) Shuler, prohibition party candidate, are in a three-cornered contest for the United States senate seat left open by the primary defeat of Senator Samuel M. Shortridge, Republican.

Tibbs favors repeal of the 18th amendment. McAdoo stands on the Democratic repeal platform.

Another three-way struggle is under way in Iowa. Henry Field, primary winner over Senator Smith W. Brookhart, Republican independent, is opposing Louis R. Murphy, Democrat, and Brookhart running as a progressive. The latter is a prohibitionist, while Field and Murphy are standing on their respective party planks.

Indiana is all pepped up over the contest between Senator James E. Watson, the Republican leader, and Frederick Van Nuys, of Indianapolis, former United States district attorney. Van Nuys has been attacking Watson's record in congress. Watson has been talking mostly about the tariff and also the home loan bank act which he sponsored in the senate.

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'Corn Licker' In Gasoline Tried As Motor Fuel

YORKVILLE, Ill., Nov. 2 (AP)—The possibility that a type of "corn licker," ethyl alcohol distilled from corn—may be used when mixed with gasoline as motor fuel to furnish a market for millions of bushels of grain, is being investigated.

Tests of six different types of motor cars were conducted here yesterday under supervision of J. J. Groetken, of Aurora, and the Kendall county
