

Oregon State and Oregon Prepare For Big Game

WEBFOOTS WORK ON PASSES AS SATURDAY NEARS

Mikulak, Kostka and Morgan All Will Be in Oregon's Lineup For Corvallis Contest.

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 2 (AP)—Coach Frank Callison put his Oregon university Webfoots through a stiff practice today in preparation for their football game Saturday with the Oregonians of Oregon State college. The game, a Pacific Coast conference struggle, will be played at Corvallis, a feature of Oregon State's annual homecoming.

Determined to remedy their weakness against aerial attacks—a weakness that lost them their game against the Ucla Bears—the Webfoots concentrated today on building up a strong defense against passing.

The Oregon squad will invade Corvallis in good condition. Mike Mikulak, the plunging fullback who is also invaluable at bucking up the line, will be ready to go against Oregon State, his injured knee having healed. Stan Kostka, who hurt his shoulder in the early season game with Santa Clara, will be back at half after an absence of several weeks, and Bill Morgan, captain, out three weeks with an injured hand, will also be back in the lineup as tackle.

BEAVERS WORK WITH BOOKS OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Nov. 2—Oregon State football team returned to work Monday night to complete its last week of practice for the annual homecoming game with Oregon on Bell field here Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock. Scrimmage with the team, who will use Oregon plays, was scheduled for today.

Oregon State will present a starting lineup nearly equal to Oregon's but will be handicapped by lack of reserves, especially in the backfield. With Normal Franklin definitely out and perhaps Tommy Ward and Hal Joslin as well, the Beavers will be badly lacking in substitute running backs.

The showing of two sophomore backs, Ed McIntosh and Willard Jarvis, against West Coast Army gave the railbirds something to think about. Both of these men played sensational ball, but lack the experience necessary for a ball carrier in a game the caliber of the homecoming.

STANFORD SHOWS FAITH IN WARNER

Team and Student Body For "Pop", Win, Lose or Draw, They Say.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Nov. 2 (AP)—Despite two straight setbacks to the Stanford university football machine, the sentiment "down on the farm" is all for Coach Glenn "Pop" Warner.

The Cardinals dropped a game to U. C. L. A. last Saturday 13 to 6 and were on the losing end of a 15-0 game with Southern California the week previous. But the general feeling here is that the two games were lost by breaks against Stanford.

Alfred R. Masters, graduate manager, said there always are a few chronic kickers, who criticize a team whether it wins or loses.

"We are for Warner, win, lose or draw," he said. "Stanford outmanned U. S. C. and U. C. L. A., and made more first downs. They were just tough games to lose."

Warner recently renewed an agreement to remain at Stanford five years. He is a member of the faculty and has no written contract. He may sever his connections with the university at any time. Last year several eastern institutions were reported bidding for his services.

Stanford's schedule during the remainder of the season includes a game with Washington Saturday, the annual "big game" with the University of California, Nov. 19, and an eastern contest with the University of Pittsburgh Nov. 26.
